DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

TARTE-McGHEEVEY MATTER

Tunnel Correspondence.

Davies and McLean Heard From.

OTTAWA, June 25.

In the Tarte McGreevey case yesterday, Mr. Perley, Chief Engineer of Public Works, was examined. His evidence was honest and straightforward, and proved conclusively that much of the testimony already presented was perverted and false.

In moving for correspondence regarding the tunnel, Davies made an excellent speech from a P. E. I. standpoint, avoiding all party politics, stating the Island's case powerfully and made an admirable impression.

Cockburn, one of the Toronto members, who is the present butt of the House, and who had evidently more than he could carry, attempted in reply to show that the Island was indebted annually to the Dominion by six hundred thousand dollars. His remarks create a great amusement when he said that only seventy passengers crossed to and from the Island all winter.

John McLean asked him if he was not referring to the number of commercial travellers from Ontario who call down in winter time.

When six o'clock came the debate was not concluded.

When it is resumed, McLean will speak. The prohibition debate occupied the evening session.

Foster moved an amendment providing for the appointment of a Royal Commission to obtain information upon the whole question, which was carried by a vote of one hundred and seven to eighty-eight. The Opposition voted solidly against it, as did also three Government supporters.

Davies favored plebiscite and read a copy of a resolution he had intended to move. A good deal of noise and personal talk was indulged in during the debate. Several members were under the weather.

Joncas has returned to his Conservative allegiance.

The Sugar Trade.

OTTAWA, June 25.

Already there is a boom in the sugar trade. The tariff changes mean an immediate reduction of one and three-quarter cents per pound on yellow sugar and two cents on granulated.

The Medical Bill.

SIR.—We have been refused a copy of the new Medical Bill. Yet it is possible to discuss one or two points. The promoters of the Bill profess to follow the English law. The formation of a Medical Council is an important feature in both bills. In the English law, considering the important duties to be performed, great pains have been taken to make the Council as effective, impartial and able as possible. The number is thirty. Of these, five are members or appointees of Her Majesty's Privy Council, and twenty are nominees of the great universities, as Oxford and other teaching bodies, and only five are left to be chosen by the doctors. It is plain that the aim was to obtain a board of the very highest character for ability and impartiality. All character for ability and impartiality. All this is quite in accord with the spirit of free British constitutionalism, viz: when the public interests and private rights are to be adjudicated, always to provide a tribunal at which every person who is compelled to appear before it, shall have full confidence in the administration of justice. Now consider the nature of the board provided for in this bill. The mode of its formation, viz: by election exclusively, and the lack of the proper training of the men from whom the selection is made, are objectionable in the highest degree. On a Council thus constituted, the bill proposes to devolve the highest and most responsible duties, viz: the power to impose taxation on the doctors, viz: to be compelled to render an account of the expenditure—the uncontrolled power to confer somewhat arbitrary licenses to practice the power to refuse licenses to the most skillful—the power to arraign before their fellow practitioners, very likely their rivals, on charges of professional misconduct—to put their own interpretation on those charges, and the interpretation on those charges, and the power to ruin them by taking away their character, and means of livelihood.

A man's registered diploma is to him what a farmer's farm is to the farmer. A modified appeal is provided, but this does not remedy

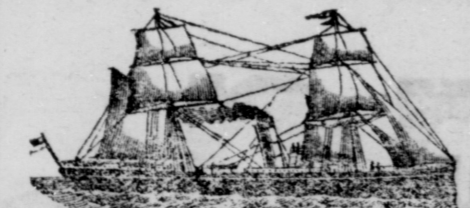
the evil. There is not the slightest security that the men to be elected will have the necessary judicial education, or the impartiality to perform properly the important duties. No such power as this bill contemplates should be given to any medical council. The medical men of this country are the equals professionally of those of our neighboring countries, but they cannot discharge properly and should not be allowed to attempt to discharge the functions contemplated by this bill.

Part of the council should be appointed. Only a moderate power should be delegated to them. Make them responsible in some way for the discharge of their actual duties. Let legislation be postponed so as to give time to consider.
