TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER. O'Brien on Trial.

DUBLIN, Jan. 24. The trial of Wm. O'Brien, on a charge of conspiracy, began to-day, at Carrick on Suir, County Tipperary. The Government issued a proclamation forbidding any demonstration welcoming O'Brien, but 200,000 persons gathered around the court house. Six hundred policemen charged the crowd, but were unable to disperse the gathering. The excitement was feverish, and as O'Brien passed the court house he was greeted with vociferous cheers. His defense will be conducted by Timothy Healy. While O'Brien was striving to pass through the crowd to enter the court-house, he was seized by a police inspector and dragged 30 yards. The people madened by this treatment pressed forward to rescue him. The police repulsed the crowd. Timothy Healy, who stepped forward to aid O'Brien, was met by a bayonet levelled at his breast, but was not injured. A number of reporters were maltreated. O'Brien complained to the magistrates that the police were attempting to incite a bloody riot. When the case for the crown had been presented Healy applied for subpoenas for Salisbury and Balfour, both of whom, he asserted, had made speeches similar to those of O'Brien. The court refused and the spectators murmured, whereupon the Magistrate ordered the galleries cleared. O'Brien exclaimed, "I'll clear out also," and started for the door. After a sharp struggle O'Brien reached the street, and an immense crowd escorted him through the town. The police used their batons without mercy, and the people responded with stones and sticks. Scores were injured. The court issued a warrant for the arrest of O'Brien and adjourned. The police with fixed bayonets are patrolling the streets.

DUBLIN, Jan. 23. Father McCarthy, charged with inciting boycotting, was arraigned at Clonakilty, to-day. A large crowd gathered, and was charged upon by 200 policemen. Many were injured by batons and bayonets. The crowd used stones and bottles against the police, and 13 were injured. One of wounded policemen will probably die. Three others are in a dangerous state.

The Ontario Legislature.

TORONTO, Jan. 24. Sir Alexander Campbell opened the Ontario Legislature this afternoon with the usual ceremonies. The Guard of Honor consisted of the company from the Royal Infantry School, Capt. McDougall in command. The Speech from the Throne promises measures for a new voters' list, an act embodying with the present law far as it is applicable, the provisions made for carrying into full effect the legislation of last session in reference to manhood suffrage, bills for increasing the efficiency of the Factory Act, and the workmen's compensation for injuries, an act for further improving the laws respecting land titles and the registration of deeds.

The Parnell Commission.

LONDON, Jan. 24. Before the Commission to-day, Capt. Slack traced the outrages in Ireland to the League and the inflamed language of members of the Commons, priests and other leaders. The League practically assumed the government of the country and encouraged outrages. There was no abnormal distress in his district. He thought the outrages would not have been committed had they not been instigated by the League. As a rule, Irish leaders did not denounce outrages, but there might have been exceptions.

Mercier's Gerrymander Bill.

MONTREAL, Jan. 24. The Sun's correspondent learns from excellent authority that Mercier will rush his Gerrymander Bill through the House at the end of the session. It increases the number of members to 72 or 75, cuts and carves the province to suit his will, and dissolves Parliament, and provides for the holding of elections, if the dissolution be granted, by the Lieut.-Governor early in June.

The Short Line Delegation.

OTTAWA, Jan. 24. The Moncton and Fredericton Short Line railway delegates arrived to-day. The deputations have arrived to meet the members of the cabinet on Saturday.

Important Documents.

DUBLIN, Jan. 24. The Express (Conservative) asserts that the London Times has secured fresh and important documents from the United States, which will be produced before the Parnell Commission in support of its charges against the Parnellite members of the House of Commons.

Two Elections.

MONTREAL, Jan. 24. The Leprarie election resulted in the return of Gervette by 70 majority, with St. Jacques to hear from, which will slightly reduce this figure.

Winnipeg, Jan. 24.

L'Arrivere, Ministerialist, was elected to-day in Provencier by a large majority. He succeeds Hon. Joseph Royal.

Elected Governor.

OTTAWA, Jan. 24. Sir Donald Smith has been elected Governor of the Hudson Bay Company, vice Sir Eden Colville retired.

Weather Bulletin.

TORONTO, Jan. 25.—10 a. m. Fresh or strong south and southwest winds; partly cloudy and mild; light local showers.

St. James' Church.

The annual meeting of St. James' Church, Charlottetown, which was adjourned from Monday, owing to stormy weather, was held last evening. The pastor, in his opening address, referred hopefully to the continued progress of the congregation, and dwelt warmly upon the cordial and hearty sympathy and assistance which he had received from the officers of the church. Mr. J. D. Mason was called to the chair, and reports were submitted from the different branches of the church's work—all of these showed steady and marked progress and were highly satisfactory to the meeting. Cordial votes of thanks were passed to Dr. James McLeod, for his constant and kindly attention to the sick poor of the congregation, to the Ladies Benevolent Society, for the admirable manner in which the poor had been cared for, and for the large sum which had been gathered for this purpose, to the Ladies Aid Society for their untiring exertions in aiding to extinguish the Bonded Debt, of which they have already covered \$1500, to the Young Men's Literary Society, for the handsome pulpit and platform which they have placed in the church, and for other improvements, to the ladies and gentlemen of the Choir, for the valuable assistance they have given in rendering the public worship more efficient and attractive. In this connection great satisfaction was expressed at the marked improvement which had been made by the choir under the skillful training of Prof. Earle. The session's accounts showed that \$853 had been raised for the schemes of the church, and including the Benevolent Society's receipts, a total of \$653 for other religious and benevolent objects. The Trustees' statements show that for the working expenses, including reduction of debt, repairs and improvements to church and manse \$3941 had been secured making the total amount raised by the congregation for all purposes in 1888, \$5,447. This is a highly satisfactory showing, and speaks volumes for the active and untiring exertions of all departments of the congregation, and for the earnest and faithful work of its valued pastor.

MYSTERY OF THE NAKED BODY

Post-Mortem Examination.

BODY IN GOOD CONDITION.

Answers to Fogarty's Description.

DOCTOR MCKAY, of Hazel Grove, assisted by Dr. Honeywell, of Hunter River, and Dr. Wall, of County Line, held a post-mortem examination of the body at 9 o'clock this morning. The stomach was found to be in good condition, showing that deceased was a sober man. It contained nothing but ice. Nothing else of importance was discovered at the examination.

The inquest was resumed at three o'clock this afternoon. After hearing the evidence of two witnesses, without obtaining any new light on the subject, the jury returned the following verdict:—

"That the deceased came to his death from exposure to cold while in a state of permanent or temporary insanity."

The body was interred this afternoon.

An EXAMINER reporter visited the Poor House this forenoon, and obtained the following particulars respecting the missing man Fogarty:—

JOHN FOGARTY, a man about 5ft. 10in. in height was an inmate of the Poor House up to Jan. 4. On that day he dressed himself in a good black suit of clothes which he took out of a trunk in which he kept them. After having his breakfast he left the Poor House, without telling anybody where he was going, and leaving his trunk behind him. In conversation with the other inmates he often told them that he belonged to Morrell, where he had a small cottage and carried on a fishing trade, and was going to build a boat in the spring. Fogarty seemed to be stricken with melancholy, and would sit staring straight before him all day if nobody spoke to him. He sometimes grumbled for having to carry water—about six buckets a day—saying he would not do everybody's work.

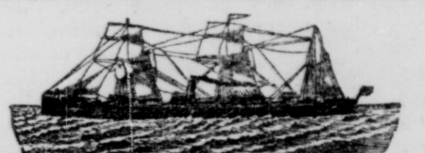
