MONTREAL, Feb. 4 (CP)—Maurice (Rocket) Richard rifled in three goals in four minutes and 56 seconds late in the first period Saturday night and was the whole show in Montreal Canadiens 4-1 National Hockey League victory over Boston Bruins.

Back after a five-game layoff because of a leg injury, the Rocket flashed in brilliant form before 14,040 howling fans N. H. L. On March 13, 1938, at Detroit, Carl Liscombe scored three goals against Chicago Black Hawks in one minute and 52 seconds.

But the Rocket's sensational performance sparked Canadiens to a victory which left them in third place in the standing with a three-point margin over the threatening Bruins.

Ed Sandford scored Bruins' only goal, a perfectly placed shot to the high corner of the net on Johnny Pierson's pass in the final period.

Mill Schmidt of Boston and Tom Johnson of Canadiens were given major penalties for fighting after a high-sticking duel and Bruins' Murray Henderson was also assessed a major for pummeling Elmer Lach.
