THE CAMPAIGN.

THE campaign will be short and decisive. Within the next ten days it will be decided; (1) whether the people of Prince Edward Island appreciate economy, prudence, thrift and carefulness in the Government of the Province, for if they do they will sustain the present Administration; (2) whether they desire that the expenses of legislation shall be still further reduced, for if they do they will sustain the present Government; (3) whether or not they wish to see agriculture encouraged in a practical way, for if they do they will sustain the present Government, and return the Government candidates throughout the entire Province.

So far, advices from town and country indicate that this will be the result. But there must be WATCHFULNESS AND ACTIVITY along the whole line. Let not the enemy (of the country) obtain any advantage through inattention, carelessness, or overconfidence on the part of those who have the best interests of the Province at heart.

Cardigan.

OWEN AND McDUGALL are candidates for Cardigan on behalf of the true interests of the country. They are opposed by Mr. Peter McCourt (who lately "jumped the fence") and by Dr. McLaren. A correspondent informs us that Dundas will throw a large majority in favor of OWEN AND McDUGALL; that Baldwin's Road will give OWEN AND McDUGALL an almost solid vote; and that Cardigan is sure. If the people are alive to their real interests, and we have no doubt that they are, they will return OWEN AND McDUGALL by an overwhelming majority.

Georgetown.

A VERY large and influential meeting was held at the Court House, on Wednesday evening, 26th inst., for the purpose of nominating candidates to represent the Town and Royalty in the next General Assembly of the Province. The meeting was kept up to a late hour, and public questions called forth a very fair discussion. William Sanderson, Esq., acted as Chairman. The former representatives were duly nominated, and received the almost unanimous support of the meeting, which included all the leading men of both parties.

Fort Augustus.

IN the face of the strong and unequivocal resolutions passed at several meetings held in the Cardigan District, the Patriot persists in asserting that it was feared that he would not be elected which sent the Hon. Donald Ferguson back to the district in which he himself resides. Mr. Ferguson, Mr. Egan, and their friends in Fort Augustus are working well; and the probability is that the people of that wide-awake district will see that FERGUSON AND EGAN are duly elected.

Bedeque.

IN this fine old district, the Government Candidates are BENTLEY AND HOLLAND; and they are opposed by Laird and Lea. The feeling in the district is favorable to the Government; and we hope that no personal jealousies or dislikes will interfere with the election of both BENTLEY AND HOLLAND. We learn that at a meeting held at County Line on Tuesday evening there was an almost unanimous expression of opinion in favor of BENTLEY AND HOLLAND.

Tignish.

A GENTLEMAN just returned from Tignish informs us that a monster meeting was held there on Tuesday evening, at which the Government were sustained by an overwhelming majority. The people of this, the most populous district on the Island, appreciate the men who have so nobly lightened the burdens of the taxpayers. The public spirit of the country is strong for the Government.

Egmont Bay.

A MEETING was held at Lot 14, on Wednesday evening. The Hon. Mr. Arsenault and the Hon. Mr. McDonald, were unanimously nominated; and it is generally supposed that their candidature will be unopposed. The people of this district also like the men who save the public money and lighten the burdens of the taxpayers.

Bradabane.

A CORRESPONDENT at Bradabane writes: "The Government has a large majority of supporters at Bradabane and in the adjoining settlements." The people there see on which side the true interests of this country lie; and they support the RIGHT SIDE.

Political Meeting at Dundas.

REGRET AT THE WITHDRAWAL OF HON. MR. FERGUSON—NOMINATION OF OWEN AND McDUGALL.

PURSUANT to notice, a public political meeting was held in the Court House, Dundas, on the 25th inst. The meeting was called to order by appointing Mr. George Mackenzie to the chair, and the undersigned, Secretary.

The chairman, in a few appropriate remarks, introduced Hon. Mr. Ferguson to address the meeting.

Mr. Ferguson, on coming forward, said he was glad to meet so many electors. He then briefly sketched the extravagance of the Davies' Government; the actions and policy of the present one. He also spoke, to some extent, upon the action the present Government had taken in their attempt to abolish the Legislative Council, and to secure to the people of this Island their just share of the Fishery Award.

Mr. Ferguson, at the close of his address, returned his sincere thanks to the electors for the honor they had conferred upon him by twice electing him by acclamation, and intimated his intention to offer as a candidate for the Fort Augustus District, in the interest of the Liberal-Conservative Party.

Moved by Samuel McDonald, Esq., seconded by Alex. Martin, that John McDougall, Esq., be nominated as our representative.

Moved by Mr. Daniel McDonald, seconded by R. Bartlett, Esq., that the electors of this meeting concur with those of the other end of the district, in nominating Mr. George F. Owen, Cardigan, as a representative.—Motions carried unanimously.

Moved by Mr. D. McDonald, seconded by Mr. Morson—

Whereas, We have heard with regret that our late Representative, the Hon. D. Ferguson, has expressed his intention of not again offering as a candidate for this Electoral District, as he considers that the interest of the Liberal-Conservative Party will be better served by his accepting the nomination for the Third Electoral District of Queen's County; and

Whereas, While we regret the loss of so able and painstaking a Representative, we cannot help admiring Mr. Ferguson's unselfishness in contesting a district where he, in all probability, will meet with more opposition than he would meet with in this District;

Therefore Resolved, That the thanks of this meeting be tendered Mr. Ferguson, for his able representation of this District during the past term; and that we most earnestly hope that the Third Electoral District of Queen's County will accord him as unanimous a support in the future as this District has given him in the past.

Moved by Mr. D. Carman, Esq., seconded by John Morson, Esq., that a vote of thanks be tendered Mr. James E. McDonald, to which motion Mr. McDonald suitably replied.
