Local and Other Notes.

JUDGE YOUNG'S HOUSE SOLD.

Diphtheria Spreading—Bad for Live Stock Shippers—Another House Sold.

Rev. W. B. King left Halifax for England Monday.

The races at Cymbric Park, Rustico, take place today.

Mr. A. Down is doing a rushing business in the coal trade having delivered over 500 tons the past week.

President Schurman of Cornell has received from Columbia college the honorary degree of doctor of systematic theology.

Mr. Warren J. Miller arrived home last evening after an absence of seven months. He is much improved in health.

Latest advices from Newfoundland state that the market for cattle and sheep has collapsed on account of being overflooded by shipments which have lately gone in.

The SS. Premier is due at this port this morning. She leaves this evening for Summerside, Mulgrave, Hastings, Arichat, Canso and Halifax with freight and passengers.

No special train will leave Ch'town for the Hunter River Tea, but the fare by the regular trains leaving here at 7:30 and 8:15 o'clock (local) has been reduced to one first class fare.

The steamer Fastnet will be due here on her regular trip from Halifax at 9 o'clock this morning. She sails for S'ide about noon today and returns at daylight tomorrow morning, thence to Halifax leaving here at 4 o'clock p.m.

A LARGE number of horses were offered in the market, Tuesday, and over twenty were picked up by Messrs. Traak & McKie. Some of them were beauties. Mr. Traak leaves this morning for home with his purchase, but expects to revisit the city again shortly.

ANOTHER case of diphtheria is reported at Wiltshire. The victim is a son of Mr. Charles Willis. He has been attending school in Bonshaw for some time past and is thought to have contracted the disease there and carried it home. The boy is reported very low.

A NUMBER of the members from the other provinces, says an Ottawa despatch, including Macdonald and McLean, of Prince Edward Island; Hazen, of Nova Scotia; Stairs and Mills, of Nova Scotia, and piloted by Col. Tisdale, have left in a private car for a trip through Ontario, which will include a visit to Niagara Falls and the military camp at Niagara.

The item in yesterday's paper referring to the feeding of the seals was not quite correct in stating that Mr. Crockett alone supplies their food, as another party at least has drawn their support. What we wish to draw attention to, however, is the fact that it is hardly fair to expect the owners of the seals to support them in the public square for the amusement of the citizens at large.

There was landed from the steamer Coban from Montreal, on Tuesday, for Mr. John Richards, a very valuable deer bred Polled Angus bull, which he has sent to his farm at Bidford. This animal the only one year old, is very well grown for his age, weighing about 1200 lbs. and is altogether a superior representative of this popular breed of cattle. He is a highly bred animal, his ancestors being among the best representatives of the famous Ballindaloch herd of Scotland.

The steamer Coban, Capt. Robert Fraser, arrived here from Montreal at an early hour Tuesday morning with a general cargo and the following passengers: Rev. Mr. Fraser, Master Fred Brown and Masters Willie and John Bishop. She left for St. John's via Sydney shortly after twelve the same day, carrying with her a quantity of potatoes, oats, apples, cheese, bacon, etc. The principal shippers were Blake Bros., Carvell Bros., John Kelly & Co, and Wheatley Bros.

The markets were well attended on Tuesday, although many farmers stayed at home to attend the annual school meetings. The market was well supplied as usual with hay, fish, meat, butter, eggs, flour, vegetables, but very little oats or potatoes are coming in. Oats do not seem to be in the country and buyers paid 30 cents on the street for them. A few potatoes are being bought at 10 cents. Hay is in good demand and keeps up its usual price, but this is largely owing to the enterprise of Mr. C. H. Schurman, who has been buying liberal quantities all along for pressing.

He has followed the same occupation all his life. Mr. Fielding was born 18th February, 1810, and is therefore in his 58th year. His brother Charles, also aged 74, formerly of this city, came from Noel to meet his brother, whom he had not seen since 1845. They only are left out of fifteen children, all born in Halifax. Mr. Fielding is an uncle of Hon. W. S. Fielding, and is staying while here with his nephew, Wm. Fielding, Dartmouth. He goes from here to P. E. Island to reside the rest of his days with a son there.
