### Want Job Ins. On Farm And Fishing Boats

A resolution asking the Federal Government that farm laborers and fishermen's helpers be made eligible for Unemployment Insurance benefits was passed Wednesday in the Provincial Legislature. The resolution was moved by Mr. William Acorn, Liberal Member for Fifth Kings who has consistently championed the cause of farm laborers and fishermen whom, he said, were working at a disadvantage because they were unable to secure Unemployment Insurance benefits. Mr. Harvey Douglas, Liberal, Second Kings, also made strong representation during his speeches on behalf of these two classes of workers, seconded the resolution. The resolution read: "Be it therefore resolved that this Legislative Assembly in Session assembled urge upon the Federal authorities the desirability of amending the regulations to have farm laborers and fishermen's helpers made eligi-

Mr. Walker, a native of Dalkeith, Scotland, came to Canada in 1906, holding posts in various Ontario and Maritime branches before coming West.

OTTAWA (CP)—Prime Minister St. Laurent says President Eisenhower and State Secretary Dulles have expressed concern over Canada's proposed 20-per-cent tax on Canadian editions of American magazines.

### Gunshot Jars Reporter On Rabies Story

NORTH BAY, Ont. (CP)—A lone shot rang out Wednesday over Mrs. John Hart's farm and police said any reporters trying to find out why she doesn't want anti-rabies injections proceed at their own risk. Mrs. Hart, 56, was bitten in the leg last week by a fox. Public health authorities say it may have been rabid. They have tried to persuade her to take the painful 14-day series of injections but she has steadfastly refused.

### Charge Arson, Homicide

NEW YORK (AP)—A 40-year-old man, reported bitter after a quarrel with his wife, was accused by police Wednesday of setting a fire in which two other women lost their lives. Howard Kennedy of the Bronx was booked on charges of homicide and arson. The dead women were identified as Hortense Williams and Beryl Santiago, both 34. They were trapped on the top floor by flames. Police said Kennedy, who was burned, told them while being treated that he had set the fire to get even with his wife. Later, however, Kennedy denied setting off the fire. "When about 50 feet from the house I heard a terrific boom and felt a slight whoosh over my head. I just froze. Had the person responsible for the shot intended it for me there would have been no question of missing the target." The police warning said: "Members of the press or radio who approach the Hart home will do so at their own risk until further notice—there will be no police protection." Neighbors said it is not uncommon for snobs to be fired at trespassers on a blueberry patch on Mrs. Hart's 200-acre farm at nearby Callander.
