We read a few days ago that in a large city, (we don't recall where), pedestrians are fined 50 cents for jay-walking! Well, why not? A man can be arrested for deliberately attempting suicide, why not treat the potential careless suicide the same way? This jay-walking fine constitutes a new kind of life insurance that all pedestrians should be grateful for.

We pay much more for the old type insurance, which guarantees, not that you will live longer, but only that, in the event of your demise, your dependents will be looked after. The premium on jay-walking guarantees a certain degree of protection against fatal accident, if you have sense enough not to have to pay it. Your life expectancy rises as your premiums decrease.

You can shout into people's ears the risks they are taking every day in the week, and some will pay little attention, but if you tap them ever so gently on the wallet, they immediately sit up and take notice. We shouldn't be surprised if this little fine educated pedestrians to observe the safety rules of the road more quickly than any other form of persuasion.

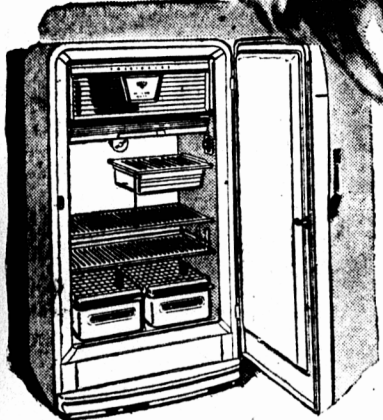

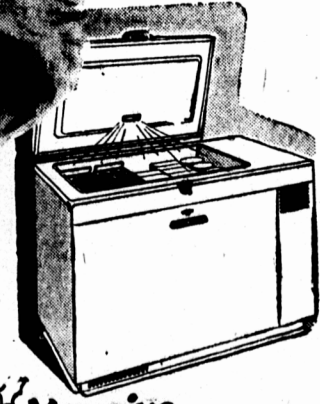
