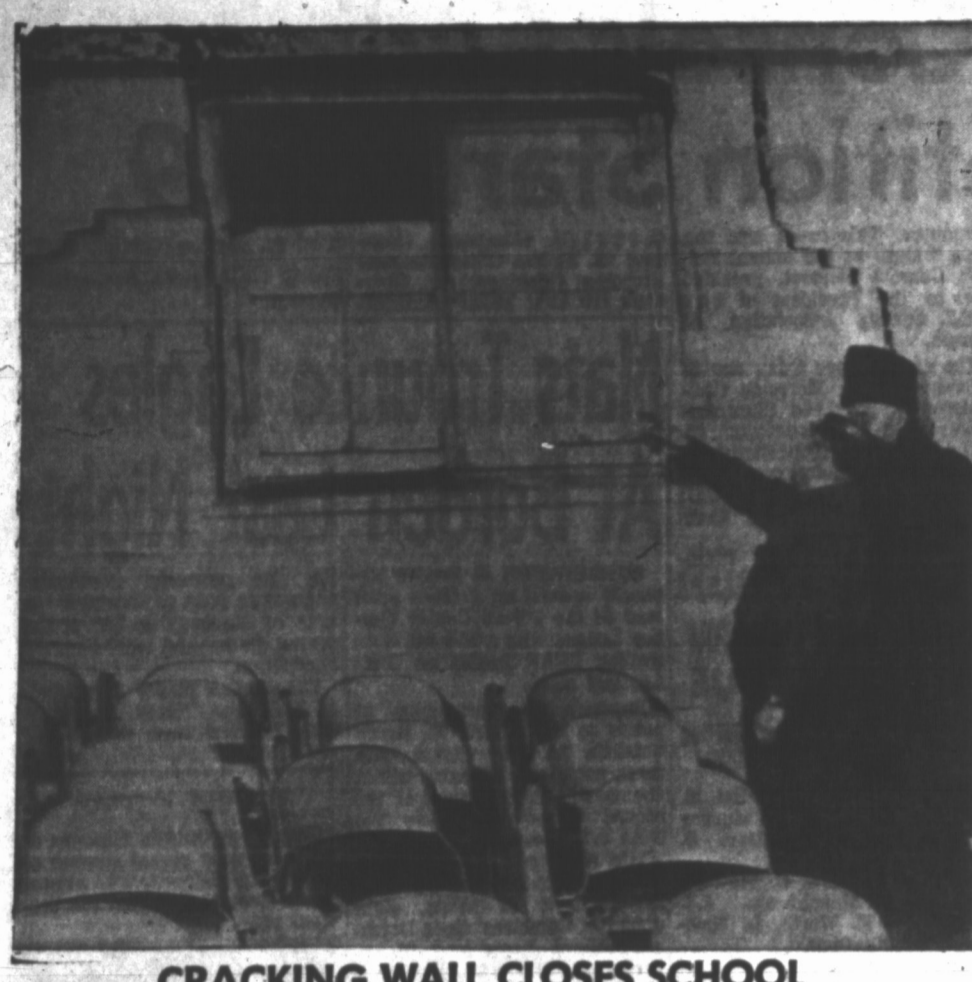

Report On Pension Plan Is Said Almost Completed

OTTAWA (CP)—The parliamentary committee set up to study the Canada Pension Plan has completed its report but details won't be known until it is tabled in the Commons, probably next week.

The 36-member committee, drawn from the Senate and the Commons, held 51 sittings, most of them during the parliamentary recess, to hear the criticisms and praises of various organizations and individuals.

A majority of the submissions were critical. Led by insurance companies, their officials, and private actuaries, the proposed plan was blasted on a series of fronts.

The most frequent complaint was the plan does the least for those who need it most. In most cases, criticism was coupled with a suggestion the government replace the plan with expanded flat-rate benefits under the old age security program.

But the plan received approval in principle from a number of influential organizations, including the Canadian Labor Congress, The Canadian Welfare Council and the Canadian Teachers' Federation.

BRIEF CAUSES STIR
The brief that easily caused the biggest stir during the three weeks of public hearings came from the Ontario government.

It sought several major changes, and some Liberal members of the committee criticized them privately as being more political than practical.

The Ontario suggestions would result in an extra \$25 a month being paid from the Canada Pension Plan fund to all Canadians receiving the \$75-a-month old age security benefit, and the establishment of a minimum \$25 monthly pension under the plan itself.

The contributions for the plan would be collected from the first dollar of earnings, as opposed to exempting the first \$600, and the plan would come to maturity in 20 years instead of the proposed 10.

While committee members, sworn to secrecy, would not reveal anything about their report, it was considered highly unlikely that any of Ontario's major recommendations would be adopted.

ALREADY DOVETAILED
The Canada Pension Plan already has been dovetailed with the proposed Quebec plan, and any serious alterations would mean a new round of negotiations.

The Quebec government was insistent a \$60 exemption base be established, so provincial farmers would be exempt. The province was also anxious that the plan provide a relatively big fund for investment purposes. The \$25 monthly payment recommended by the Ontario government would take a heavy bite from the fund.

The 10-year maturity period was gained by the federal government in its negotiations with Quebec, which preferred a 20-year period. It was thought unlikely Ottawa now would be willing to give this up.

The committee, under the joint chairmanship of A. J. P. Cameron (L - Toronto High Park) and Senator Muriel Fergusson (L - New Brunswick), did not make a clause-by-clause study of the massive, complex.

pension plan bill. This will be done in Parliament.

Considering the partisan changes in the committee, it was thought likely the plan might take a political buffeting in the Commons before it gets final approval.

SOME ARE CRITICAL
Some Conservative committee members, who are highly critical of the plan, say they were put in an impossible position by having to approve it in principle before it was studied by a committee. It was given unanimous approval on second reading in the Commons.

While the committee's report is unlikely to recommend any changes that would affect the fundamentals of the plan, it is probable some minor amendments will be suggested.

One of these might concern the "drop-out years"—the number of years in which contributors can have their incomes left out of the benefit calculations.

The maximum drop-out period in the bill is 10 per cent of a 47-year working lifetime. By increasing this 10 per cent, the plan could be improved for those continuing in school after the age of 18—the plan's entry age—and for those subject to sickness, unemployment or early retirement.

Government officials have hinted changes in the drop-out years would be acceptable.

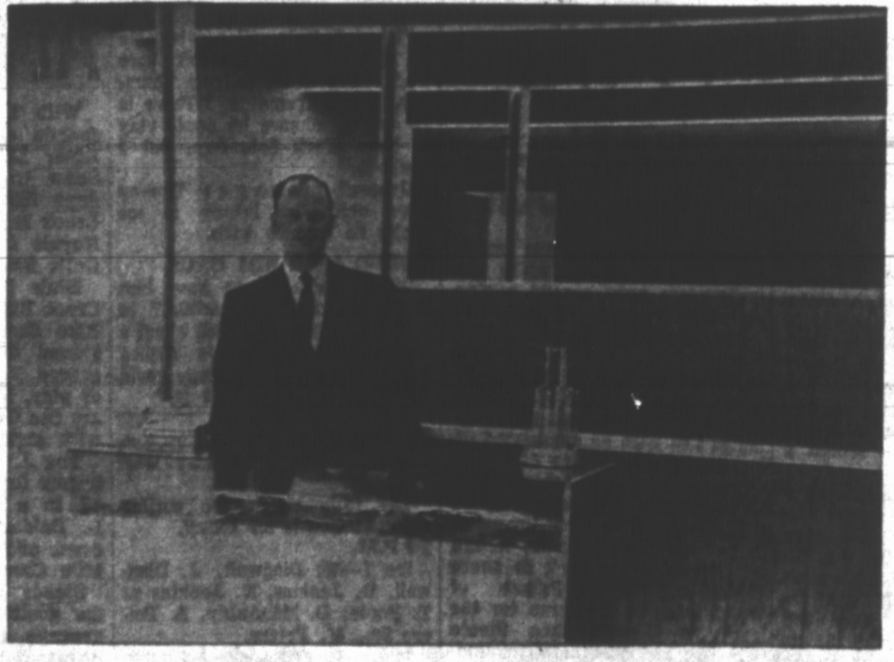
