MRS. QUINLAN HELD FOR MURDER.

Expert Testimony as to the Blood Spots Found on Her Dress. (Boston Standard, Feb. 12.) As was planned by the police, the hearing before Judge Bragg yesterday morning in Mrs. Quinlan being held for the grand jury.

First of the witnesses was Medical Examiner Harris, who testified that the wounds were made with some sharp instrument. This is contrary to what has been the general opinion.

In cross examination the medical examiner said the wounds were either caused by heavy blows with a very light instrument, or by ordinary blows with some heavy instrument. He also said, what he did not say in his report of the autopsy, that the blows were all lunched at the back of the head, and that from their position he judged they were all delivered while the woman was lying face downward on the floor.

This would be in accord with the theory that the assault was made by some person in the height of a fit of anger, who struck the woman a blow in the face as she sat in her chair, and then when she fell to the floor caught up something and struck with it blindly.

No blood was found on the lemon-squeezer, so Prof. Wood testified, and he was unable to analyze the stains found on the stove lighter. This article is quite long, and the brown stain which covered it for two inches from the lower end was clipped from the bottom of the skirt, and varied in size. On the waterproof waist and shoes which were submitted to him, Prof. Wood found no signs of blood. He was positive that the spots of blood on the dress were spatters, and not smudges, such as would be made by a momentary contact with a bloody object, and that the spatters were of uncoagulated blood.

Dr. O'Brien was another witness. He testified that he found the dead woman lying on the floor with the hands doubled underneath, and clad only in nightgown and stockings. She had evidently changed her clothing that evening, and the body was in a healthy condition, apparently. As far as he could remember, the room was in a perfectly orderly condition, and none of the chairs were overturned, nor was there any other mark of any unusual disturbance. He assisted the officers in their search, but did not see the marks of a chisel on the furniture, and saw only that some of the linen and articles of the drawers of the chiffoniere were messed up and tossed about.

The leading facts were considered sufficient to hold Mrs. Quinlan, and Judge Bragg decided to hold her without bail for one session of the grand jury, on the charge of murder.

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BACON PIGS.

To produce the best quality of bacon the food should be varied, and the animal should be allowed a certain amount of exercise. Care must be taken to feed a ration containing a considerable proportion of albuminoids or flesh formers. Corn alone, or in large quantities, can never produce meat suitable for making choice breakfast bacon, as it contains far too large a proportion of carbohydrates (fat and heat producers). Still we do not object to a certain amount of corn when fed in conjunction with other foods. Potatoes we have also fed with satisfactory results, and a great many potatoes are fed to pigs in Ireland to produce the well-known Irish hams and bacon. But potatoes also contain a very large amount of starch, and therefore must be fed in conjunction with foods that are largely albuminoid in their composition such as young clover, either pastured or cut and fed green in summer; peas, either ground or soaked, or fed dry lined meal, which must be fed sparingly and skim milk. This last, when available, is a grand help in turning out bacon of extra choice quality, as is also buttermilk.

Barley meal we have also fed with capital results, and this is the staple product in England for fattening pigs. English feeders generally feed it dry to their pigs, giving water to drink in a separate trough.

In conclusion, a bacon pig should not be fed too heavy a weight. From 160 lbs to 200 lbs, live weight, is quite heavy enough, and after that weight is reached every succeeding pound will be costing more in proportion. "Bristles," in Farming for January.
