

Alouettes Beat Ti-Cats Ottawa Blasts Argos

The great Hal Patterson, in another of those performances that has earned him with proper justification the nickname of Mr. Wonderful, scored two touchdowns as he sparked Montreal Alouettes to a 14-0 victory over Hamilton Tiger-Cats in their Big Four football game in Hamilton Saturday.

A crowd of 21,115 in Civic Stadium saw Prince Hal bring the Alouettes from behind in the dying minutes with a dazzling touchdown off a pass from quarterback Sam Etcheberry. It wiped on an 8-7 Hamilton lead and gave the Alouettes a victory that left them tied with Ottawa Rough Riders for first place, each with five wins and two losses.

DOORMATS AGAIN

The Riders were busy in Ottawa making it seven straight victories in two seasons over the winless Toronto Argonauts, defeating the Big Four doormats 40-21 before 16,506 spectators.

Ever since Frank Clair, former Argos coach, took over the reins of the Ottawa club last year, the Riders have won every game against Argos. It was Toronto's seventh loss, against no wins, at the half-way mark of the Big Four schedule.

Hamilton's defeat dropped them into third place from a three way tie for first. Ticats, two points behind the leaders, play in Ottawa Saturday.

The Alouettes appeared headed for defeat until Patterson broke loose again after being held in check since the early minutes of

the game when he got his first touchdown to send the Montreal club out in front 7-0.

The Tiger-Cats overcame that lead with a first-quarter single by Cam Fraser and a converted third-quarter touchdown by Gerry McDougall, who led their powerful ground attack as he set an individual game rushing record of 220 yards. The old mark of 202 yards was set by Corky Tharp of Argonauts in 1955 against Ottawa.

Bill Bewley converted both Montreal touchdowns and Steve Oneschuk booted the conversion on Hamilton's lone touchdown.

TORONTO DISORGANIZED

In Ottawa a Rough Riders jumped to a quick 20-0 lead in the first quarter, mainly as result of miscues by the disorganized Toronto club, and made it 37-7 at half time.

Argonauts appeared to have been fired up by coach Hampton Pool during the half time rest, because the Double Blue came back with a solid team effort in the third quarter. They scored two touchdowns to come within halting distance of Riders, 33-21 going into the last quarter.

Fredy Wyant, former Washington Redskins quarterback who joined Argos earlier this week to replace Tom Dubinski, proved himself capable of throwing accurate but hard passes. However, the left-handed passer had trouble with his receivers.

Quarterback Tom Dimitroff scored Ottawa's first touchdown in the second minute off an Argo fumble. George Brancato took a

pass late in the quarter and with one second to go in the period, defensive tackle Joe Upton scooped up Gerry Doucette's fumble in the Argo backfield and clawed, crawled and pulled himself over the line for another touchdown.

Riders fourth was scored on a plunge by fullback Tom Lewis. Wyant, the Argo quarterback, plunged over from the one-yard line for a touchdown in the second quarter. But Neyland Moll got that touchdown back two minutes later on a 27-yard pass from Ledyard and a one-handed catch in the end zone.

Bobby Kuntz scored a touchdown for Argos in the third quarter on a 40-yard pass from Wyant then intercepted a pass at mid-field to start a TD march that ended when Corky Tharp, former Argo who returned to the club this week from New York Giants, scampered over from 14 yards out.

Lewis scored his second touchdown in the last quarter on a short plunge.

Gary Schneider converted four Ottawa touchdowns and Bart Moll three for Toronto.

BEARS KEEP LEAD

Sarnia Golden Bears maintained their hold on first place in the Ontario Rugby Football Union Saturday night with a 40-0 victory over the winless Toronto Beavers before 2,000 fans. It was Toronto's seventh straight loss.

Sarnia led 20-0 at the half and 33-0 going into the final quarter.

Yanks And Braves Finish With Eight Game Leads

Both the New York Yankees and Milwaukee Braves finished the 1957 season with eight-game leads after Sunday's final play and the New York Giants bade farewell to the Polo Grounds by losing to Pittsburgh.

Detroit clinched fourth place in the American by whipping Kansas City 7-4 for Jim Bunning's 20th victory and Baltimore finished fifth by handing Washington's Chuck Stobbs his 20th defeat, 7-3.

Ted Williams, 39, became the oldest man to win a batting championship when he boosted his mark to .338 with two hits for the Boston Red Sox in their 3-2 wound up sixth, their first second division finish since 1946.

TWO-RUN HOMER

Milwaukee came up with two in the ninth to top Cincinnati 4-3 and Chicago managed a seventh-place tie with Pittsburgh by hitting St. Louis 5-3 as Ernie Banks had a perfect five-hit day. Pittsburgh clubbed New York 9-1 before 11,606 at the Polo Grounds and Ed Bouchee hit a two-run homer to give Philadelphia a 2-1 margin over Brooklyn.

Idle Stan Musial of St. Louis wound up with the National League batting title at .351 and Hank Aaron led in both home runs with 44, and runs batted in with 132.

Roy Sievers of Washington topped the American with 42 homers and 114 runs batted in as Mickey Mantle of New York failed to repeat in any of the three departments that he led in 1956.

WINNER IN RELIEF

Williams had a single and double before he left the game at Boston in the third inning. Jimmy Piersall, Williams' replacement, won the game with a seventh-inning triple off loser Johnny Kuck.

Bunning pitched shutout ball for 3-2-3 innings in relief against the A's after replacing starter Duke Maas. He had failed in

three starts to win his 20th but finally did the job from the bullpen. Billy Pierce of Chicago was the only other 20-game winner in the American and Milwaukee's Warren Spahn, with 21 victories, the only member of the exclusive club in the National.

Baltimore set a major league record by playing its 80th errorless game. The Orioles scored four in the 10th to hand Washington its seventh straight defeat and 17th in its last 20 games. Sievers appeared only as a pinch hitter and walked.

Dick Brown and Joe Altobelli paced Cleveland's 11-hit attack against Chicago.

GET 15 HITS

Milwaukee turned out 45,000 strong, boosting the Braves record attendance to 2,215,404 in their final regular season game. Felix Mantilla's single climaxed the ninth-inning rally.

The Cubs slugged Cardinal pitching for 15 hits with Banks showing the way. Both Chicago and Pittsburgh finished with identical 62-92 records in their seventh-place tie. Moe Drabowsky was the Cub winner.

Bob Friend held the Giants to six hits in their final Polo Grounds showing while Frank Thomas and John Powers hit homers among the 17 Pirates hit. Bouchee's homer was all the Phils needed to top the Dodgers, giving Seth Morehead the decision over Roger Craig. Morehead a relief pitcher most of the year, gave up only four hits.

Mantle And Skowron Still Are Questionable Factors

NEW YORK (AP)—The physical condition of Bill Skowron and Mickey Mantle still made them questionable world series factors Sunday as both New York Yankees and Milwaukee Braves finished regular season play.

Some definite word can be expected today when the Yanks work out at Yankee Stadium in a tuneup for Wednesday's series opener in the same park.

Although Skowron, troubled by an aching back, reported he is improved and can move more freely the first baseman still is not sure whether he will be able to play.

Mantle—bothered by leg ailments—has shown some improvement, says Dr. Sidney Gaynor, Yankee club physician, but still feels some pain when he twists his left leg. Mantle probably will play, especially if Milwaukee does the expected and starts left-hander Warren Spahn.

The switcher has no trouble when he bats right-handed.

With a break from the weather, the opener probably will draw between 65,000 and 70,000 fans. All reserved and box seats have been sold. The Yanks are selling standing room tickets at \$4.20 each and will put on sale 14,000 bleacher seats at \$2.10 each early on the day of each game.

Manager Casey Stengel's opening lineup for the Yankees, of course, hinges on the condition of Skowron and Mantle. If Skowron can play, Elston Howard probably will be in left and Tony Kubek or Andy Carey on third. If Skowron is out of the lineup, Howard may go to first with Kubek to left. In the unlikely event that Mantle can't make it, Kubek, a four-year rookie, will be in centre.

The Howard-on-first-base possibility developed during the weekend in Boston where Stengel used the catcher-outfielder or first in both the Friday and Saturday games. He handled all chances faultlessly.

Stengel is expected to announce Whitey Ford (11-5) as his Wednesday starter and possibly Bobby Shantz (11-5) for the second. He probably will save the righthanders for Milwaukee.

Spahn (21-11) is a sure opening game starter for the Braves with Lew Burdette (17-9) the likely choice for Thursday's second game in the best-of-seven series.
