ABOLITION OF WARDS.

The application of the bill for the abolition of the ward system in this city is, we understand, to be made subject to a plebiscite vote of the ratepayers. This provision removes every objection to its passage. The bill, we understand, has been framed in strict accord with the resolution unanimously adopted at the large citizens meeting held previous to the civic elections.

TOO THIN.

The Hon. Donald Farquharson—Premier by the vote of Pineau—has obtained from Mr. W. H. Crosskill, official stenographer, a letter in which it is stated that "the sole trouble" in respect to the report of the evidence taken before the Asylum Commission, and yet unpublished, "was lack of time, and technical assistance." This statement is true beyond a doubt for Mr. Crosskill is an efficient officer, and he speaks the truth. But it is also true that if the evidence taken before the Asylum Commission had been favorable to the Government the "technical assistance" would have been supplied, sufficient time would have been afforded, and the evidence would have been hurried out and published in The Patriot as well as in pamphlet form. Instead of this, it appears that Mr. Crosskill and his assistant are "kept very busy at the correspondence and current shorthand, typewriting, court and library work, and weeks would elapse without being able to touch the Asylum Investigation." Mr. Crosskill says that he was instructed to "devote all his spare time to the work." But the trouble is that he wasn't given any spare time! Other work was heaped upon him; and technical assistance which might easily have been obtained was not afforded.

The damaging charges, to investigate which the Asylum Commission was appointed, were made good before the commissioners; and the fact is, by inference, admitted by the commission. It is greatly to the credit of Miss McInnis, that of all the charges she preferred in her letters to THE EXAMINER, only one is disposed of by the commissioners as unproved; and that all the rest are, by inference, admitted to be true.

PINEAU AGAIN.

CAPTAIN CAMERON came to town on Saturday night and was seen by a representative of THE EXAMINER. In reply to questions, he stated, that he had never received a telegram from Mr. A. A. McLean and never told Mr. Pineau that he had; if Mr. Pineau had so understood him Mr. Pineau was entirely mistaken.

In this connection, we may remark that even if Mr. McLean had sent Pineau a message, the fact would not have proved corrupt intent on Mr. McLean's part; for Mr. McLean and other Conservatives in Charlottetown had been led to expect that Pineau was coming back to do that which he was elected to do, viz: vote against the Farquharson Government.

By the way, "An Observer" desires to know how Mr. Pineau learned that the Government had a surplus of \$5000? What member of the Government misled him with that untruth? When and under what circumstances was Pineau erroneously informed that the government had a surplus of \$5000? These are questions

that must be satisfactorily answered before the public can attach any weight to Mr. Pineau's first and principal reason for deserting his friends.

A PROTEST.

We learn that a protest against the proposed change to two daily sessions in West Kent and Upper Prince Street School is being signed by parents throughout the city. It is to be assumed that the trustees, who act for the parents, will not make the change at the suggestion or on the petition of bachelors and others who have no practical knowledge concerning either household management or the rearing of children. There can be no question that the change will, if enforced, involve disarrangement of "the daily round" in many households, and much inconvenience, particularly to mothers. The fact that the two schools are situate at extreme ends of the town renders the case additionally hard. Children living in the Kensington district and compelled to walk to West Kent or Upper Prince Street Schools cannot be expected to attend forenoon and afternoon sessions, and the result must be a large falling off in daily attendance. If the trustees consider the two terms essential they are in duty bound to provide an additional school at the east and south ends of the city.
