

Chicago Hawks Smother New York Rangers 7-2

NEW YORK (AP) — Chicago lack Hawks scored their first victory in 10 National Hockey League games with New York by beating the Rangers 7-2 Wednesday night at Madison Square Garden. Johnny Liso had the Hawks scoring ahead with three goals and Nick Mickoski scored twice.

The defeat cost Rangers a chance to move up to fourth place in the standing ahead of idle Toronto.

Wilson and Mickoski scored two goals each in the second period to rag up the game for the Hawks.

Ed Litzemberger and Jack McIntyre tallied third period goals to squelch a brief Ranger rally.

The New Yorkers concentrated their scoring in one minute of the third period. Andy Bathgate scored at 3:03 and 25 seconds later Creighton Courtenay.

The Rangers had beaten the Hawks seven times and tied twice in nine previous games this season.

Wilson got the Hawks off to a winning start after a scoreless first period as he rifled a shot

past goalie Gump Worsley at almost point blank range. Mickoski took a pass from Elmer Vasko at 7:12 and scored from 20 feet out. When the Rangers' Bill Gadsby drew an interference penalty, it was Wilson again, beating Worsley at 8:53.

Mickoski made it the beginning of a Ranger rout, tallying his second goal at 17:32.

Mantle, who received an estimated \$30,000 last year, reportedly has been offered \$45,000 about \$15,000 less than the figure he is demanding. It is believed he will settle for a compromise \$50,000.

These clubs will be hard to beat, and if the Aces are going to be settled in a play-off spot when the regular league schedule is over, they've got to knock off, at least, D.U. and the Montague Primroses. If they can't do that, then they don't belong in the play-offs.

The Aces had little trouble disposing of the Greenwood Bombers at Civic Stadium Tuesday night. Not how tough their opposition seemed to be really flying is a little hard to assess. The Aces over the Aces here-line with a lot of zip and precision in their sticks, and Whitley Mann's inspired performance robbed them of a few goals. But we had the feeling that the Greenwood team might have been just a bit slow clearing ice in front of their net, and the Aces cashed in on a number of that type of goal.

There are two distinct types of goals, by the way. The kind that come directly from an attack over the blue-line, or pretty passing goals, and this is by far the most spectacular and crowd-pleasing. We thought the Aces were a bit weak on that type of play, and we have felt

He doesn't seem to be having too much luck of late against Charlottetown teams, but we hope that Cutcliffe is really starting to roll, or perhaps we should say "buzz".

The Ace front line of Grady-Harris-Hennessey whom we ballyhooed as premier line in the Island League before Christmas will still make a face over the left in or mouth) has indeed fallen on evil days. Injuries are partly responsible. Lorne has been suffering with a sore back and playing some games in which grit alone kept him going. Vance Harris had a dislocated shoulder and also played when he should have been on the sidelines. Physically Coke Grady seems still to be in the pink.

We'll have to admit that line decreased in efficiency before injuries struck them. Perhaps our putting them up in lights really boosted them a double dose of momentum. If that Noonan-Dawson-Cameron line from the Albany St. Pats hit the skids now, we'll know the line is really working. Then we'll start praising the Carver boys and the Pineau-Whitlock combination to the skies and wait for the hoodoo magic to work on them. We might still be able to manage it before then.
