

Local and Other Items.

MR. ROBERT ANGUS, of the firm of Des Brien & Angus, arrived home last night.

THE first annual general meeting of Commercial Travellers will be held at Halifax Hotel on the 7th prox.

ST. PATRICK'S HALL.—Dr. O'Brien's lecture will be held in St. Patrick's Hall, at 8 o'clock this evening, in aid of the City Hospital.

THE action of the leading brewers of Ontario, in raising the price of beer to 27 cents per wine gallon with no discount, was burst on the 24th by mutual consent.

THE steamer "St. Lawrence" was detained by the storm at Point du Chene yesterday evening. She arrived at Summerside during the night, and the mails arrived by first train this morning.

THE Department of Marine and Fisheries is negotiating for the purchase of a wooden steamer to replace the "Glendon," sold last spring. The steamer will be utilized in carrying supplies to lighthouses, &c.

WE learn that the Union Bank of P. E. Island has made arrangements with the Bank of Nova Scotia to redeem their notes at the various agencies of the Bank of Nova Scotia throughout the Lower Provinces.

THE schooner "Minnie Mac," Capt. Thomson, cleared from Crapaud on Monday, with 3,200 bushels potatoes; and schooner "Laura Brown," Capt. Swain, cleared from this port yesterday, with 4,350 bushels—both loaded by A. H. B. Macgowan, of this city, for the American market.

THE harvest estimates for Kansas this year are as follows: Winter wheat, 1,465,745 acres, 33,943,398 bushels; spring wheat, 137,822 acres, 1,691,448 bushels; corn 4,411,836 acres, 157,065,722 bushels; rye, 204,662 acres, 4,456,400 bushels; oats, 529,234 acres, 21,946,284 bushels.

REV. DR. O'BRIEN lectures in St. Patrick's Hall this evening, under the auspices of the Benevolent Irish Society. His subject will be, "Among the Ruins of Pompeii and Baia." As the lecture is given in aid of the Charlotetown Hospital, and as the lecturer is among the most popular in this Province, there is no doubt that the Market Hall will be well filled this evening.

His many friends will be glad to know that he has quite recovered his health, and is well pleased with his new station.

WE learn that a slight improvement has taken place in the price of oats, for delivery at French ports. The price now quoted is eighteen shillings per quarter of 304 pounds, cost, freight and insurance. This rise, however, is probably owing to the unfavorable news received from Egypt, that further complications were likely to arise. The advance may only be temporary as, in the face of the heavy crops everywhere, it is impossible for a high price to be maintained.

THE Stipendiary Magistrate, to-day, fined a prisoner \$20 for interfering with the police, and estimated that the next fine for the slightest interference with the police would be \$50. He also informed the drunken portion of the community that, from this out, the lowest fine for drunkenness would be \$8. He said he found that leniency in the punishment of this offence was rather injurious than otherwise, as the smaller the fine the oftener the culprit came before him. He would try a larger fine for some time; and see what effect it had.

THE Ayrshire cow, "Lady Franklin," which took first prize at the Dominion Exhibition, last year, died on Friday last. She was owned by Mr. C. B. Blackard, of Trenton, N. S. She had her first calf on Oct. 4th, 1881, and her last calf on Sept. 20th, 1882. During the year she gave over 4000 quarts of milk. When fresh in milk she gave 22 1/2 quarts per day, and 6 months after calving she gave 16 quarts per day. She gave her own weight in milk in 20 days. The milk was sold for the Halifax markets at 3 cents per quart and realized during the year over \$120.00.

PEDESTRIANISM.—The great pedestrian competition in progress at Madison Square Gardens, New York, is attracting great attention. All the contestants, viz.—Charles Rowell, George Hazel, Patrick J. Fitzgerald, Jno. Hughes, Robert Vint, Geo. D. Noremak, Frank Hart, Daniel J. Hefty, and the Buffalo postman—Peter J. Panchoy, are well known. Hanlan, the oarsman, is referee. The walking is said to be good and the score, at 1 o'clock, a. m., on the 24th, stood: Hughes, 22 1/2; Hazel, 24; Rowell, 24 1/2; Hart, 23 1/2; Fitz, 23 1/2; Noremak, 22 1/2; Hefty, 21 1/2; Panchoy, 20; Vint, 19.

THE question under discussion is: "Who discovered the great comet?" Dr. B. A. Gould, of the Harvard Observatory at Cordoba, South America, claims the honor of the discovery. He says it was first seen at his observatory more than a day previous to its discovery by Finlay at the Cape of Good Hope, and five days before was seen by Dr. Cruls at Rio. Late letters from the Cape to a prominent English astronomer show that the comet was observed there upon the day of perihelion passage clear up to the edge of the sun, when it suddenly disappeared. This observation has no parallel in the history of astronomy and is an evidence of the extraordinary brilliancy of the comet. Mr. Chandler, of Harvard observatory, has just computed a new orbit, which is of much greater accuracy than any heretofore obtained and gives unmistakable evidence of periodicity. By means of this a comparison of the observations of Finlay with the position which the present orbit gives from that date has been made, and the variation between the observed and computed place is less than the diameter of the nucleus of the comet. From this close agreement it is evident that no sensible perturbations attended the close approach to the sun.

The Czar and the Nihilists.

The New York Herald says:—"It is a pity that the Czar is not in a position frankly to declare his reasons for living in retirement, for leaving the proffered crown untouched and being slow to initiate domestic reforms; for the meanness of his subjects could not fail to attribute his delay to personal cowardice and to see the hand of the nihilists in every misadventure that occurs. Count Tolstoi, the Prime Minister, is not the man to dissipate this popular superstition. He has not the military frankness of Melnikoff or the amiable garulity of Ignatieff. He is a man of mysteries—cold, harsh and silent—and while he counsels the Czar to observe a policy of secrecy St. Petersburg sees conspirators in each of his house porters and hourly waits for the news that Alexander III. has shared his father's fate."

IN THE SUPREME COURT.

In the matter of An Act of the Parliament of Canada, passed in the forty-fifth year of Her present Majesty's Reign, Chapter 23, intitled, "An Act respecting Insolvent Banks, Insurance Companies, Loan Companies, Building Societies, and Trading Corporations, and of the President, Directors, and Company of the Bank of Prince Edward Island, an Insolvent Banking Company.
