CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — Apparently unperturbed despite a 10th postponement, astronaut John Glenn Jr. continued training Friday for his round-the-world flight, set now for Tuesday at the earliest. Glenn was sleeping — and primed for a try Friday — when his flight was cancelled again due to bad weather in the Atlantic where his capsule might come down.

But they were looking for evidence he had been buried alive; such as a shift in the position of the body inside the casket. "But he was just the way he was," Klassen said. "He hadn't moved."
