THE WEEK AT S. D. U.

Junior Farmers End Course Emphasizing Animal Health

The Junior Farmers Agriculture Short Course completed its five day session Friday night. E.W. Clark, the Provincial President, said that the time had been well spent and felt that "more people should take the advantage of the information which is available on Agricultural Problems." He also expressed the thanks of those attending the course, to the P.E.I. Department of Agriculture and especially Dr. George C. Fisher who organized the course on Animal Health for providing the facilities and the outstanding speakers. The course was designed to provide background information as to what is required to maintain health in livestock. Also what is necessary to produce quality animal products. The main theme was Animal Health. The majority of the discussion periods centered around disease problems. Dr. J.F. Frank, Officer in Charge of the Division of Animal Pathology Maritime Branch Laboratory located at Sackville, was one of the main speakers. He dealt with problems concerning control of parasitic diseases. He stressed the importance of sanitation in all control work. Various parts of the Province were represented at the sessions. THOUGHTS FOR OUR TIME

By His Eminence Cardinal McGuigan LENT SUMMONS EVERYONE TO REPENT AND ATONE In the Catholic ceremony of Ash Wednesday, which marks the beginning of the Lenten season, the words above are spoken by the priest as he traces the Sign of the Cross in ashes on the forehead of each of the faithful, kneeling before him. "A solemn occasion," one might remark. "A thought provoking ceremony," another observes. (Yes, it is all that and much more as well.) And still others may feel that the whole ceremony is much too morose, too sad, too antiquated and thoroughly unmodern. In reality, this is hardly the case. Yes—in reality—for this is precisely the attitude the Christian must take in regard to the Lenten season. Above all, these weeks preceding the Lenten Season must be weeks and days and hours lived in reality. For the Christian what can be more real than this — All men must die. I am a man, therefore I must die. Moreover, and of the utmost importance, I must die as a Christian. That is, I must die as Christ lived after the resurrection. "Remember man, thou art dust." PRICE OF SIN Death, the Christian could know is a punishment resulting from Original Sin. So also are sickness, physical and mental strains and breakdowns. All these maladies, man must bear in this life and they all contribute to bring about that separation of body from soul which we call "death." All these ills are constant reminders to man that his body must one day return to the same dust of the earth from which it drew its sustenance during this earthly life. If all life ends here at death, then truly the pessimism of the atheist and the agnostic would be justified. But the Christian knows his religion to be one of salvation, of man through the redeeming merits of Christ. That makes all the difference. (Yes, it is all that and much more as well.) This second life, better this fuller everlasting life, is one from which death and sickness and all other sorrows are banned—they no longer exist. What a glorious triumph the eternal happiness of the next life will be for the Christian soul! But the road to the gates of heaven is the same road Christ travelled — the road of sorrows, pain and suffering, the road of the cross. PENANCE, PRAYER The Season of Lent which began on Ash Wednesday has been traditionally recognized as a time of penance and of the denial and mortification in order that the internal spirit of prayer and the love God may be intensified within us. Properly regarded in this light the Holy Season of Lent cannot be a mere endurance test. On the contrary, it is essentially a time for turning the soul towards God, humbly acknowledging our debt to Him for all that we are and all that we have, accepting as His will for us all the sufferings of this life and asking him for the grace that we may sanctify each of our footsteps on the road of the cross of this life, as each footstep of His Son on the road to Calvary was sanctified for the salvation of each of us sinners. May the saving grace flow from the Cross of Calvary into the souls of all of us during this Lenten Season! (Copyright)
