The Government advance \$2,000, to be supplemented by a similar amount from the Provincial Government, making in all \$4,000, to be divided among six hundred families. This advance is in the form of a loan to the merchants of Bonaventure and Gaspe, who will distribute it, and who guarantee that the amount will be returned to the Government.

THE LONDON BREAD RIOTS!

The Police Force.

LONDON, Feb. 9. The total number of police available yesterday was probably only 2,500, while 4,000 were used on the recent occasion of the opening of Parliament by the Queen. Twelve persons altogether have been arrested for participating in the riot.

The Police Unsuccessful.

LONDON, Feb. 9.—3.30 p. m. By 3 o'clock, the mob at Trafalgar Square, was estimated to be ten thousand strong. Large numbers of police are present. During the afternoon the police charged the mob in full force, for the purpose of breaking it up and driving the fragments down Trafalgar Square, but both efforts were absolutely futile.

The police force were enormously increased, and prepared for a well-defined and exhaustive assault. This, after a long struggle, resulted in pushing the mob into the side streets, and thus splitting it up. Following up their work, they drove each fragment of the broken mob until its elements were dissipated in alleyways and byways.

Every precaution has been taken to prevent the re-assembly of any mob. Many of the rioters have been arrested and some have been fined and discharged, others remanded for trial, while some have been sentenced to imprisonment for various terms ranging from one to six months.

A Murder.

OWEN SOUND, Feb. 9. A quarrel took place last night in a shanty of a negro named Johnson, which led to the death of one of the parties. Phil. Royand and Joe Smoots, young negroes, went to the house, and when Johnson returned he found Roy and Smoots. Angry words followed, when Roy attacked Smoots, but was knocked down. Roy got up and went out of the door saying that Smoots would die for this. The latter followed, when Roy turned and stabbed him. Smoots died in a few minutes.

Serious Trouble Anticipated.

LONDON, Feb. 9.—2 p. m. Fears are entertained that the riots of yesterday will be renewed to-day. Ten thousand rioters now congregated in Trafalgar Square. Troops called out. Serious trouble is anticipated.

Bold and Impudent Roughs.

LONDON, Feb. 9.—3 p. m. Roughs are taking advantage of the fog to assemble in various parts of the west end. They are bold and independent.

OTTAWA, Feb. 9. The Government has pardoned four Northwest rebels now each undergoing a year's sentence for complicity in the Kiel rebellion.

NEW YORK, Feb. 9. General Winfield Scott Hancock died at 2.58 p. m. to-day.

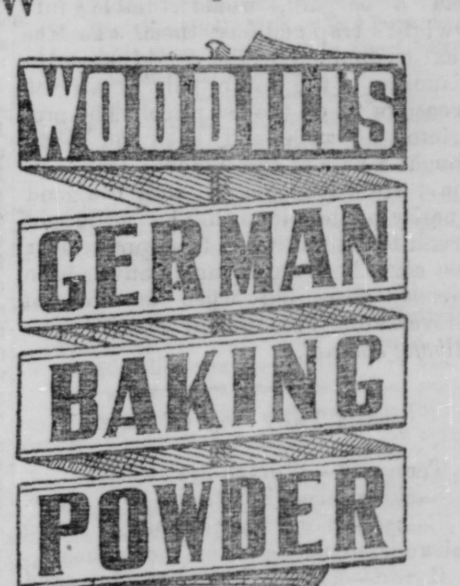
