Rear-Admiral Bidwell Has Distinguished Career

Rear-Admiral Roger E. S. Bidwell, CBE, CD, RCN, is Flag Officer Atlantic Coast, Maritime Commander East Coast, and NATO Commander Canadian Atlantic Sub-Area with headquarters in Halifax, Nova Scotia.

Born Sept. 14, 1899 in Peterborough, Ontario, he came to Canada in 1902 when a child and attended Bishop's College at Lennoxville, Quebec, where his father, Rev. E. J. Bidwell, later Anglican Bishop of Ontario from 1915 to 1926, was headmaster. He attended St. Alban's School, Brackley, Ontario.

Rear-Admiral Bidwell entered the Royal Naval College of Canada at Halifax in 1915. He was posted to sea after the Halifax Explosion of 1917 wrecked the college and saw active service in the First World War in HMS Canada, now the battleship "Albatross" of the Chilean Navy.

After the war he served alternately with the Royal Navy and the Royal Canadian Navy. Promoted sub-lieutenant in 1922, lieutenant in 1924 and lieutenant-commander in 1929, he commanded the minesweeper "Arcturion" and the destroyers HMCS "Champlain" (1930) and "St. Laurent" (1937).

He graduated from the Royal Naval Staff College at Greenwich, England, in 1938 and was posted as Staff Officer Operations in the command of HMS "Arcturion" at Somerville, then Commander-in-Chief of the Royal Navy's East Indies Division.

Promoted commander in 1939, he became Director of Operations in the command of HMS "Arcturion" in 1941 and went to Newfoundland as Staff Officer and subsequently chief of staff to the flag officer Newfoundland Force, in the command of HMS "Arcturion" in Dec. 1941 and transferred in the rank Jan. 1, 1943. In April, 1943, he was appointed Chief of Staff (Operations and Intelligence) to the Commander-in-Chief, Canadian Atlantic Coast, and served in her as commanding officer for the rest of the war and afterwards, when she transported 6000 Canadian service men and women to Europe. He was promoted Admiral Bidwell delivered her to United States authorities at Norfolk, Virginia, in January, 1946. One month later he was appointed Vice-Commander of the Canadian Atlantic Sub-Area, under the command of Admiral Bidwell.

King in 1947 he attended the Imperial Defence College in the United Kingdom and on September 1 of the following year he was appointed Chief of Naval Staff (Plans) and a Member of the Naval Staff Committee. Rear-Admiral Bidwell was awarded the United States Legion of Merit, Degree of Commander in May, 1946. One month later he was awarded the CBE "for continued initiative, leadership and distinguished service." On November 21, 1951, he was promoted to his present rank of Rear-Admiral and appointed Flag Officer Atlantic Coast. In April, 1952, he received the NATO Commander of the Canadian Atlantic Sub-Area, under the command of Admiral Bidwell.

In June, 1953, Admiral Bidwell was appointed Commander of the six-ship Canadian Coronet Squadron which participated in the Coronet Cruise to the West Indies and the Caribbean 30 years ago as a sub-lieutenant.

The degree was conferred at a special convocation on Thursday, November 28th, at which the new chancellor of the University, Dr. H. Ray Miller, was also officially installed.

In honouring Admiral Bidwell, the president said, "We pay tribute to him first as a well known and beloved citizen of Canada who has served his country faithfully and well for over forty years. Son of a man who became bishop of Ontario, he is the son of an old Anglican family and has always been a strong churchman. The record of his service to the Royal Canadian Navy and to his country must indeed be unique. Can any other officer claim to have had so many important staff positions in such a period of service?"

We at this university have had a close connection with the Royal Canadian Navy. During Second World War the buildings of this institution became commissioned as H.M.C.S. King's, and our operation as a university on this campus ceased until the end of the war. We cherish our connection with the senior service, and it gives us great pleasure to recognize and honour the accomplishments of such a distinguished naval officer and Canadian, Admiral Bidwell."

LET'S EAT Use Left Over Turkey Meat With Onion Scallop

"There are still some fragments of turkey left. Make them remarked the Chef. They are moist and fresh because I wrapped the turkey in aluminum foil before refrigerating it."

I suggest cooking this turkey meat in an onion scallop to give it an entirely new flavor."

Measurements are level reapers proportioned to serve 4 to 6.

Turkey Onion Scallop: Peel 4 onions, grate 1/2 lb. of butter, 1/2 lb. of cheese, 1/2 lb. of bread crumbs, 1/2 lb. of onion, 1/2 lb. of pepper, 1/2 lb. of salt, 1/2 lb. of sugar.

Onion-Orange Salad (An Original Combination): Arrange alternating slices of peeled oranges in thin sliced onion on lettuce. Top with salt and pepper. Serve with French dressing. Garnish with ripe olives.

Mustard-Butter from the Chef Blend 3 tbsp. room-soft butter or margarine with 1 tbsp. table mustard. Use when cooking ham, steak, veal, lamb chops or beef steaks.
