There passed peacefully away on March 11, 1958, at his home in Elmwood, after a brief illness, James McQuaid in his 78th year.

# Suggests Canada-U.S. Hold Talks On Problems

## VANCOUVER (CP)—A full-dress Canada-United States conference on economic differences was suggested Tuesday night by Walter L. Gordon, prominent Toronto industrialist and chairman of the royal commission on Canada's economic prospects.

He made the suggestion in an address to the annual dinner of the Canadian Institute of Mining and Metallurgy convention. He said both Canada and the U.S. would be better off if they tried to work out their economic differences together rather than going their own ways.

"Then he said: 'Canadians will be naive and foolish if we first gear to everything our American friends want about defence, about natural gas and about downstream benefits for example and then try to bargain with them about such things as restrictions on Canadian oil and increase tariffs on lead and zinc.'

"But a full-dress conference or discussion of all these various subjects—with very careful preparation in advance—might surely be helpful in reaching some kind of reasonable settlement of our differences.

"It seems to me that this would be a constructive way of furthering the interests of Canadians in general and of the Canadian mining industry in particular."

Mr. Gordon dealt briefly with the findings of his commission, a report which Ottawa informants say probably will be shelved by the Diefenbaker government

# Comes Back To Adjudicate Dom. Drama Festival

LONDON (CP)—The adjudicator of next month's Dominion Drama Festival in Halifax is prepared to like what he sees.

Philip Hope - Wallace, drama critic for the Manchester Guardian and a frequent BBC commentator on music and the theater, leaves today for a return engagement with the festival, for which he last acted as adjudicator in Toronto nine years ago. He has had a special eye for Canadian actors and theatrical groups ever since.

"I've seen everything they've brought over," he said Tuesday. "I like something about Canada actors. They are intuitively good, not sophisticated in the wrong way."

Hope - Wallace, 42, dates his acquaintance with the French-speaking theatre from a pre-war assignment in Paris as a correspondent for The Times. He has been a full-time music and drama critic since 1945, after serving as a press officer with the air ministry during the Second World War.

He is convinced by his previous festival experience that the standard of amateur acting in Canada is higher than in England. And he does not feel that his job in Halifax is to give marks to the competitors or to concentrate on details of individual performances "like a super-sergeant-major."

The adjudicator should look at a performance from the large critical angle and judge the performance on how imaginatively they feel their way into the part. # Timken Cuts Hours And Pay
