

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

UNITED STATES.

LONG BRANCH, Sept. 16. Official Bulletin.—At the examination of the President at 8.30 this morning his temperature was 98.6, pulse 104, respiration 21. The febrile rise during the night was not as pronounced as usual. There was at times considerable acceleration of the pulse. He, however, slept comparatively well and took stimulants and nourishment as directed. His cough was somewhat more troublesome during the first part of the night and expectation rather more purulent. The discharge from the wound is less abundant, and not quite so healthy in appearance. His pulse, however, has more volume, and his general condition does not seem to have materially changed in any respect. The following cable was sent to-night:—

To Mr. Lowell, Minister, London: There has been no very marked change in the President's condition, but it is not past the hour, 10.30, to be reassuring. The different symptoms are almost all slightly aggravated. The temperature and pulse fluctuated more than usual, and the respiration is rather more frequent while the character of discharge continues to be unsatisfactory. There is therefore a sensible increase of anxiety.

Dr. Bliss, to-night, considers the President's condition altogether more hazardous than at any time since the patient has been at Long Branch, but not worse than just before he was moved. He does not apprehend any additional accesses. The cough has been less annoying to-day, but on the whole he considers him a little worse to-night.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 16. Fire in Marc in Co. has already burned over twenty-five thousand acres and is still progressing; one third is grass land. The fire is in a thinly settled part of the country and but one house has been destroyed.

ATLANTA, Sept. 16. Fire here destroyed twenty buildings, including the Post Office, Odd Fellows and Masonic Halls. Loss one hundred thousand dollars.

EAST ROME, N. Y., Sept. 16. A fire this afternoon destroyed the railroad freight house, thirteen dwelling houses and other property. Loss estimated at \$100,000.

DETROIT, Sept. 16. Gov. Jerome has issued a proclamation to the people of the United States, appealing for aid for the Michigan sufferers by forest fires. He says the citizens of the State responded promptly and generously to the first necessities of the sufferers, but it is evident a wider appeal is needed as not less than 15,000 persons are destitute of everything.

DES MOINES, Iowa, Sept. 16. Snow fell between Atlantic and this city to-day.

GREAT BRITAIN AND IRELAND.

DUBLIN, Sept. 16. The delegates to the convention are pretty evenly divided between those in favor of accepting the land act and those rejecting it and relying upon the league to obtain a large measure. Nearly half of the delegates are Catholic priests. The majority, however, are fairly representative of the farming class. Three resolutions were discussed. The discussion of the fourth, dealing with the land act, occupied the remainder of the day.

The National League Convention, to-day, resumed the debate on the resolution regarding the attitude of the League towards the Land Act.

LONDON, Sept. 17. The race for the Doncaster Cup for three years old, was won by Beaufort's colt Petronel.

LONDON, Sept. 16. The officers of the Fair Trade League write to the president of the Trades Union Congress denying that the League directly or indirectly attempted either to influence the proceedings of the congress, or to subsidize any delegate present.

EUROPE AND THE EAST.

LONDON, Sept. 16. The establishment of an Anglo-French Military Commission to reorganize the Egyptian army to prevent future coups is urged. A Paris correspondent says France has proposed, and England has accepted this plan.

The papers announce that the cable of the American Telegraph & Cable Company will open for business to-morrow at the tariff of eighteen pence (37 1/2 cts) per word. The British steamer Sidonia, from New York, has arrived off the Lizard. She has in tow the steamer Rochester, from Boston, before reported spoken, with shaft broken.

PARIS, Sept. 16. The Electric Congress was formally opened to-day.

BERLIN, Sept. 16. The National Zeitung announces that the Minister of Interior is preparing a law regulating emigration, especially the emigration agencies. It is stated that emigration has increased considerably lately.

SASA, Sept. 16. The population around this town is collecting to resist the French.

TUNIS, Sept. 16. The French camp at Fughouan sustained attack by large forces of insurgents for four days. The French loss was a few wounded. The insurgents were repulsed.

PARIS, Sept. 16. The Ordre states that Prince Jerome Napoleon has decided to leave France for Constantinople. He is preparing a manifesto renouncing his claim to the leadership of the Bonapartists, in favor of his son, Prince Victor. The manifesto will be published while Jerome is on his way to Constantinople.

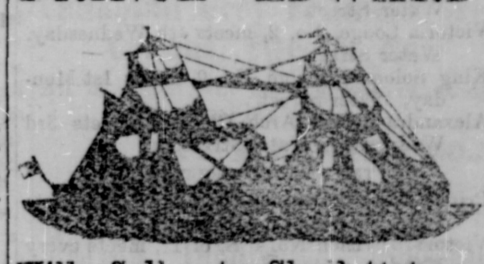
