

Wallace Arrives in London For Light Heavy Title Bout

LONDON (CP)—Canada's Gordon Wallace arrived Thursday to meet British champion Ron Barton for the empire light heavyweight boxing title, and promptly staked a claim to have the contest billed as a world-title bout.

On arrival, Wallace was told America's Archie Moore is giving up his world championship, Harry Sheppard, of Montreal, Wallace's manager, then said he will stake that near Tuesday's title against Barton at Calpton Stadium should be given the status of a world title bout.

(Actually Moore is under no obligation to give up his light heavyweight title unless he is recognized as heavyweight champion. He is tentatively scheduled to fight Floyd Patterson for the heavyweight title in September. Boxing regulations bar a fighter from holding two titles.)

The Brantford, Ont., basher, who has beaten Britain's Randolph Turpin, came to town accompanied by another Canadian fighter, Yvon Durcille of Baie St. Anne, N.B., who also fights at Calpton Tuesday.

Durelle fought Barton at London's Albert Hall 14 months ago and was disqualified for a foul.

Yanks Trade Two Players To Athletics

NEW YORK (AP)—New York Yankees Thursday night traded two players to Kansas City, placed two others on their roster and arranged for the transfer of two men from the Athletics to Richmond, Va., their farm club in the International League.

In the complicated series of deals first baseman Ed Robinson and outfielder Lou Skizas went to Kansas City; outfielder Norm Siebern was purchased from Denver, Yankee farm club in the American Association and shortstop Billy Hunter was activated from the disabled list, and pitcher Ed Burdick and outfielder Bill Renna were sold to Richmond by the Athletics. Skizas had been playing for Richmond.

Siebern, 23, was the star rookie in the Yankee training camp at St. Petersburg, Fla., this spring. He was injured after playing twelve games, badly bruising both knees.

Robinson hit .222 as a part-time first baseman and pinch hitter, with five homers. He is 35.

Fabius Ready For Belmont Stakes

NEW YORK (AP)—Fabius tipped three-quarters of a mile in a final sharp speed workout Thursday, and trainer Jimmy Jones said "That's all he needs—he's fit" for the \$100,000-added Belmont stakes on Saturday.

The Calumet Farm colt, who ran second May 5 to Needles in the Kentucky Derby, then reversed the order of finish in the Preakness two weeks later, remains the biggest question mark in the 88th Belmont.

Hot, muggy "Belmont weather" enveloped Long Island, and turf addicts argued warmly as they discussed this final jewel of the 3-year-old triple crown. Eight are expected to go in the race which has produced the three-year-old champ in nine of the last 10 years.

Fabius is a prime subject of conversation since he easily won the Jersey stakes at Garden State one week after taking the Preakness. But last Saturday at Delaware Park, the son of Citation wound up second, six lengths behind Ricci Tavi.

Faul Bailey, who rides in the Belmont replacing the suspended Willie Hartack, this morning sent Fabius six furlongs handily in 1:12 1/8 galloping out the mile.

Rhubarbs Mar U.S. Open

ROCHESTER, N.Y. (AP)—Two internationally famous golfers—England's Henry Cotton and Masters champion Jack Burke—escaped disqualification Thursday as a succession of rhubarbs marred the first round of the National Open golf tournament.

Bob Rosburg, a bespectacled, 29-year-old former Stanford athlete from Palo Alto, Calif., shot into the lead with a two-under-par 68, two strokes better than Australia's Peter Thomson.

Rudy Horvath of Windsor, Ont., scored a 37-36-73 for the best performance of three Canadian golfers entered in the open.

Jerry Magee, a Toronto amateur, shot a 38-39-77. Bill Ezimicki, formerly of Winnipeg and a onetime National Hockey League forward, had a 41-37-78.

He had refused to check the card at the 18th hole, saying "I'm too tired."

PENALIZED TWO STROKES

EARN BRONZE MEDAL

Canadian Horsemen Cause Surprise At '56 Olympics

STOCKHOLM (AP)—A trio of young Canadian horsemen resplendent in their brilliant red hunting jackets Thursday earned a bronze medal by finishing a surprising third in the Three-Day Trials at the 1956 equestrian Olympics.

What was even more surprising was the fact that the Canadians who turned the trick—Brian Herblson, 27, John Rumble, 22, and Jimmy Elder, 22, all of Toronto—were competing in their first Olympics. Only one of them had any kind of international competition to speak of.

Britain won the team championship and gold medal while Sweden captured the individual title before visiting Queen Elizabeth and Sweden's King Gustaf Adolf, who sat in the royal box.

The Canadians finished behind Britain and Germany in the team standing and place three mer among the first 20 individually.

Something New

For Canada, competing in the equestrian Olympics is something comparatively new. Canada for many years has sent teams to the big horse shows in the United States and Canada which have international jumping events. But it wasn't until 1952, that Canada decided to send an equestrian team to the Olympics.

At Helsinki four years ago the Canadians did poorly and the team finished far back. Stewart Treveranus of Toronto and Larry McGinness, a Toronto brewery owner finished 22nd and 29th respectively.

Thursday, Rumble finished 16th Elder 19th and Herblson 20th.

Britain's Lt.-Col. Frank Willdon of the Royal Artillery, A. E. Hill, riding the Queen's horse Country man III, and Maj. Laurence Root won the team crown with a total of 335.48 penalty points.

Germany was second with 475.91 and Canada third with 572.7. Australia took fourth place with 620.98, Italy was fifth with 681.14 and Argentina sixth with 724.18.

Sweden Wins Solo Medal

Peter Kastenman, a sergeant in the Swedish Royal Artillery, won the individual medal in the novel event which calls for a day of dressage, a day of endurance over a grueling 21-mile track and trail and Thursday's jumping over a 12 jump, half-mile winding course which was the toughest phase.

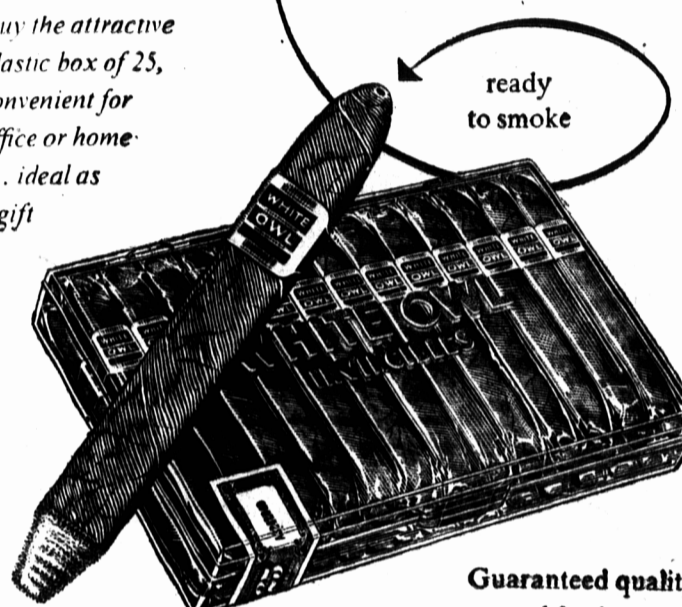
Bowery Bombers Defeat Darts
