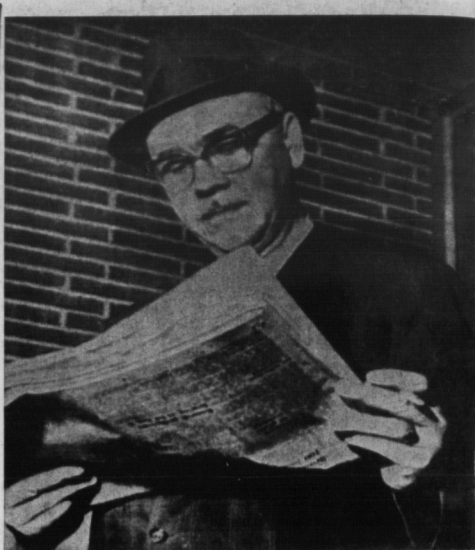

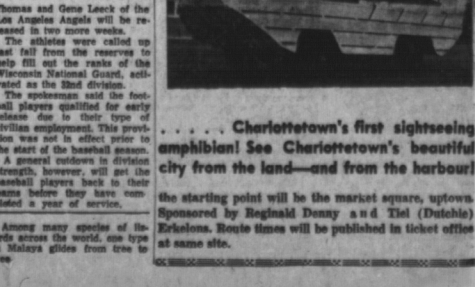

Highway Service By CNT Said 'Unfair Competition'

The P.E.I. Public Utilities Commission has adjourned for three weeks its hearing of the application of Canadian National Transport Ltd. for a licence for intra-provincial road transport service.

The commission adjourned the hearing after representatives of the members of the Maritime Motor Transport Association who are opposed to the granting of the licence, three charges of "unfair competition" at Canadian National Transport.

Keth MacKinnon, Charlottetown, a transport operator and director of the association, told the commission he objected to the establishment of such a service because it would be a service provided by a "state owned" operator receiving a subsidy which the truckers did not receive.

He said the CNR, parent of the CNT, sets a 20 per cent subsidy on rates and if the truckers could get the same subsidy it would help in improving equipment.

He said truckers are not buying equipment because of "uncertainties" in transportation. He explained one of the "uncertainties" meant the possibility of the CNT entering the road transport business.

Hudson Bowley, of Bowley's Transfer, said that if the CNT application was allowed it would be providing "unfair competition" to the truckers. He also said his firm would have to compete on a contract basis if the CNT would agree.
