Cabinet approval of the names for the hitherto undesignated islands was given Jan. 31, a recommendation by the Canadian Permanent Committee on Geographical Names.

B-58 Crashes Ar U.S. Base

FORT WORTH, Tex. (AP)—A B-58 bomber, similar to one that set transcontinental speed records Monday, crashed into a field near the base of Carswell Air Force Base Monday night. The crew of three was killed.

An information officer at the base said there were no weapons aboard. The bomber was on a test flight and was carrying a large amount of fuel.

The fire was reported under control 45 minutes after the crash. Thousands of persons in the vicinity heard the explosion and saw the flames that followed.

Hudson's Bay Co. Has Good Year

WINNIPEG (CP)—The Hudson's Bay Company Monday announced a net profit of \$2,850,000 for the year ended Jan. 31, compared with a net profit of \$7,200,000 in the previous year.

The company's annual statement noted that this year's accounts included profits of Henry Ltd. and seven weeks of the previous annual statement. The company acquired control of the Morgan company Dec. 10, 1960.

The figures for the year just closed were \$200,000 from the Hudson's Bay Oil and Gas Co. Limited.

Pre-tax profits were \$17,116,000, compared with \$14,641,000 in the previous year. Land account surplus was \$2,850,000. The company announced it has proposed a final trading dividend of 10 cents per share.

Pension Hike Not To Cut Allowances To Veterans

OTTAWA (CP)—Recipients of war veterans allowances aged 70 and over will be able to receive the full amount of recent 10 percent increases in old age and blind pensions, Veterans Minister Churchill announced in the Commons Monday.

NEW YORK (AP)—The Journal-American says it is "broadly hinted in Democratic circles" that Adlai Stevenson, chief United States delegate at the United Nations, may be offered the New York Democratic nomination for the U.S. Senate this year.

Stevenson decided last December against running for the Senate but has been influenced by assurances from President Kennedy that his UN job is a very important one and a bigger voice in the U.S. administration.

The Journal-American says Stevenson, twice unsuccessful as the Democratic presidential nominee, had given Illinois Democrats the impression he now considered New York his home state.
