

The Honorable (?) David Laird

Addresses the Electors.

To the Electors of Queen's County. GENTLEMEN,—I am a candidate for your suffrages at the coming Dominion Election; and you must support me for the following reasons:—

In the first place you are my oysters, and you exist for my nourishment and comfort.

That you were created for the purpose of being a convenience to me is so clearly proven by our past relationship and is so patent a fact, that I do not think any of you will have the hardihood to deny it.

To me that relationship is extremely pleasant; and I have no desire that it should be disturbed.

I will now proceed to show that I was intended by nature to represent the varied opinions and principles of every man in the constituency.

In order to prove this I will go back to the beginning of my political career. Many of you will recollect that I first introduced myself to your notice as the editor of a religious newspaper.

In the columns of that paper I proved conclusively that the Pope was Antichrist and the man of sin.

I also showed clearly that religious education was only a device of the Scarlet Lady to win unwary Protestants to her embrace.

On that ground I claim to represent many Protestants. My claim to represent Catholics is equally good, as I introduced a section into the North-west Act, providing for the religious education of the present and future inhabitants of that great country.

You will remember that I made several unsuccessful attempts to represent you. I succeeded.

I was first elected by anti-railway men to oppose and stop the building of a railway.

After I was elected, I became very desirous of representing the Railway Party. So I not only built the portion of railway under contract, but I added fifty additional miles.

The trick was cleverly and neatly done; but it was "small potatoes" to what followed.

My next feat was one which has afforded me infinite enjoyment ever since I performed it. I have already made nearly \$100,000 by it, and I expect to make a great deal more out of it yet, if you will help me—which, of course, you will.

I call it *The Great Laird Somersault and Double Shuffle*, because I am the only man who has ever successfully performed it. A miserable fellow, called Castlereagh tried it in Ireland; but he bungled it in such a way that his memory is execrated ever since. But I did the thing so cleverly that I am courted and fawned upon by all sorts and conditions of men ever since.

I dare say the most of you recollect how it was done; but it will do you no harm to have your memory refreshed.

For many years I was the hope and bulwark of the anti-Confederate Party; and many pious people believed that I was raised up by Providence to ward off that impending evil.

But the success I achieved in representing railway and anti-railway principles, led me to consider whether I could not be a confederate as well as an anti-confederate. I consulted with a few of my friends on the subject, and the arguments were of so solid a nature that I could no longer resist them. In fact so clear and convincing was the logic that I determined to become a confederate at any price.

So strong was the power of my new faith, that I defied all the powers of darkness, and started for Ottawa in the middle of night to negotiate Terms of Union. I became so ardent a confederate that I gave away the Island's right to a share of the Fishery Award, and was very anxious that the Island should receive \$26,000 a year less than we receive at present. If any of you should doubt this, read my speeches delivered after I returned from Ottawa.

One more illustration of the two-sidedness of my political character, and I am done. Economists I can faithfully represent; and they will recollect with pride the efforts I made to save the peoples money when the Government of which I was a member, ordered that the gas lamp in front of the Charlottetown Post Office should be extinguished.

On the other hand, if there are any of you who like to see the public money spent freely on worthy objects, I can point them to my bill of about \$1,600 for travelling expenses from Battledore to Charlottetown.

I am a Free Trader in principle; but protection can safely count on me, if I am elected.

As you are aware, I can turn a sharper corner than that between Protection and Free Trade at a moment's notice.

Mr. Louis H. Davies is my colleague in this campaign. He is a man after my own heart. He always, and under all circumstances, supported me and swore by me.

I won't forget to reward him for his slavish fidelity to me.

OTTAWA, May 29.

Mr. McCallum, M. P., has been nominated for Monck; and Mr. Joe Ryan, who has retired from politics, is to oppose him. Of course Ryan does not hope for election, and will only fill up a gap in the meantime.

At the Reform Convention in Prescott, Mr. Wiser, the late M. P., declined to run; and one after another of the nominees of the Convention declined, till the last was reached, and he accepted the nomination. Sir John McDonald was received by an immense number at the Railway Station in Toronto.

The Province of Quebec bids fair to return an immense majority for the Government. Sixty Conservatives have been nominated, and only thirty Liberals. Only one minister remains at Ottawa.
