

Macquarrie Figures in Deputy Speculation

OTTAWA — Prime Minister Diefenbaker has indicated that he will appoint a number of parliamentary secretaries before the opening of parliament late in September.

There has been some speculation here that he might announce such appointments Thursday, when made the shuffle of his cabinet ministers. However, the word on parliamentary secretaries is now expected to be revealed in a few weeks, possibly just prior to or at the opening of the 25th parliament.

MACQUARRIE HINTED
Among the names mentioned prominently here as possible appointments to these posts are those of Gordon Chaplin, MP for Waterloo South; Wallace Nesbitt, MP for Oxford; and Heath Macquarrie, MP for Queens.

Mr. Nesbitt was a former parliamentary secretary to External Affairs Minister Howard Green. He relinquished the position last fall to devote more time to constituency affairs and personal interests. But the sudden death of experienced Conservative back-benchers has meant his name to the fore again.

Mr. Chaplin, elected federal member of parliament in June, but with provincial legislative experience, had been suggested as a possible cabinet appointment. Now he is regarded as being a likely choice for the secondary post, perhaps to the Minister of Trade and Commerce, Mr. Hees.

FOREIGN AFFAIRS
Mr. Macquarrie has distinguished himself in parliament particularly on foreign affairs, has the handicap of coming from a province which only sends four members to Ottawa. One of the four is Angus MacLean, fisheries minister. This may rule out Mr. Macquarrie because of a promotion.

The post of parliamentary secretary is sought after by back-bench MPs. Not only does it carry considerable prestige, but it also means a \$4,000 a year salary increase over the normal \$10,000.

A parliamentary secretary handles a number of routine matters for his minister and, in addition, answers for his minister when the latter is not in the house.

NO APPOINTMENTS?
Because of the government's austerity program, it had been suggested that the prime minister might not appoint any parliamentary secretaries in the 25th parliament.

However, the Prime Minister's announcement, coupled with the fact that several of the cabinet will be handling new departments and will require extra aid, means that a number will be named in the near future.

MARSEILLES, France (Reuters)—The French Navy Friday fought and lost a Mediterranean battle with a dead whale.

Fishermen caught it in their nets, already dead, three days ago and beached it near here, hoping to sell it. But no means could be found to drag the 56-foot, 20-ton monster up the beach.

Then residents complained of the smell. So the navy detailed the minesweeper Laurier to do something about it.

The Laurier towed the remains out to sea and her gunnards pumped about 200 rounds into the carcass from their 20-millimeter guns. The riddled whale, but not sunk, assured by experts that it would soon go, the navy broke off the attack. The whale drifted ashore again Friday night.
