MR. JOHN D. MacLEOD

There passed peacefully away to his eternal rest on Thursday evening, October 9th, 1958, in the King's County Memorial Hospital, Montague, John D. MacLeod of Strathcona. AGRICULTURAL NEWS

P.E.I. Department of Agriculture

BREEDERS MEET

The Ontario Association of Artificial Breeders and their Associate Members met recently at the Seaway Hotel in Toronto. Five Provinces other than Ontario were represented at the Session. These Provinces were British Columbia, Quebec, Dr. D. G. Moore of New Brunswick, Mr. Robert Windeler of Nova Scotia and Dr. George C. Fisher of Prince Edward Island. In addition to the Canadian Representatives six States had delegates present. The States represented were

Missouri, Wisconsin, Michigan, New York, New Jersey and Minnesota.

Dr. C.R. Reid, Manager of the Central Ontario Cattle Breeding Association and President of the Ontario Association of Artificial Breeders conducted the meeting. Various committee reports were received on research semen selling, public relations, private sires and the Treasurer's Report.

The Livestock Commissioner for Ontario, Mr. W.P. Watson extended an official welcome to all those in attendance. Dr. H.A. Herman, Executive Secretary, National Association of Artificial Breeders from Columbia, Missouri, extended the greetings of the National Association and gave a very interesting talk on the subject of improving cattle by the million.

The noon day luncheon was highlighted by the guest speaker the Padre of the Ontario Agricultural College the Reverend W. A. Young. He selected as his topic a part of the slogan used by the National Association. This motto is "Better Cattle for Better Living". The Rev. Mr. Young selected the Better Living phase.

The National Secretary Manager of the Holstein-Friesian Association of Canada, Mr. G. M. Clemons spoke on "These Things Thou Knowest". He dealt with some of the basic facts concerning livestock breeding. C. J. Krumm, General Manager of the Southern Wisconsin Breeders Co-operative of Madison, Wisconsin spoke on Public Relations. The Technicians and Selling, The A.I. Programme, Mr. E.A. Wener, General Manager, Michigan Artificial Breeders Co-operative, Lansing, Michigan, dealt with the Scrub Bull Problem.

One of the high lights of the afternoon session was a panel discussion of the problems of the A.I. Industry. This was chaired by Dr. J.A. Henderson of the Ontario Veterinary College included in the panel were Dr. H.A. Herman, Mr. G.M. Clemons, Mr. C.J. Krumm and Mr. E.A. Wener. The panel dealt with various questions which originated from the floor of the Convention. The questions covered a wide range of problems and subjects connected with Artificial Breeding.

As part of the Two Rivers 4-H Pasture Fertilization Project, the members were required to write an essay on Soil Sampling and the results obtained from following the recommendations.

The following are the essays from the two members who completed their year:—

GRAS OR BUST?

Since ancient times, good pastures have been man's best means of feeding his livestock. Milk and meat stemmed from the rich, green carpets which thrived in the springtime but withered in the hot summer.

Five or ten acres a cow were considered a necessity. Today the standard is changing. Farmers are seeking more abundant growth. The objective now is discussed in terms of cows per acre, not acres per cow.

Having selected the best available field, the cultural requirements to be considered are:

(1) Have a soil test carried out by the agricultural college or fertilizer company of your choice.

(2) If lime is required, apply and mix well with the soil before seeding. Time is important for quality of feed as well as growth, because lime (calcium) is needed in bone, blood and milk.

(3) Adding organic matter in the form of barnyard manure well-worked into the soil to plow depth improves soil texture and humus.

The farming soil of Canada has a big job to do in feeding larger and larger populations yet unborn. Fields do not belong exclusively to the farmer of today; they belong even more to the hungry mouths of tomorrow. Our good tillable land is the heritage of all Canadians, especially if soil samples are taken regularly.—Peter Meerburg, Two Rivers 4-H Club.

SOIL SAMPLING

Soil sampling and use of fertilizer proves beneficial on hay land, writes Fernwood MacPherson, Two Rivers 4-H Club.

"Last spring I had an acre of very poor hay land from which soil samples were taken. These samples when tested showed that the soil needed either a super phosphate at the rate of 500 lbs. per acre, and limestone at the rate of one ton per acre. I had the lime and fertilizer applied to half an acre of this plot, and the results were truly satisfactory. This produced a heavy crop of timothy and clover with luscious green after-grass used now for pasture, while the unfertilized plot gave a very scanty yield.

"I think this goes to show how necessary soil sampling really is, for only in this way can the farmer find out what his land needs. "Throughout this province there are many fields on farms like our own that are not in top production because they are not properly fertilized. If each field on these farms could be soil damped and the required applications made, I am sure people would be able to grow much better crops and in that way have plenty of feed for a larger stock of cattle."
