THOUGHTS FOR OUR TIME

A rationalist is a man who claims he has the courage to face the new and the unknown with an open mind. If he looks upon his religious friends as people who possess an enviable peace of mind and a complete set of answers to all life's problems, while he does not hesitate to tell them of their advantages, he tells himself that it is cowardly and unworthy of human dignity for a man to face every new problem with an intelligence whose function has been restricted to the application of prefabricated solutions.

This grave reservation that is not expressed, should make the religious man think twice before accepting the compliments that are expressed. Indeed, if he is always complaining that his religious teachers do not give him modern solutions for modern problems, it is quite probable that he has already made the mistake of accepting a rationalistic evaluation of his own position.

How can this exclusion be construed as an assertion of human dignity? With regard to courage, it might be charged that since a rationalist lacks a personal and effective dedication to God, he fails to discipline his emotions and desires beyond what is required to keep up appearances in society. The result is that his precious intellectual freedom becomes a freedom from truth and is dissipated in justifying his lack of determination and in rationalizing his feeble submission to the drift of his undisciplined inclinations.

These charges and counter-charges go on and on and they are futile unfair on both sides. A man can be a rationalist in good faith, and he can display great courage in upholding human dignity and intellectual honesty. Intellectual honesty in turn compels the rationalist to admit that it is unfair to compare the maturity of his own position, with an immature stage of religious development.

It is true that when a man begins to serve the God of Revelation, he is like a boy who is expected to carry out his father's commands whether or not he understands the reasons for them. The boy's blind service, however, is the apprenticeship in which he acquires the experience which will one day bring him to the goal of intelligent co-operation.

Similarly, in our religious life, blind service begets the experience which gives us insights into the wisdom of God. These insights, however, are far from

being ready-made solutions to our problems; in fact, they complicate our lives and distress us because they make us aware of the imperfections and deficiencies of our actions.

It was all so simple when we had more zeal than knowledge, and could dedicate our actions wholeheartedly to the service of God, without being worried about their intrinsic value. Now in moments of truth it becomes clear to us that when we uphold truth and justice, we are against love and mercy; and when we are indulgent, we tolerate injustice and falsehood.

CAN DESTROY ZEAL

This knowledge of our imperfection and guilt can destroy our zeal and arrest our spiritual growth with a paralyzing despair. It takes courage for a man to hunger and thirst after justice when it is brought home to him again and again that the chief culprit is himself.

It takes courage for a man to persevere in carrying out his obligations as well as he can when he is fully aware that his best efforts amount to no more than a patient and vigilant waiting for God's gift of wisdom, a gift which he knows will come to him only when God wishes to grant it, and a gift which certainly will not be granted before he knows not how much suffering has purified his soul and made him worthy to receive it.

Thus, the man who stands on the threshold of spiritual maturity is not a coward who abdicates his dignity as a man, by closing his mind to the new and the unknown. On the contrary, he is a man who struggles courageously to keep his mind open to all the complicating and incriminating insights he must live with before he is worthy to taste the peace and joy of that wisdom which will not only make him a credit to the human race, but will also earn him a place of honor in the household of God.

Much Jersey Outsell All At The Royal Winter Fair

The veteran Jersey breeder of North River, Prince Edward Island, Edmond Mutch gave another demonstration at the Royal Winter Fair in Toronto last week of his ability to breed high class Jerseys. His 2 year old heifer River North Pansy's Bright, grand champion at Amherst, won the 2 year old dry class, and sold in the Sale of Stars for \$4,500.00.

While Edmond Mutch has done much for Maritime Jerseys, Campbell MacKay, Kingshurst Jersey Farm, Rothesay, N.B. This is the highest price realized for any animal at the time of the Royal. This is the first time this honour has come to the Maritimes. The dam of this famous heifer is one of Mr. Mutch's champion cows - Maid's Pansy with a record of 16,621 lbs. of milk and 846 lbs. of fats.

However, this is not the first time Edmond, as he is known far and wide, has made the headlines. In 1952 he showed the grand champion bull at the Royal Winter Fair - River North Jester's Dreamer, a bull he bred himself, while in 1953 he showed Edgelea Beacon Jester Standard, to win Grand Championship at the Royal. This same bull has reserve grand champion honours in very strong competition. He is the sire of the \$4,500.00 cow that Edmond sold at the Royal, the highest priced Jersey female ever produced and sold in the Maritime provinces.

Incidentally, the first class judged at the Royal is the junior bull calves, and the first red ribbon handed out went to Beacon's Basil shown by Francis A. Morrison, St. Peter's Bay. This calf is a son of Mr. Mutch's Edgelea bull. In senior bull calves, Edmond won 4th in a class of 27. In senior yearling bulls, Edmond had another winner, while in the 2 year old bulls Fred Kitson, New Wiltshire, P.E.I., won 2nd on Wiltshire Briar's Beacon Jester Standard who was 2nd in his class to last year's Royal Winter Fair grand champion, Farmer Brown. And Farmer Brown this year succeeded in holding to the champion ship honours, closely followed by Edmond's bull that was later made reserve senior and reserve grand champion.
