B.C. May Have Cocktail Lounges By Mid-Summer

VICTORIA, Jan. 16 (CP)—British Columbia may have cocktail lounges by mid-summer, but they won't be the plush bars of some Eastern Canadian cities.

A three-man liquor inquiry commission has recommended cocktail lounges, drinks with meals and pubs with pickles and pretzels.

In calling for sweeping changes in the liquor laws, the commission said: "We do not look with favor on, and very definitely recommend against, the exotic, dimly lighted, voluptuous type of cocktail bar which creates a delusory impression of opulence and social distinction. Rather, we would recommend a 'beverage lounge' license."

The report is not binding on the government, but Premier W. A. C. Bennett's Social Credit administration is expected to deal with it at the session of the Legislature opening Feb. 3.

The commission recommended a variety of new drinking outlets. They are: Class A hotels; class B hotels; public houses; business, professional and sports clubs, non-profit clubs; veterans' clubs; restaurants; passenger ships, railway diners, and planes.

It proposed "sharp teeth" for enforcement of any new liquor act, finding the present control board had been lax.

Speaks On Work In Aiding Blind

Miss Florence Evans, in charge of home teaching instruction for the blind was guest speaker before the students of Summerside High School yesterday afternoon.

Miss Evans gave a highly instructive account of her experience with blind folk throughout the Maritime Provinces and spoke in glowing terms of the gratitude with which people suffering from the handicap of blindness, embraced the opportunity to improve their lot.

"It is most heartening," said Miss Evans, "to experience the joy and eagerness with which the students approach their tasks and the determination they show to get ahead with it."

Mr. Clyde White, field secretary for the Province, also spoke to the students on matters peculiar to his job in dealing with the blind under the direction of the Canadian National Institute. He announced that the new film on Glaucoma is now in the Province and available to school or other groups to be shown at any time free of charge.

Mrs. Evans was introduced by Mr. Clarence Mercer, supervisor of the High School. Mr. White was introduced by Mr. J. Frank Arnett, member of the Advisory Board for the Institute for the Blind for the Province of P. E. I., who interviewed him on his work as field secretary.

Mr. Arnett made an appeal to the students to support the Tag Day for the blind which is being held in Summerside today.

Prominent Sask Farmer Dies

REGINA, Jan. 16 (CP)—A. F. Sproule of Lafleche, first vice-president of the Saskatchewan Wheat Pool, died in a Regina Hospital Thursday. He was 70.

A native of Mapleton, N. S., Mr. Sproule was active in early farm organization and prominent in the work of the old Saskatchewan Grain Growers' Association. He was one of the leaders in organization of the Saskatchewan Wheat Pool in 1923.

He had been the association's director for district no. 2 since 1924 and first vice-president since 1937.

As a member of the Western Grain Standards Board, Mr. Sproule was keenly interested in the maintenance of the quality of Canadian wheat. On a number of occasions he represented the pool before Parliament's agricultural committee when important amendments to the Canada Grain Act were under consideration.

In 1941 Mr. Sproule took a leading part in the demands of Western farmers for alleviation of distressed conditions arising from a long period of low grain prices. He was active in organization of the "on to Ottawa" delegation in February, 1942, which resulted in partial recognition of Western demands for higher grain prices.

Mr. Sproule came to Western Canada in 1912 and homesteaded in the Lafleche district southwest of Moose Jaw.
