## N. Y. Stocks

NEW YORK (AP)—The stock market drifted to the end of a mild reaction last week and then surged ahead to another high.

Gains were substantial in key areas of the market. Swift jumps ahead were made by stocks favored with improved earnings, better dividends, split proposals, merger plans and government defence business.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks was ahead \$3.20 on the week and closed at \$152.40, highest point since Sept. 19, 1929, when it stood at \$152.30. The all-time high of \$157.70 came on Sept. 3, 1929.

The market hit a high for the year Dec. 7 and thereafter drifted lower in a hesitant manner. By the middle of last week, selling dried up, and the market went ahead with a spurt of buying.

Tax selling and switching, always a factor at this time of year in creating irregularities in the market, has been less upsetting this year than in many previous years.

At the same time the market has been fed on a steady diet of good general business news.

The federal reserve indicated cautiously that the emphasis might be shifting toward more expensive money, including money borrowed to buy stocks, without any change in the reserve's basic easy money policy. If this was aimed at the stock market, the cautioning words went unheeded.

McIntyre, ahead 1 1/4 at 78, led Canadian stocks generally higher at week's end. Also going up were Canadian Pacific 3/4, International Nickel 3/4 and Dome Mines 1/4. Distillers Seagram dropped 1/4.

Shore Yellowknife and Lake Giant both eased 1/4 on the American stock exchange.
