**Household Hints.**

To Handle Pickles after they are Taken out of the Brine.—A lump of alum put in the vinegar, and horseradish cut in strips, will make them crisp.

Apple Custard Pie.—Grate two large sweet apples, add one pint of sweet milk, one egg, sugar, salt and spice to taste. Bake with one crust.

Muffins.—A cupful of milk, two cupfuls of flour, one egg, a teaspoonful of cream of tartar, half a teaspoonful of saleratus, half a teaspoonful of sugar, salt well, and bake quickly.

Carrie Cogswell's Coffee Jelly.—A pint of nice clear coffee, pretty strong and hot, poured on to a box of Cox's gelatine, add a cupful of granulated sugar, dissolve and strain into your mold.

Mrs. Cogswell's Cream Cake.—A cupful each of sugar and sour cream, two large eggs, two cupfuls of flour, on full teaspoonful of cream of tartar, a scant teaspoonful of soda, flavor with lemon, one loaf.

Katie Bartlett's Raised Cake.—Two cupfuls of sugar, a cupful of butter, a cupful of milk, two eggs, a cupful of fresh yeast, one teaspoonful of soda, five cupfuls of flour, and a half a pound of chopped raisins.

Keeping Cider Sweet.—Heat the cider until it boils, pour into the bottles, which have been previously heated to prevent cracking. Cork tight, and seal immediately, as in canning fruit. The cider will keep unchanged for years.

Susie Hill's Ginger Cakes.—A cupful of a half of sugar, a cupful of butter or nice drippings, half a cupful of sour milk, a large spoonful of ginger, a teaspoonful of soda, flour enough to roll out thin, and bake quickly.

Mrs. Sherburne's Sponge Cake.—One cupful each of sugar and flour, three eggs, a tablespoonful of hot water with half a teaspoonful of soda dissolved in it, a teaspoonful of cream of tartar sifted in the flour, a pinch of salt. Beat well and bake.

Lemon Pie.—Take three raw potatoes each the size of a lemon, grate fine; three lemons, grate the yellow rind and squeeze the juice; add three cupfuls of sugar, three eggs, and a cupful of cold water, a little salt; will make four pies.

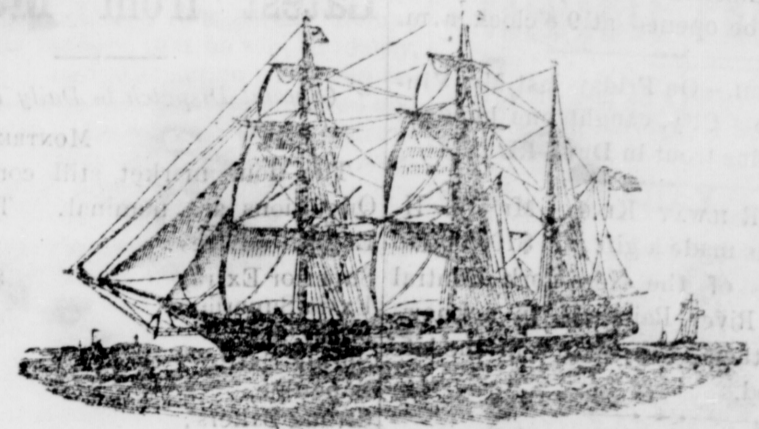

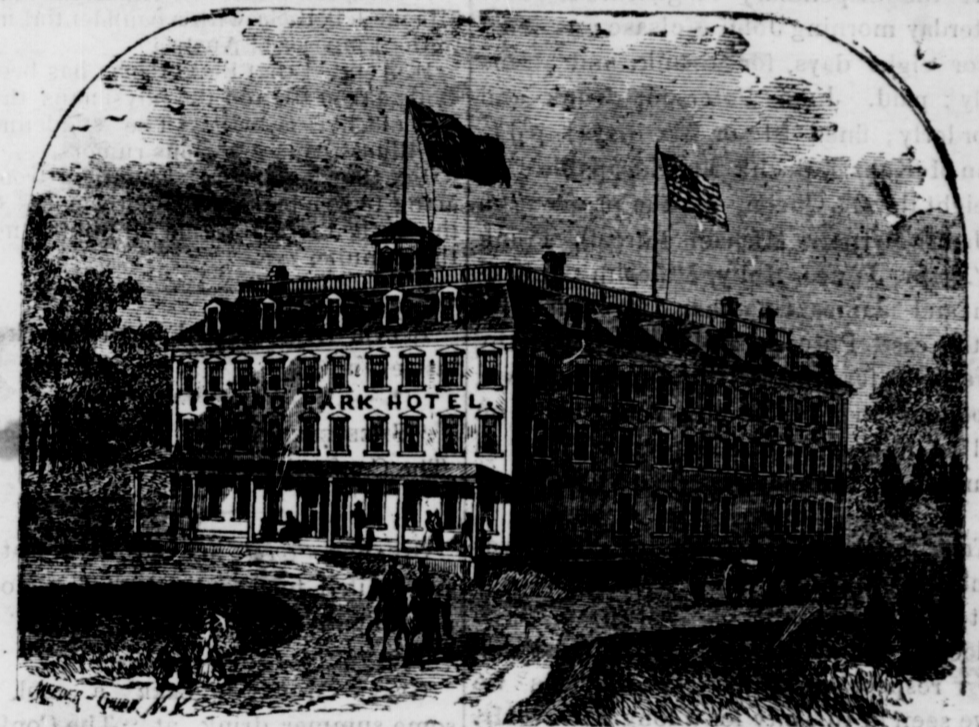
