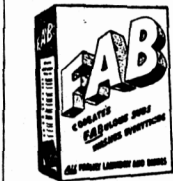

TIGHTEN CONTROLS

WASHINGTON, March 8.—(AP)—The United States Commerce Department today clamped tighter restrictions on shipment of strategic goods to Red China or other points from where they might be reshipped to countries in the Soviet sphere. It issued an order requiring licences to export some 600 goods of "strategic importance" to any place outside the western hemisphere, effective March 20.


