Editorial Notes.

—New Brunswick has a scandal, the moral of which is that the people should be very careful to see to it that the men they elect as their representatives are honest men who pay their own debts with their own money. It doesn't pay to elect blacklegs and cranks.

—Advices from London state that the conservatives and nationalists have started an election campaign and are making arrangements throughout Ireland upon the calculation that a general election is near at hand. In Dublin the conservatives have four different campaign clubs already in operation looking after the registry of voters.

—Toronto also extends a cordial greeting to the British Association at its approaching meeting in Montreal, and expresses the hope that this, the first meeting in Canada, may be productive of much good to the cause of science as a whole, and that it may stimulate all scientific workers in this young country, besides proving an inducement to the undergraduates of our universities to enter their ranks.

—The nomination of candidates to fill the vacancy in the City Council, caused by the death of the lamented William Murphy—must be made to-morrow; and the election takes place on to-morrow week. This is very quick, very sudden. But the law requires it. The residents of the Ward will, therefore, have to bestir themselves if they desire that the vacated chair—which may be said to be yet warm—shall be filled by a worthy successor of its late occupant.

—Dull times in England! Says Mr. Burt, M. P., "The ship-building trade in the North is practically at a stand-still, and their probably never has been a time in its history when the outlook for an improvement was as indefinite and uncomfoting as it is at present. Whole fleets of large steamers are lying idle in the Tyne, and on the Wear ship-building has almost ceased to be an industry. Thousands of persons are unemployed, and the distress—actual want of food and shelter, I mean—is fearful in the extreme. The labor organizations, unusually strong, as a rule, in the North, are wholly unable to answer the calls upon them for relief; those few members who have managed to retain work being unable to meet the demands which are made upon them. The distress in Sunderland is particularly marked. Many hitherto well-to-do families have had to apply to the authorities for relief."

—The Cape Ann Advertiser is opposed to Reciprocity with Canada, declaring that the result of a renewal of the treaty of 1854, would be to drive the United States fishing fleet off the water, and cause the grass to grow on the streets and wharves of every American fishing town. Who is it, enquires the Advertiser, asks for this? "Is it the poor fishermen who earn their scanty living by danger and exposure, and who have been loyal to the very government that has invariably by treaty and legislation added to their burdens? No! it is a foreign interest, and its only sympathizers are a portion of the disturbing element whose cry has been that this will make fish cheaper to the consumer. This is false! The only fish we take on British shores are the mackerel, Codfish and halibut, and ninety-five per cent. of all the mackerel we take, are caught outside of all national jurisdiction. Herring, squid and other bait fish we buy. "The reciprocity treaty of 1854 was a blunder," says the Advertiser, "a renewal of it in 1884 would be a crime." It also says that a fishing fleet of nearly 500 vessels has been built up in Canada by the treaty of Washington, and predicts that a few years of reciprocity "would make the maritime interests of the States a beautiful myth to read of." The Advertiser is evidently given to extreme language!

METHODIST.—The Ministers and laymen of the Sackville district continued their meeting in Moncton, on the 10th inst., which is preparatory to the business of the General Conference of N. B. and P. E. Mr. Kinross, of Prince Edward Island, and H. J. O'Connor, ex-Postmaster General, were made A. M. Four addresses in Latin, Finnish, French and English were presented to Smeulders. He was visibly gratified with the Finnish address, as that is his mother tongue. He replied in an extemporaneous Latin address, referring to the motto on the wall, "Faith and Science," and passed a high eulogy on the faith of St. James Aquinas.

There was not a single bid for Lord Queensberry's estates in Dumfriesshire when they were put up for auction at Edinburgh, the other week.

One of the celebrities at the Chicago Convention is Judge Norton, of Texas, who has kept a pledge made in 1844 not to shave or cut his hair until Henry Clay is placed in the Presidential chair.

"Gentlemen," said a Western judge, "this Court, as the bar well knows, is naturally quick-tempered; and if this Court had not taken warning in time, and abstained from the use of ardent spirits, this Court would now be in the penitentiary or its grave."

An attempt was made on the night of the 10th inst. to wreck the west bound express train about one mile east of Kingston, Ont., where two ties had been placed on the track. Lieut. Ivan Campbell, the brother and heir presumptive of the Earl of Bradalbane and Holland, is about to be married to Lady Margaret Elizabeth Diana, third daughter of the Earl of Normanton. The present Earl of Bradalbane was married in 1872, but the union has been childless, and the marriage of his brother is to be made partly in the hope of producing an heir in the direct line to the Bradalbane estate.

Professor Brown has made rapid progress in the execution of his commission to purchase, in Great Britain, highly-bred cattle and sheep for the Ontario Agricultural College. He has succeeded in getting together one of the finest consignments of live stock that have ever left England. The collection numbers thirty-three cattle and about sixty sheep, and represents no less than eight breeds of the former and nine of the latter. The total cost will approach £10,000, but there can be little doubt that the outlay, large as it is, is a judicious investment.

The Prince of Wales has gone to Mentone it is said, not so much for his health as to avoid being condoled with on the death of his lamented brother. He has been sequestered with conventional mourning in Germany, because, as one of the Prince Consort's sons, he is Duke of Saxony. At Darmstadt every lady wore a long face. At Berlin the legation ceremonial observed by nearly every one who approached him became intolerable. The Prince was thankful to find himself, after all this simulated woe, in a Republican city, where not a creature thought of presenting him with an address.

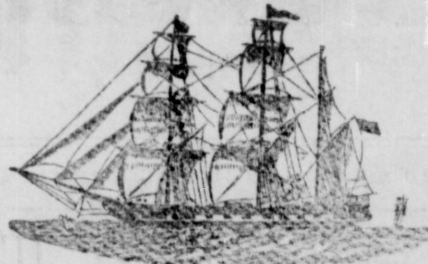
Mr. Gladstone has advised the Queen to grant a British peerage to the new Earl of Seafeld, who, after having sat for several years in the House of Commons as a Conservative, suddenly abandoned the hereditary politics of his family about two years ago, and proclaimed himself a Liberal of the Whig type. The late Earl sat in the House of Lords as Baron Strathpey, a title which was given to his father by Lord Derby in 1858; but it is of course extinct, and the present peer could only enter Parliament as one of the representative peers of Scotland, and as a Liberal he would have no chance of election at H. Lyrod. Lord Seafeld's new title is to be Baron Duthill.

John Nicholls, a man belonging to Cape Breton, and who lived for some time at Goldenville, Guysboro, was found on May 10th by two hunters hanging to a tree in a wood about twelve miles from Lordsburg, New Mexico. The body was in an advanced state of decomposition, and had evidently hung there for at least ten days. From the fact that the man had been shot three times and the rope around his neck broken, it is probable the parties by whom the murder was committed made short work of their victim. It is stated that he had five hundred dollars in cash in his pockets when he left Morencia, Arizona, about April 10th, with the intention of going to Carlisle, since which time nothing is known of his movements, and when the body was discovered no money was found upon it.

A London cablegram says the Maori King Tawahia, who has been in England a week, has astonished as well as pleased his supporters by keeping perfectly sober. He has been chaperoned to a great many of the theatres, and has developed an admiration for the ballet which is almost beyond restraint. He was conspicuous at the Alhambra, where he ogled to girls to his heart's content. Afterwards when he had his supper at the Savage Club, he became so enthusiastic in a description of the wonders he had seen that he made a bold but abortive attempt to imitate a pas seul. The members of the Club enjoyed the fun, and encouraged each new effort with bravos and peals of laughter. A cold in one of his eyes and a rather severe attack of rheumatism unfortunately prevented the King from lurching with the Lord Mayor.

There is a gleam of hope for those who want to go to Europe without the ocean journey. It is proposed that a railroad shall be constructed along the Pacific coast to the extremity of Alaska, where a ferrisage would connect the tourist with the Russian railway system, which would be extended to the Siberian side of Behring's Strait. As the Strait is only forty-five miles wide between East Cape and Cape Prince of Wales, this distance in a swift steamer would be trifling even for the victims of seasickness. Parlor cars transferred to the steamers might practically give an overland route from New York to St. Petersburg without change. The way traffic on this line might not at present be overpowering, and the item of snow ploughs and snow sheds would figure noticeably in the expenses. Still, the scheme is perhaps as promising as that of going to Europe by balloon.

Act 43, Victoria, Cap. 15.—(Seven Days before the time of any and every election for Mayor or Councillors, the Person or Candidates for the office of Mayor or Councillor shall give their names in as such Candidates to the City Clerk and the City Clerk shall duly enter the names, residences and additions of such persons, together with the office and wards for which they are candidates, and such entry, when made, shall be deemed nomination for such candidates."

There shall be paid by each person so nominated for Mayor, at the same time, a fee of ten dollars, and by each person so nominated as Councillor, a fee of five dollars which sums shall go toward paying the cost of the election.

No person shall be qualified either for the office of Mayor or Councillor unless such nomination be made in manner and the time aforesaid.

The time appointed for the nomination of candidates, shall be from the time of twelve at noon, until the hour of four o'clock in the afternoon of the day fixed for that purpose.
