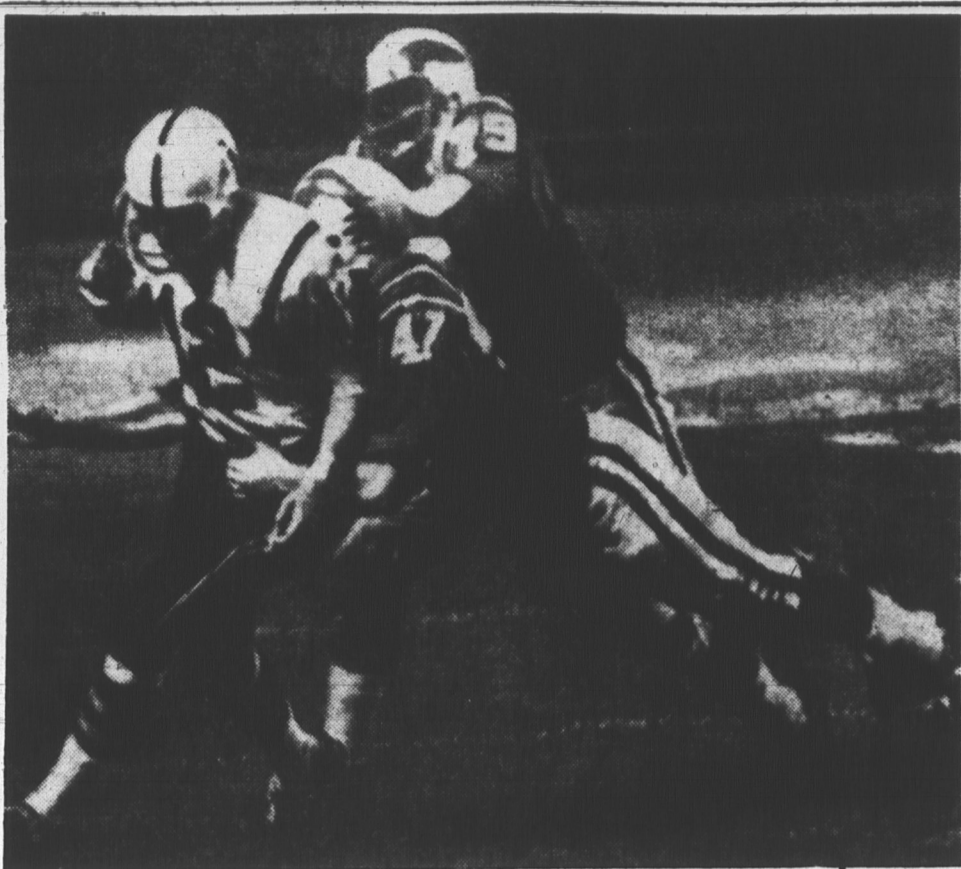


Hamilton Ti-Cats Stomp Stamps

HAMILTON (CP) — Hamilton Tiger-Cats moved into a first place tie in the Eastern Football Conference with a 21-3 victory over Calgary Stampeders in a Canadian Football League interlocking game Saturday night.
 The loss was Calgary's third in a row without a win and left the Stampeders in last place in the Eastern Football Conference. Hamilton now has two victories against no defeats, the same as Ottawa Rough Riders with whom the Tiger-Cats share first place in the East.
 The Tiger-Cats used their patented rock-ribbed defence, a pair of touchdown passes from Frank Cosentino to Tommy Grant—and another touchdown pass from Cosentino to veteran Hal Patterson for the victory. Don Sutherland kicked two con-

verts and added a single point when a field goal attempt in the third quarter went wide from the Calgary 23.
 Larry Robinson got Calgary's points on a 43-yard field goal in the first quarter.
 Hamilton waited until late in the second quarter to get its first touchdown, then added two more in the third quarter, along with Sutherland's single.
DEFENCE DOMINATES
 The defensive squads, particularly Hamilton's, dominated the rest of the game.
 The Stamps, who went into the game without halfback Ted Woods, out with a torn Achilles tendon, and defensive end and linebacker Jim Furlong, out with a broken right ankle, lost the services of fullback Lovell Coleman in the second quarter. Coleman, who did much of Calgary's ball carrying early in the game, left with a leg injury and did not return.

Canadian Effort At Games Is Strongest In 32 Years

KINGSTON, Jamaica (CP) — Half-miler Abby Hoffman of Toronto got the gold medal she never expected. Kenya's kipchoge Keino tucked off a record 3:55.3 mile for a unique distance double and four Trinidad sprinters brought the eighth British Empire Games to a fitting close Saturday with a world record in the mile relay.
 Miss Hoffman won the women's 800-yard gold medal in a race that was one of the most dramatic of the Games. The 17-year-old pepper pot killed her opposition with a blistering stretch run that left one rival near complete collapse.
 Her time of 2:04.3 was a personal best and it helped set aside sad memories of the miserable time she had in her two previous major international competitions.
 Her gold medal was the 14th for Canada in the Games, the highest tally in 32 years, and helped move the Canadians one notch up in the final team standing to a solid third place.
 The Commonwealth gathering of 1,037 athletes from 35 countries competed for eight days and nights in 110 events involving nine sports, and when it was over it was "Rule Britannia" for the fifth time.
CANUCKS HURT AUSSIES
 England won 33 gold medals to regain her Commonwealth role as the top athletic power from Australia. The powerful showing of Canada's 108-member team cut deeply into Australia's medal winnings of four years ago. The Australians finished second with 23 golds compared with 36 in 1962.
 The Canadian team won a total of 57 medals, 26 more than a 72-member squad picked up four years ago at Perth, Australia.
 No Canadian team has been able to do that well since the second Games were held in 1934 in London. Canada won 16 golds that year.
 As the host country, Australia won 105 medals at Perth. At Kingston, the Australians won 72, a net loss of 33 from 1962. England's total of 81 here was three better than 1962.
 Canada, fourth four years ago, displaced New Zealand for third place. This time, New Zealand finished fourth with 26 medals including eight gold. In 1962, New Zealand had 32 medals, 10 of them gold.
LED BY SWIM TEAM
 The swimmers and divers accounted for almost half of Canada's medals with a total of 25 including seven gold. But the physical for the American Football League club, said the former Alabama star had suffered a strain in the back of his right knee.

 A crowd of 30,000 packed National Stadium for the finale, the mile relay being the last event. Then Prince Philip brought the Games to an official close and called on Commonwealth athletes to meet four years hence in Edinburgh, Scotland.
 On Scottish soil, the sports festival simply will be called the Commonwealth Games—as empire has been dropped.
 Miss Hoffman's gold medal was the only one taken by the Canadian female track and field team. Australian women dominated that sport with seven gold medals in 11 events.
 Miss Hoffman joined Harry Jerome of Vancouver and Dave Steen of Toronto as Canada's track and field winners. Jerome

took the men's 100-yard dash and Steen the shot-put.
 Abby, a second-year student in political science and economics at the University of Toronto, said she came to Kingston "not figuring to win the gold."
 Abby's clocking of 2:04.3 easily broke her pending Canadian open and native record of 2:07.2 set in the Edmonton trials last month, and made up in great measure her faltering seventh and last-place position in the half-mile at Perth. After that race, Abby said that "I was only 15-years-old and overwhelmed—completely out-classed." And she had run with an injured hip.
 The mile was a thriller with the first six finishers breaking the four-minute barrier. Keino, who admits he is a reluctant runner, took the lead from the Lepus of Toronto on the back straight of the opening lap and killed off the field with a blistering third lap of 58.9.
 Keino's clocking broke his own Games record of 3:57.4 set in a heat and was 3.5 seconds faster than the "miracle mile" by Roger Bannister of England at Vancouver in 1954.
 Alan Simpson of England was second in 3:57.1, the best time of his career, and Ian Studd of New Zealand took the bronze medal in 3:58.4. Lepus was seventh in 4:01.0, also a personal best.

GETS GAMES DOUBLE
 Keino, the first man to win both the mile and three miles in Games history, said he didn't expect to break the pending world mark of 3:51.3 by Jim Ryun of the United States.
 In the mile relay, the Trinidad-Tobago team anchored by Wendell Motley, the Games champion quarter-miler, won in the world record time of 3:02.8, finishing comfortably ahead of Canada and England.
 The winning foursome of Lennox Yearwood, Kent Bernard, Edwin Roberts and Motley clipped 1.7 seconds off the old mark of 3:04.5, set last year in Modesto, Calif., by the Southern University track club.
 The Canadian foursome—Rosa MacKenzie of Stoneham, Man., Brian MacLaren of Winnipeg, Don Domansky of Port Arthur, Ont., and Crothers—appeared out of the medal hunt at the halfway mark as Jamaica, Trinidad and England were running one-two-three.
 The world mark was the only one set in track and field, but a dozen world records were set in swimming, nine by Australians, and one was equalled.
 Two of the world records were set by Canada—Elaine Tanner of Vancouver in the women's 220-yard butterfly and Canada's female freestyle swimming team with Miss Tanner on the first leg.
 Thirty-five Games records were broken in track and field, swimming, weightlifting and cycling.

 It happened during the first quarter of the Jets-Houston Oilers exhibition before a record 57,205 at Birmingham, Ala., Saturday night when Namath was hit by Houston defensive end Don Floyd after he had handed off to fullback Matt Snell.
 Namath limped to the dressing room where the knee was packed in ice.

 "It does not appear to be serious," said Dr. Nicholas. He estimated that Namath would be out of action for two weeks, at least.

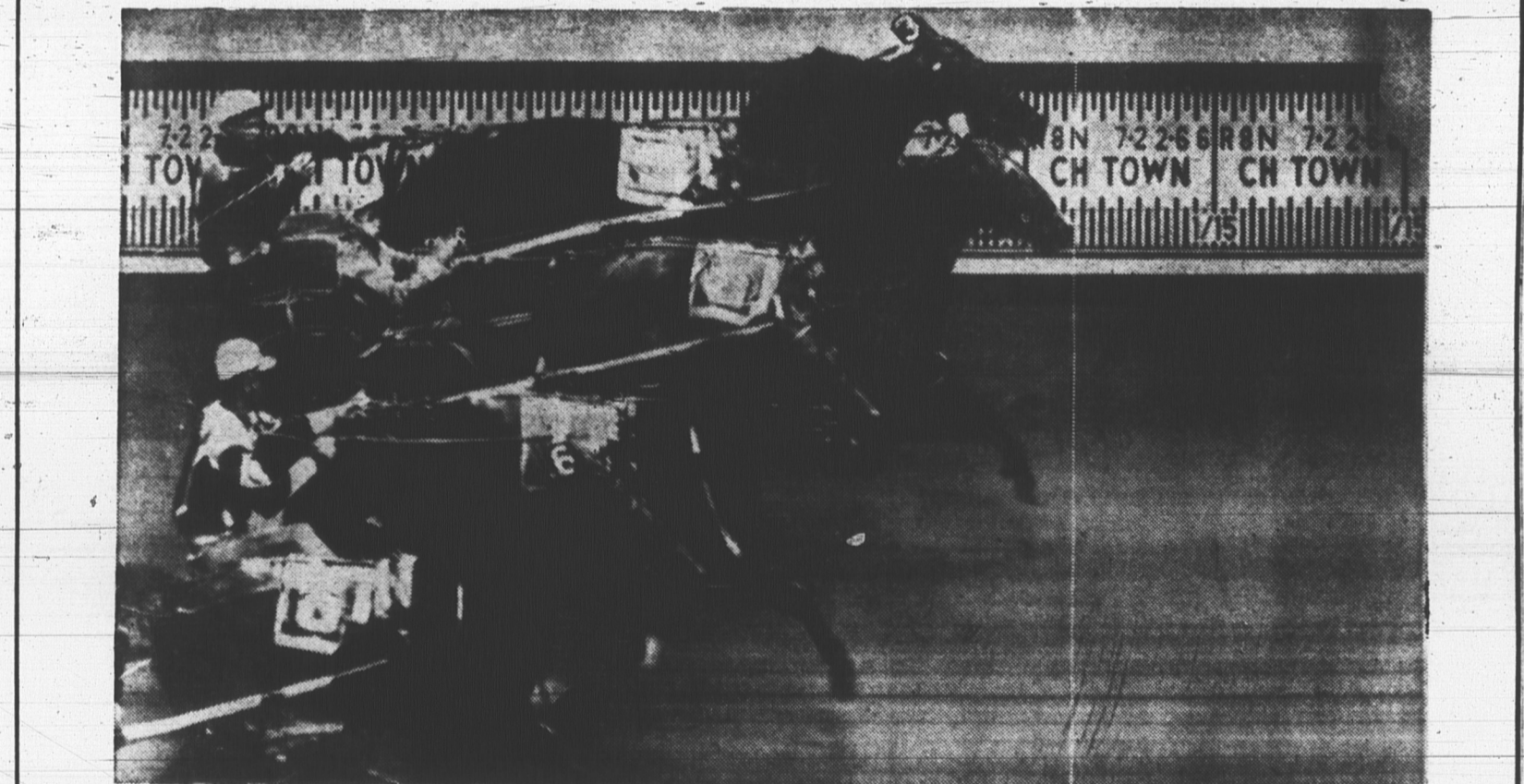
