## Ed Furgol Sets Smart Pace For 180,000 Duffers

SAN FRANCISCO, Calif. (AP)—U.S. open champion Ed Furgol fired a two-over-par 72 at the lake course of the Olympic country club Saturday to set the pace for an estimated 180,000 duffers in National Golf Day competition.

Patty Berg, playing with Furgol to establish the women's figure shot a 77, three over women's par.

A crowd estimated at some 7,000 followed the players over the 6,700-yard layout in perfect weather. There was no wind and it was hot and clear.

Golfers playing on local courses in Canada and the United States who bettered the scores posted by Furgol and Miss Berg received medals inscribed "I Beat Ed Furgol" or "I Beat Patty Berg," as the case may be.

Life magazine estimated 165,000 golfers in the U.S. and 15,000 in Canada tried to beat Furgol and Miss Berg. It figured, on the basis of past performances, that about 35,000 succeeded.

Furgol was one over par on each nine of the exacting course. He wound up the first nine by sinking a 12-foot putt for a birdie 3 on the eighth hole to give him his 36. He birdied only one other hole during the match, the 340-yard 12th, where he dropped a 10-foot putt.

Miss Berg fired five birdies, but her score was high because of a fat 6 she took on the third.

There was a large turnout of local golfers for the competition. Half the proceeds went to the Canadian Red Cross and half to the development of junior golf.

The league leading Brooklyn Dodgers split with the St. Louis Cardinals, losing the opener 9-4 as Ken Boyer capped a five-run Cardinal binge with his second home run in the 10th, and then coming back to take the second 10-6.
