Quebec Carnival Gets Big Start

QUEBEC (CP)—An unprecedented crowd of 3,000 turned out in zero weather Saturday night to see Quebec City's annual Winter Carnival get off to a colorful, amusing and unofficial start.

Bonhomme Carnaval, the six-foot-eight showman who symbolizes the carnival spirit, popped from a top tier of an impressive 60-foot-high \$8,000 cake.

Bonhomme's seven beautiful duchesses narrowly missed being scorched themselves as their float drew up to the cake. The girls, dressed in striking ski outfits and sitting against a background of royal blue, scattered as wires atop the illuminated float became tangled and fell, throwing sparks about.

TROUBLE TRADITIONAL

The crowd merely cheered. The plywood pastry was slightly scorched Friday night. Moments later, the duchesses were bussing Bonhomme that was quickly put out by passers.

As the crowd sang and sev-

eral hands played, 10 big candles on the cake were lighted to mark the birthday of the winter festival.

Booming glittering fireworks were launched from the nearby Plains of Abraham — breaking almost directly over an odd-looking crowd.

Everybody was dressed in carnival togs — sequin boots, scarlet tights and colorful sashes.

The carnival officially begins Jan. 24 and ends on Mardi Gras, Feb. 11. Between now and then, Bonhomme and the girls will brighten the scene with more than 200 cheery appearances.

Dairy Farmers of Canada Arrive For Convention

Delegates for the annual meeting of the Dairy Farmers of Canada being held in Charlottetown this week, began pouring into the city over the weekend from all sections of the country.

A total of about 300 delegates and wives are expected by the time the general meeting gets underway on Thursday.

Preliminary sessions today include a meeting of the executive committee and directors meeting this afternoon and the first annual meeting of the Dairy Food Service Bureau which will continue all day. A welcome party will be held this evening.

The general meeting will be held Tuesday through Thursday and speakers will include C.S. Barry, federal deputy minister of agriculture; J.M. Benley, president, Canadian Federation of Agriculture, and Premier Walter R. Shaw. Delegates will be welcomed to the city by Mayor A. Walton Gaudet.

All provinces except Newfoundland are represented for the convention with the Islands having its share of delegates. Five of the voting delegates are from P.E.I. and one of the directors is Roland MacDonald of Southport.

Wednesday evening the delegates will watch Don Mosser's show produced at the Charlottetown Hotel. This will be followed by a civic reception.

A board meeting Friday will conclude the convention, the first for the Island in its Centennial Year.

Bob Francour and Len Sirov, paced Saints with 16 and 17 points respectively. Francour was high man for the game.

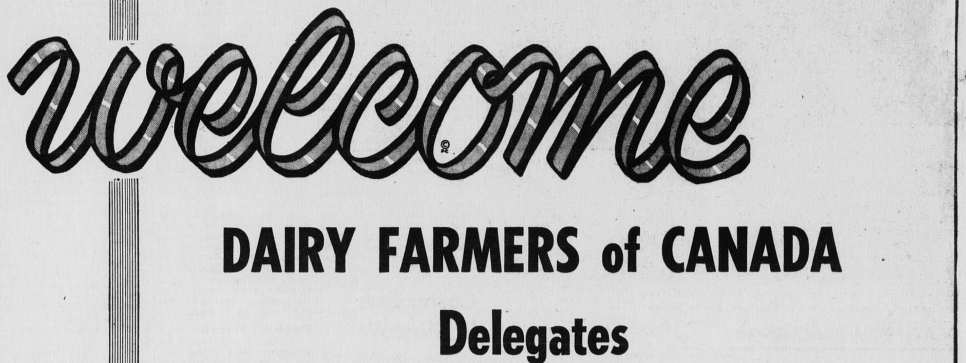
Tor Boswick and George Blake were the scoring leaders for the Tigers, with 10 points.

The proposal resulted in the joining, three years later, of all British North American colonies into a vast Federal entity stretching from the Atlantic to the Pacific Ocean.
