

THE WAR!

AN IMPORTANT STATEMENT.

The Caucasian Insurrection.

(Special Despatch to the Daily Examiner.)

LONDON, June 5.

The Standard's Vienna correspondent asserts that he has evidence from an unimpeachable source that the Grand Duke Nicholas recently said that neither Bismarck nor Lord Derby would prevent the Russians from entering Constantinople, as the Germans entered Paris, only to leave again.

The insurrection in Caucasus is becoming more wide-spread and formidable.

The Russian reply to Lord Derby says the Czar wants no territory from Turkey; but only desires the autonomy of Bulgaria, Roumania and Servia.

OTTAWA, June 3.

Rev. Mr. Morden shot himself on the street, in London, Ont., on Saturday, dying instantly. He was sun-struck some time ago and lately disappointed in love. He was evidently insane when he committed the rash act.

Mr. Miall has been appointed Secretary to the Fisheries Commission.

OTTAWA, June 4.

The Supreme Court of the Dominion opened here to-day. There are twelve cases for argument on the docket. The full Bench was present. The Chief Justice entertains the attending counsel at dinner to-night. No decisions will be given on arguments of counsel till the term closes.

The details of the Castleton murder case are published. An old abortionist, named Smith, was employed. Under his hand Miss Wade died. Her body was then hidden in the woods, where it was found. Smith confessed the whole transaction. Her paramours, Weldon and Mallory, who employed Smith, are arrested. The latter had fled to Michigan. A post mortem examination was held and strange revelations are expected from the medical testimony. The feeling aroused in the neighborhood nearly ended in Weldon being lynched.

Information has been received here that Sitting Bull is at Wood Mountain, in Canadian territory. He must disarm and go on the reserves or leave. Our Indians will not tolerate him otherwise.

Mr. Blake returned to-night perfectly recovered in health.

FRANCE.

PARIS, June 4.

There is excitement in consequence of the arrest of Du Verdier, president of the Municipal Council. It is quite legal, but most unusual to arrest people for offences by writing or speech. Offenders in this way are generally left at liberty till the trial even without bail. In this case even bail was refused. Du Verdier denies the charges against him. The impression produced is bad, as the prisoner is popular with the lower classes. He is a man of education and independent means. He is charged with insulting Marshal McMahon and inciting civil war and assassination.

UNITED STATES.

St. Louis, June 4.

An express train, west from St. Louis, on the St. Louis and San Francisco railroad, was thrown from the track, and the engine and baggage car went down an embankment forty feet, and killed the engineer, fireman, and one passenger. The accident was caused by the removing of rails by five train wreckers who hoped to rob the passengers and express in the confusion. Several ineffectual shots were fired at the conductor while seeking assistance.

ROME.

LONDON, June 4.

A dispatch from Rome to the Times says that after the reception of the Italian pilgrims yesterday, the Pope who was somewhat indisposed, retired and would see no one else.

THE WAR.

LONDON, June 4.

The Russian headquarters have been advanced, and a great battle will soon take place.

The slaughter of 3800 Circassian cavalry out of 4000, who were ordered to make a reconnaissance in the direction of Kars, is reported, under the command of Monsha Pasha, who is also missing. The Russians surprised the village by night.

The Montenegrins lost 111 killed and 19 wounded. The Prince of Montenegro has gone to Duga Pass. The Montenegrins will endeavor to take Nisic before Suleiman Pasha can penetrate Duga Pass, held by insurgents.

LONDON, June 4.

A telegram from Athens says at a meeting of 8000 persons at Stadium last night, resolutions were adopted declaring the necessity for forming a ministry of leaders of the respective parties, so that discussions in the Chamber may be avoided, and that the Government carry forward military preparations promptly and energetically. A deputation nominated by the meeting waited upon the party leaders, and urged united action, and requested in each case that a distinct reply be made public.

A despatch from Orelak to the Times says that the Christian doctor who deserted from Treleioji gives a gloomy account of the Turkish army. 2400 men had died at Treleioji since the campaign began, that city being the hospital depot of the army now concentrated at Gatschks. At least one-half are suffering, chiefly from scurvy. Physicians and surgeons are subject to fatal outbreaks of Musulmans and are continually menaced and insulted, and never paid. 2000 men are sick at Morston, and deserters from Podgoritsa report the same condition of affairs as prevailing there. The troops are underfed, having nothing but the barest means of sustaining life, and are compelled to work continuously on the earthworks. The health of the Montenegrin forces is excellent.

A TIMELY ENQUIRY.

To the Editor of the Daily Examiner.

DEAR SIR:—I would like to know why it is that the Government do not appoint Trustees to manage the City Schools? A month or so ago they sent a peremptory note to the City Council ordering them to appoint three Trustees to co-operate with four appointed by the Government. The Council responded at once by appointing three Trustees. But the Government have not yet made their own appointments. Why this delay? It is admitted by all that the City Schools are sadly in need of reconstruction, and that the Trustees will have their hands full for some time. The Board of Trustees should be constituted at once, that they may be able to make arrangements for renting schoolrooms, engaging properly qualified Teachers, and other details necessary to the proper carrying out of the new School Law.
