

MELBOURNE, May 6.—The battleship Australia, it was announced today by the Herald, will be sunk soon by gun-fire, or torpedoes off the Sydney harbor, in accordance with the provisions of the naval treaty concluded at the Washington conference.

Chang's authority in Peking was eliminated today with the disarming of his guard inside the capital, and General Wu is recognized by the Peking government as having assumed control.

POISONOUS FACE CREAM

NEW YORK, May 6.—Angelina Molinari, four years old, of 140 East Fifty-fourth Street, died yesterday after drinking half a bottle of massage cream which had been thrown into the garbage can by her mother, Mrs. Maria Molinari.

"It looked good to eat, so I tasted it," the child said before she died.

Mrs. Molinari sent the little girl to salvage a piece of cloth which had been thrown into the ash can, intending to use it for a mop. When the youngster had been absent nearly half an hour the mother went in search of her. She found her lying near the garbage receptacle, semi-conscious and still grasping in one hand the massage cream bottle.

Mrs. Molinari said the cream had been left at her home as a sample. It is suspected as having contained arsenic.

CARSON CITY, Nevada, May 6.—The appeal of Attorney General Leonard Fowler for a dissolution of the divorce of Mary Pickford and Owen Moore, motion picture stars, was re-submitted to the Supreme Court yesterday.

NEW YORK, May 6.—J. P. Morgan, who has been invited by the Inter-Allied Reparations Commission to confer with it in Paris on the feasibility of raising an international loan for Germany, will sail for Europe on the steamship Olympic on May 13. He will be accompanied by George Whitney, a partner in the Morgan firm, who is regarded as an expert on securities and their market possibilities here.

Calls It Joy Ride Around The World

HAMILTON, Ont., May 6.—Criticism of the "joy ride around the world," as he termed it, was heard yesterday afternoon at the Prashytery meeting when Rev. Dr. Lee, of Thorold, Ont., enquired why a Mr. Armstrong had been appointed to make such a trip. Rev. W. A. Molloy, representing the Foreign Mission Board, defended the action and said the journey was justified. It was arranged for the purpose of seeking information in the foreign fields, and Mr. Armstrong, the field secretary, would submit a report on his return which would be of inestimable value to the committee in its future work. India, China, and Formosa fields had been underrmanned, he declared, and such conditions could be guarded against after the survey had been made.

Rev. Mr. Molloy regretted the decrease in missions giving, but thought that the increase of minimum stipends from \$1,500 to \$1,800 had something to do with the falling off.

A proposal was made that the annual meeting of the general assembly be done away with, and that biennial sessions be held, but it did not meet with favor.

Incurably Insane Sometimes Aren't

PARIS, May 6.—The bill introduced in the Chamber of Deputies and Andre Tardieu and Georges Almond making insanity a legal ground for divorce, has met with considerable opposition. The bill provided that a husband or wife should be entitled to bring an action for divorce after the person to whom he or she was married had been detained for three years in a recognized asylum, and if competent medical authorities declare the patient was mentally deficient beyond hope of recovery.

Mrs. Lloyd George In Auto Accident

GENOA, May 6.—Mrs. Lloyd George, wife of the British Premier, and her daughter, Megan, were slightly bruised in an automobile accident near Nervi, a small town four miles southeast of Genoa. The machine in which they were riding collided with one driven by the son of Premier Briatano, of Roumania. The ability and coolness of both drivers prevented more serious consequences.

Confinement opponents of all changes in the French divorce law are drawing distressing pictures of the "incurable" patient recovering and returning to the bosom of his family to find his wife married again.

Andre Tardieu, one of the authors of the bill, was a member of the last Cabinet of Premier Clemenceau, and was French High Commissioner in America during the war.

Insanity was a ground for divorce in France 180 years ago. In Germany, Switzerland and other countries it is considered legitimate grounds for divorce, although the laws vary in important particulars in each country.
