Amendment In City Act Is Voted Down By Legislature

A request to add all incorporated companies domiciled in the City of Charlottetown to the civic voting list was vetoed in the Island Legislature yesterday.

Chief opponents of the measure contained in a Bill designed to make this and several other amendments in the City's Act of Incorporation were Dr. Dewar (P.C. 2nd Prince), R.R. Bell (P.C. House leader of the Opposition), and Premier Matheson on whose motion the offending clause was deleted.

Only member present to vote in favor of retaining the measure was Morley M. Bell, Q.C., Summerside.

Dr. Dewar said he was opposed to multiple voting in principle. During provincial elections citizens voted on various franchise rights all over the place. One vote to each individual was enough he said.

R.R. Bell said that under the new legislation sought it would be possible for one man representing 10 different companies to

cast 10 votes at the time of a civic election. He said that he could not see how the legislation would result in a better or fairer civic vote. The CNR, the T. Eaton Co., and other similar large companies would have only one vote, while the small concerns would have one as well.

This request might well be "but the thin edge of the wedge", the leader of the government asserted. The time could soon arrive when the big companies would want 20 votes as opposed to only one by the smaller operators, he observed. Though Halifax and Moncton had similar legislation, he was not personally in favor of it, the Premier added.

Also deleted without dissent on motion of R.R. Bell was the final clause in the amending bill. Under this provision the amendment to the City Act passed last year to authorize the plebiscite relative to the Water Commission, would have been scrapped.

The leader of the Opposition said that the amending Act should be retained if only to show authority for the holding of that plebiscite.

Agreed to were the various sections of the enactment dealing with the extension of the City's boundaries in order to include the new Ward Six, and the change in the Council quorum required by

the amendment. The City Act passed last year to authorize the plebiscite relative to the Water Commission, would have been scrapped.

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Education Committee Endorses Gov't Policy

Complete indorsement of the general increase in teacher's salaries planned to become effective at the beginning of the next school year, and enthusiastic commendation of the government's action in providing each school board in the Province with a uniform bookkeeping system, were both expressed in the report of the Legislature's 1959 select standing committee on education tabled in the House yesterday.

Other education innovations noted with satisfaction by the committee were: the establishment of the Prince Edward Island Board of Teacher Education and Standards; making completion of Grade Twelve the minimum standard for entrance to the teacher-training class; the building of a new addition to the Vocational School; the increase in the number of students attending the rural high schools; the provision of \$35,000 for equalization grants; and the coming survey by Dr. M. E. LaZerte.

The report was tabled by the chairman of the committee, Morley M. Bell, Q.C. (L-5th Prince). Serving with Mr. Bell on this committee were: Leo Kossitor (P.C. 2nd Kings), Hon. Prosper A. Arsenault, minister without portfolio, F. A. Large (Q.C. L-1st Queens), Dr. George Dewar (P.C. 2nd Prince), Hon. Keir Clark, minister of education; and Hon. Dougald MacKinnon, minister of industry and natural resources, and minister of fisheries.

Car License Cases Heard

A resident of Rochford St., Charlottetown, pleaded guilty before Magistrate Gilbert A. Gaudet yesterday to not having motor plates attached to his motor vehicle and was fined \$5 and costs or 5 days.

A resident of Charlottetown R. R. 6 was fined \$10 and costs or 10 days when he pleaded guilty to driving without having his motor vehicle registered in Prince Edward Island.

A resident of Central Royalty and one from West Royalty pleaded guilty and each were fined \$5 and costs or 5 days for failing to register transfer of motor vehicles to their names.

Pleading guilty to parking on the travelled portion of the highway at Central Royalty, a resident of Charlottetown R.R. 3 was reprimanded by the Court.

For driving without proper lights a resident of Montague was fined \$5 and costs or 5 days on a plea of guilty.

For failing to dim his lights a driver from Crapaud was fined \$5 and costs or 5 days on a plea of guilty.

A Mount Herbert resident pleaded guilty to possession of intoxicating liquor not purchased from a vendor and was fined \$25 and costs or 30 days.

Born in 1857 in Ayrshire, Scotland, Dr. Robertson held a wide variety of important posts in Canadian Agriculture and was a member of the Canadian Peace Conference Delegation to Paris in 1919. His success in persuading a group of farmers at New Perth to organize the first farmer owned cheese factory in the Province laid the foundation for the modern industry of today.
