FROM HALIFAX.—The Fastnet arrived from Halifax via intermediate ports at nine o'clock this morning and will leave on return this evening about six o'clock. Rev. Mr. Campbell and daughter will be passengers to Port Hawkesbury.

DIAMOND JUBILEE CONTINGENT.—A large photo of the Canadian contingent at present in London, is to be seen in the show window of Haszard & Moore, Sunnyside. In the front rank is our Major Longworth. SEVERE THUNDER STORM.—A very severe thunder and lightning storm passed over Dundas and vicinity this morning about 11 o'clock. The Court House and a barn belonging to Mrs. Rodrick McLeod were both struck and severely damaged. The storm did not last a very long time and we are glad to hear that no one was hurt.

METHODIST CONFERENCE.—The ministerial session of the New Brunswick and P. E. Island Methodist conference opened at Fredericton on Wednesday. At roll call some sixty-five clergymen responded. At the ministers' session in the afternoon, charges affecting the ministerial standing of Rev. Mr. E. Stey of P. E. Island were investigated.


BAD ACCIDENT.—The 2-year old daughter of Mr. John Rayner, Travelers Rest, accidentally fell into a cellar on Wednesday last and was very seriously injured. In falling the child's head came in contact with a garden rake, a piece of which penetrated the skull. Dr. McPhail was called in. At latest accounts the child was progressing favorably and hopes were entertained that she would recover.

THE COBAN.—The steamer Coban arrived from Montreal about eleven o'clock last night bringing a general cargo and 14 r and trip passengers. She left this afternoon for St. John's via Sydney, taking two passengers—R. Crosby and D. M. Ferguson—to St. John's. Her outward cargo included 50 head cattle, 250 sheep, 5 horses and a large quantity of hay, oats and potatoes.

ASSAULT CASE.—Action for an assault occasioning actual bodily harm. William Webster, of Fort Angus, has instituted proceedings before H. James Palmer, Stipendiary Magistrate, for Queen's County, against James H. Cumisky, Speaker of the Legislative Assembly, charging him with an assault and battery occasioning actual bodily harm. The preliminary examination commences tomorrow morning at ten o'clock before Magistrate Palmer, in the Grand Jury Room.

HER UMBRELLA.

What Her Handling of It Proclaimed to the Observing Man.

Two men who sat near the window of a downtown hotel a few days ago whiled away the time by watching the women go by and commenting on their umbrellas.

The storm had abated about an hour before and the sun had peered through a rift in the clouds, but for all that the first pedestrian went stalking past with her umbrella still held aloft.

"That woman," said one of the men, "is as patient as Job. She is not a student absentmindedly poring over book lore, but a housekeeper who is so taken up with thoughts of what she is going to get for supper that she doesn't know it has stopped raining. What is more, she is thoroughly unselfish. People who forget to lower their umbrellas when the sun begins to shine always are. That girl just behind her who has already taken time to fold her umbrella neatly, even though it is soaking wet, is going to be an old maid. She is narrow minded too. The next one has bound the folds down, but it looks uneven and bulging. 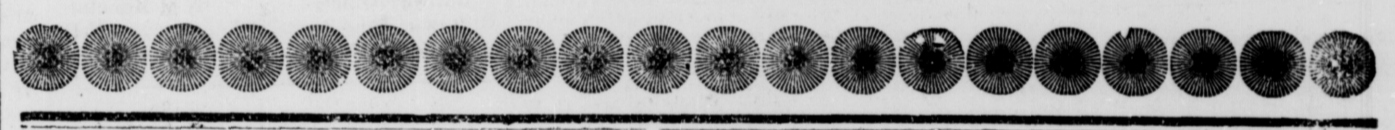
