NEW ENGINE.—The P. E. Island Electric Co. are having a new engine fitted up in their station. The engine, which was made in York, Ont., by Messrs. G. J. & Co., has 12 1/2 inch cylinders, with a fly wheel of 14 feet diameter and 26 inch face, and also has a patent automatic wheel lock valves. Messrs. McKinnon & McLean are fitting the engine up, and hope to have it finished next week, when further details will be given. When fitted up, it will be the largest stationary engine on the Island.

PRODUCE FOR THE STATES.—A firm in Digby county have in the past five months sent 20,000 dozen of eggs to Boston, the extra duty of five cents a dozen being paid by the Boston buyer, so that the Boston workmen have paid \$1,000 extra for one ship's output for eggs alone in five months. Over 400,000 bushels of potatoes were sent from New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and P. E. Island the past spring by steamer and rail, on which 25 cents a bushel were levied by the McKinley tariff, taking \$160,000 out of American workmen's hard earnings.—St. John Sun.

RACES AT SUMMERSIDE.—The Futurity Stakes races for foals of 1888 and 1889 are in progress this afternoon at the Summerside Driving Park. There is a large attendance of spectators, the weather is fine and the track in excellent condition.

The first heat of the three-year-old race was called at 2 o'clock, with four starters, viz., Dot, Almont Wilkes, Parkside and Peerless. Parkside won in the splendid time of 2:37, with Dot second, Almont Wilkes third, and Peerless last.

The first heat of the two-year-old class was next called. There were six starters: Minnie Lee, Abdullah, Alma Wilkes, Fleetwood, Harry Almont and Chief Lock. Harry Almont was the winner, with Chief Lock second; Fleetwood third; Minnie Lee fourth; Alma Wilkes fifth, and Abdullah sixth. Time, 3:07.

A despatch to the Herald from Valparaiso dated August 23, says: "The insurgent and government forces are clinched in a final struggle for the mastery of the republic of Chili. A battle has been raging practically for three days. The first engagement was at the month of the Aconcagua on Friday. The government troops were forced to retire after a desperate fight lasting nearly all day. The list of casualties will foot up to nearly 3,000 killed and wounded. All day Saturday the insurgent troops pushed their way steadily forward, driving the comparatively small government forces before them. On Sunday morning the attacking army arrived in front of Balnearia's main line and fighting commenced. All day the battle raged with unusual fierceness. A constant stream of wounded are being brought into the city from the front. Temporary hospitals are being fitted up wherever possible. It is not known at this writing which side is getting the better of it."

DOMINION PARLIAMENT

House of Commons.

Another Vote of Confidence in the Government

Majority Twenty-Eight!

OTTAWA, Aug. 26. In the House of Commons yesterday Mr. Davies moved a resolution of want of confidence, censuring the Government in connection with the steam service between Canada and the West Indies, and the subsidies paid thereto.

Hon. Mr. Foster made a brilliant reply and the resolution was defeated by 107 to 79—a majority of 28 for the Government. Two grits who came in after the question was put and tried to vote. The House then went into committee of supply and made some slight progress.

Sir Donald Smith took his seat at one o'clock this morning amid cheers from both sides.

Cartwright intends moving another want of confidence motion to-day in connection with the issue of the Governor-General's warrants.

IRREGULARITIES AT OTTAWA.

The Auditor-General Implicated.

OTTAWA, Aug. 26. Before the Tarte-McGreevy committee yesterday, Mr. Fitzpatrick commenced his defence of Thos. McGreevy which he will conclude to-day.

The counsel for the Public Works Department also submitted their brief.

In the Public Accounts committee proceedings lacked excitement. The opposition members were not ready to proceed.

Investigation of the Auditor-General's office came up, and it proved that he followed the same rules as to pay for extra services and leave of absence for sickness as prevailed in the other departments. He admitted that he did not follow the provisions of the Civil Service Act as interpreted by his opposition friends, but had put his own interpretation, and transacted the affairs of his department as he thought best. The Auditor-General was a Grit member of Parliament and was appointed by Mr. McKenzie. He is independent of control and can only be removed from office by Parliament. Investigation into the affairs of his department being finished, the committee adjourned till Thursday.

ADDITIONAL TESTIMONY

OTTAWA, Aug. 26. In the Senate railway committee Barwick closed his case.

Chrysostom Langelier, commissioner for the Quebec Government in Bay de Chaleurs railway matter, was examined and gave unsatisfactory evidence. He tried to bluff the committee, but was promptly overhauled.

His evidence was a practical confirmation of testimony already adduced, and still more seriously implicating Mercier and his colleagues. It was brought out that Francois Langelier, M.P., Counsel representing the Quebec Government, had also been retained by the Ontario Bank to protect its interests and had advised strongly against pursuing the investigation, evidently with the hope of preventing damaging disclosures regarding his friends.

Telegraphic News.

LONDON, Aug. 24.—Queen Victoria shortly after reviewing the French fleet at Spit Head on Friday last caused the following message to be telegraphed to President Carnot:

"I wish to express to you the great pleasure I have had in receiving Admiral Gervais and his officers at Osborne, and how much I admire the French squadron which I have just reviewed."

To this message President Carnot replied: "I beg Your Majesty to accept my sincere thanks for the gracious reception you were good enough to accord to Admiral Gervais and his officers, and also for the sentiments expressed in regard to the French fleet."

A number of French officers to-day were conducted over the dockyard at Portsmouth and were shown all the departments which are open to inspection of foreign officers.

The French visitors were also conducted through the ship building yards and over the gunnery instruction ships and torpedo depot. Later in the day the officers were entertained at luncheon on Whale Island by the admiral in command—the Earl of Clanwilliam.

COPENHAGEN, Aug. 24.—The Czar arrived here to-day and was met by the king of Denmark, Prince Frederick and the king of Greece. When the Czar landed he was enthusiastically cheered by the enormous crowds of people who had gathered from all parts of the city and its vicinity. Soon after landing he inspected the guard of honor commanded by Prince Christian which surrounded the landing place. After this inspection he proceeded to Fredensburg.

PARIS, Aug. 24.—The latest advices from Martinique say that 340 persons perished by the recent hurricane without counting the shipwreck fatalities, the bulk of the shipping having been lost. The governor has permitted the foreign vessels to engage in the coast trade in order to supply the needs of the inhabitants.

Fishery Bulletin.

(Fisheries Intelligence Bureau Report.) HALIFAX, Aug. 26.—Anticosti—No bait or no fishing anywhere.

Quebec—Codfishing at Long Point and Perce, but no fishing at other places, owing to bad weather.

New Brunswick—Although bait has been plentiful, the Caraqueet boats made only

poor hauls last week owing to rough weather. Mackerel fair at Point Escuminac, but no other fish landed.

P. E. Island—Mackerel hooking fair at Munningsh and Souris and good at Sea Cow Pond and Tignish. Hake quite plentiful at Souris.

Magdalen Islands—Cod and Mackerel fisheries fair.

Cape Breton—Codfishing fair at Cheticamp, and about one quintal and a half per boat at Louisburg.

Small mackerel reported schooling all along the shore at Meat Cove, and some taking hooks at St. Peter's. The Yarmouth banker Louise, arrived at Port Hawkesbury with 700 qtls., report fish plentiful, bait scarce at Banquero.

Nova Scotia—Cod fishing reported good in shore at Buringburg, fair at Sandpoint, Shelburne. Very good all last week off Cape Fleet. Herring are very plentiful and of excellent quantity at Shelburne, but dogfish prevent the fishermen from netting them. Small mackerel reported quite plentiful in Lobster Bay. Bait very plentiful off Miscou, N. B., and herring bait by fishermen nets at Mud Island.
