DRIVER NOT BLAMED

Jury Attributes Fatality To Collision With Vehicle

A coroner's jury found last night that 2-year-old Kathy Lynn Younker of Southport died in the P.E.I. Hospital June 16 as a result of injuries sustained when she was struck by a car driven by Donald Boyer Norton, Parkdale. No blame was attached to the driver.

The jury also made the following recommendations: that crosswalks be clearly marked on highways at all schools and in all villages in P.E.I.; that there be a 40 mile-per-hour speed limit in all school zones; and that the use of the crosswalks by all pedestrians be enforced.

Dr. H.A. MacMillan presided over the inquest, and read a signed statement from provincial pathologist Dr. John Craig, stating that he had performed a post-mortem examination of the Younker child on the morning of June 17 and found the cause of her death to be extensive lacerations to the right side of the liver causing severe hemorrhage. There was also a brain hemorrhage and broken ribs.

Four other witnesses were called. Kevin Joseph Trainor, 16, of TOKYO (AP) — A Japanese politician just back from Peking says Chinese Communist leader Mao Tse-tung is ailing but not seriously. Japanese newspapers report they say Kenzo Matsuura, a member of the ruling Liberal-Democratic party, told reporters in Toyama, western Japan, that there is no doubt Mao is ill. He added that he was told by Chinese he met in Peking that Mao is "not serious" Mao is 72.

Southport, testified that he had seen the car on the right side of the road, facing Kippure, when he saw Kathy Younker run from the other side of the road and saw her struck by a white Anglia car.

Mrs. Harry Younker, Southport, mother of the deceased, stated that she was outside her home, which is across the road from the Southport School, around seven o'clock on the evening of June 16. Kathy was outside with her, but slipped from her view. Mrs. Younker looked up to find the child at the edge of the pavement. She began to run across, Mrs. Younker stated to her, but it was a windy evening and Kathy seemed not to hear. When the car struck her, Kathy was apparently running across the road to the school grounds where other children in the Younker family were playing.

Donald Norton, 25, of Parkdale, testified that he had been driving his 1966 model Anglia at a speed of 35-40 m.p.h. toward Keppoch at about seven o'clock the evening of June 16 and had seen children playing behind the school. He saw the child running across the road from the left side, had braked, but had hit her.

RMP Constable I. W. Oland of the Charlottetown detachment stated that he had been at the accident scene, had seen no evidence that Mr. Norton had been drinking, but that he appeared to be in shock. The speed limit at the accident scene was 40 miles per hour and visibility was good. He measured the skid marks left by the car. They were 69 feet long, which he said from his past experience did not indicate the car had been travelling at excessive speed.

Dr. MacMillan then permitted the jury to retire for its verdict, leaving with them the suggestion that something must be done by law enforcement officers to protect pedestrians, especially children, from their own mistakes.
