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Truth Squad
Disbanding
Announced

OTTAWA (CP) — Liberal party headquarters announced Sunday that it has decided to disband the "truth squad" which was formed last week to attend meetings held by Prime Minister Diefenbaker.

The squad, consisting of Judy LaMarsh, MP for Niagara Falls in the last Parliament, Fred Belaire, party research worker, and Jack Macbeath, freelance journalist, has been attending meetings held by Prime Minister Diefenbaker in point out to the press "any inaccuracies" he might make in his political campaign.

Here is the text of the headquarters' press statement:

Last week's national campaign committee of the Liberal party began to correct, in a systematic way, a mis-statement of fact being made by the prime minister in his election speeches.

Because this procedure has been misunderstood and misinterpreted and because of the regrettable harassment of Miss Judy LaMarsh, candidate for Parliament in Niagara Falls, it is being discontinued.

Miss LaMarsh will be asked to resume her regular schedule of public appearances and to liberal campaign headquarters will receive reports in the future.

Ban-The Bomb
Group Pushed

QUEBEC (CP) — Ban-the-bomb picketers including girls were attacked physically Sunday outside a party rally for Liberal Leader Pearson.

Many Pilgrims Attend
Beatification Event

VATICAN CITY (Reuters) — Pope John XXIII described Mother Elizabeth Ann Seton Sunday as the "first officially recognized flower of sanctity which the United States of America offers to the world."

He spoke at a service venerating the 19th-century New York nun following her beatification. Pope John was greeted with applause by a congregation of some 6,000 when he entered St. Peter's Basilica accompanied by 15 cardinals and many bishops.

Also attending was 15-year-old Theresa O'Neill of Baltimore, cured of leukemia 11 years ago after prayers to Mother Seton.

Invokes Blessing
More than 3,000 United States pilgrims attended the ceremony and later joined a crowd of 20,000 persons in St. Peter's square to hear Pope John invoke the blessing on the nun who died in 1821.

Hundreds of members of the order she founded in 1809—the

Sisters of Charity of St. Joseph were in attendance.

The ceremony followed the acceptance by the Holy See in February of the validity of two cures necessary for beatification. One was the recovery of the late sister Gertrude Kertzer from cancer of the pancreas in New Orleans in 1935. The other was that of Theresa O'Neill.

Chaput Makes Appeal
For Separatist Unity

MONTREAL (CP) — Marcel Chaput made a bid to mend the differences that have developed within the ranks of Quebec's separatist calling for a committee "to come to an understanding with all other separatist groups."
