

Safety System For Siani Desert Flying Operations

ABU SUWER, Egypt (CP) — A unique homing system improvised by Canadian Army and Air Force signals officers is the chief factor in a program to provide some safety for United Nations Emergency Force personnel flying over hazardous wastes of the Sinai Desert and the eastern corner of the Mediterranean.

Capt. Gord Breckman of Kingston, Ont., and FO Don Farmer of Woodstock, N. B., combined skill and resources to develop the system whereby the RCAF's squadron of Otters and Dakotas, if caught in a sudden sandstorm, can follow an improvised beam to a landing strip.

This base is part of a triangle with El 'Arish in the northeast and El Tor on the south at which there are regular landing strips to handle fairly big planes. But the Otters supply outposts with "drops" on treacherous desert roads, sometimes between minefields, and on boulder-strewn patches of the mountain foothills.

Sudden Storms
Most flights are made by visual flight plan in which the pilot depends largely on landmarks and high features. Across the desert this is deceiving because giant sand dunes look alike. When a sudden sandstorm, with its whips up, it moves landmarks, changes the topography and obliterates vision.

So the two Canadian officers pooled army low-frequency equipment designed to combat atmospheric in the Arctic and standard air force sets to produce a reliable homing signal, an emergency communication setup which can bring a pilot to his destination.

Right on the nose. Rigging the system was a matter of synchronizing air and army equipment on certain channels for the automatic homing signal and leaving spare equipment to handle voice communications.

Pilots have found the system has a range of from 150 to 200 miles, giving them assurance of keeping in touch with base and destination on most of their routes.

Pilots can use the communication part of the combination to ask the signals outposts to chase camels off makeshift runways and place smokepots for wind directions.

All air crew are equipped with safe conduct proclamations in case they go down among the Bedouins of the Sinai.

The paper bears the official UNEF seal and carries the Egyptian government's blessing. It exhorts the Bedouin to treat the Canadian well, "guard him from harm, give him food and drink, help his return to his nearest comrades and you will be rewarded."

Looks At N. B. Site For World Speedboat Try

TORONTO (CP) — Grand Lake in New Brunswick is being considered as a possible site for a fresh assault on the world's speed boat record this summer by the present world title holder, Donald Campbell of Great Britain.

In talks here Wednesday between Mr. Campbell and R. A. Tweedie, director of the New Brunswick travel bureau, Mr. Campbell said that Grand Lake met many of the requirements for speed boat racing.

The ideal requirements are that the course be at least six miles long, one-half mile wide and with a consistent depth of around 20 to 25 feet.

While no decision was reached, Mr. Campbell said he was interested in the New Brunswick locale provided water conditions and other facilities proved to be satisfactory.

He has been invited to make an inspection of Grand Lake in the late spring or early summer. Mr. Campbell is expected to be in New Zealand for a water speed record was made at Lake Coniston, England, in September, 1956. The record stands at 225.63 miles per hour.

Eden Shows Improvement On Arrival At Auckland

AUCKLAND, N.Z. (Reuters) — Sir Anthony Eden said on his arrival here today that the recurrent fever which struck him twice on the voyage from Britain was one of the reasons he resigned as British prime minister.

Eden, who appeared weak but cheerful, told reporters on his arrival after the five-week trip: "This unfortunate fever put me back a little bit. It is over now."

He added that "it left me a little weak, but I am sure I will pick up again now that I am among you."

Eden said the fever came and went something like malaria. "They never last long. They come with high temperatures and then are gone."

He said the fevers are one of the reasons why "I could not go on with what I was doing before."

Eden and his wife plan to stay in New Zealand for a month. He was met when the 17,000-ton liner Rangitika docked by New Zealand Premier Sidney Holland and his wife.

Commenting on the Middle Eastern situation, Eden recommended freedom of passage in the Gulf of Aden. "Just as there should be freedom of passage for all nations in the Suez Canal."

He said it would be "good for the free world" if an oil route were developed from the Gulf of Aden to Haifa, Israel. "None of us," he said, "wants to have to continue to use more dollars to purchase oil from our American friends than we can help."

Eden showed a fine tan and was jauntily swinging a walking stick as he left the ship.

U. K. Commission On Doctors' Pay

LONDON (AP) — Prime Minister Harold Macmillan said Wednesday a royal commission will be set up to look into the pay increase demands of Britain's 40,000 national health doctors.

Macmillan labelled the investigation "an independent inquiry which would take into account the position of the medical profession in relation to other professional classes in the community."

The doctors have demanded a 24-per-cent increase in their national health fees and have taken preliminary steps toward a walk-out from the system under which a vast majority of Britons receive medical care. Their fees were last increased in 1951.

Macmillan coupled his announcement with a reiteration of a government decision on Jan. 4, that Britain cannot afford to give the doctors a raise at this time. The statement failed to win applause from the doctors.

SIX-INCH GIRL DIES

LONDON (Reuters) — A six inch long baby girl, born prematurely at a London hospital Sunday, died here Wednesday. Elizabeth Anne Mildred Smith, who weighed 1 1/2 pounds at birth, was born 10 weeks early after her mother was taken to hospital with a blood complaint and doctors ordered an emergency Caesarean operation.

CONTRACT BRIDGE

You are the dealer, both sides vulnerable, and have opened One Spade. Your partner, North, has responded One Notrump. What do you now bid with each of the following four hands?

1. ♠A Q J 9 8 7 ♥A 7 ♦K J 5 4 3 ♣A J 7 5 3
2. ♠A J 7 5 3 ♥K J 4 ♦A 6 ♣K 7 2
3. ♠K Q 9 7 4 2 ♥A K 7 5 3 ♦K 8 4 ♣K 7 8 4
4. ♠K Q 7 8 4 ♥9 3 ♦A K 7 ♣A K 2

1. Four spades. No further opportunity should be given partner to play for less than game. A three spade rebid would urge North to bid again but would not compel him to.

Although the high card point count is only 15, which is little more than the normal minimum opening bid, the playing trick value of the hand is well above that of most opening bids.

There are about eight probable winners. It is not too much to expect North to provide the additional values needed for game. If he has either the queen or ace of diamonds for example, ten tricks are around the corner.

2. Pass. Prospects of game are not good. Partner has between 6 and 9 points for his one notrump response. Even if the optimistic view is taken that he has top values the play for game will still be tight.

If North has an average one notrump response, any further bid will jeopardize the part score contract without producing a corresponding gain. The odds are heavily against the partnership having the 26 points needed for game and a further bid over one notrump is kind of reaching for the moon.

3. Two hearts. If there is a game it is in one of the two major suits. The strong preference for spades should not blind us to the possibility that the game (or part score) lies in hearts. North's hand may include four hearts with only one or two spades.

If partner's hand is such that he passes two hearts it will probably turn out to be the best contract. If North bids two spades a three spade bid (and possibly four) would be in order.

4. Three notrump. A game contract must be undertaken since North's minimum of 6 high card points added to our 20 assures good game prospects. The only question to be solved is the best game spot.

The heart situation is unattractive it is true but it is quite likely partner has heart strength in view of our overpowering strength in the other suits.

The alternate bid of three spades is not forcing and shouldn't be risked. The jump shift to three of either minor which is forcing has great merit. About the only objection that can be raised is that partner may raise the suit and create an awkward situation.
