

Suspended Sentence Is Given On Theft Of Money Charge

Apparatus for sentence on the charge of theft, Maxvord Court, Charlotte, N.B., was given a two-year suspended sentence by Magistrate A. J. Haslam in city court Wednesday.

Costume was a charge with the theft of money, exceeding \$50, the property of the Canada Food Ltd. Conditions of the suspension were that the accused not enter into a bond in the amount of \$5,000 and two sureties of \$2,500; also that restitution should be paid to the firm within the two-year period.
