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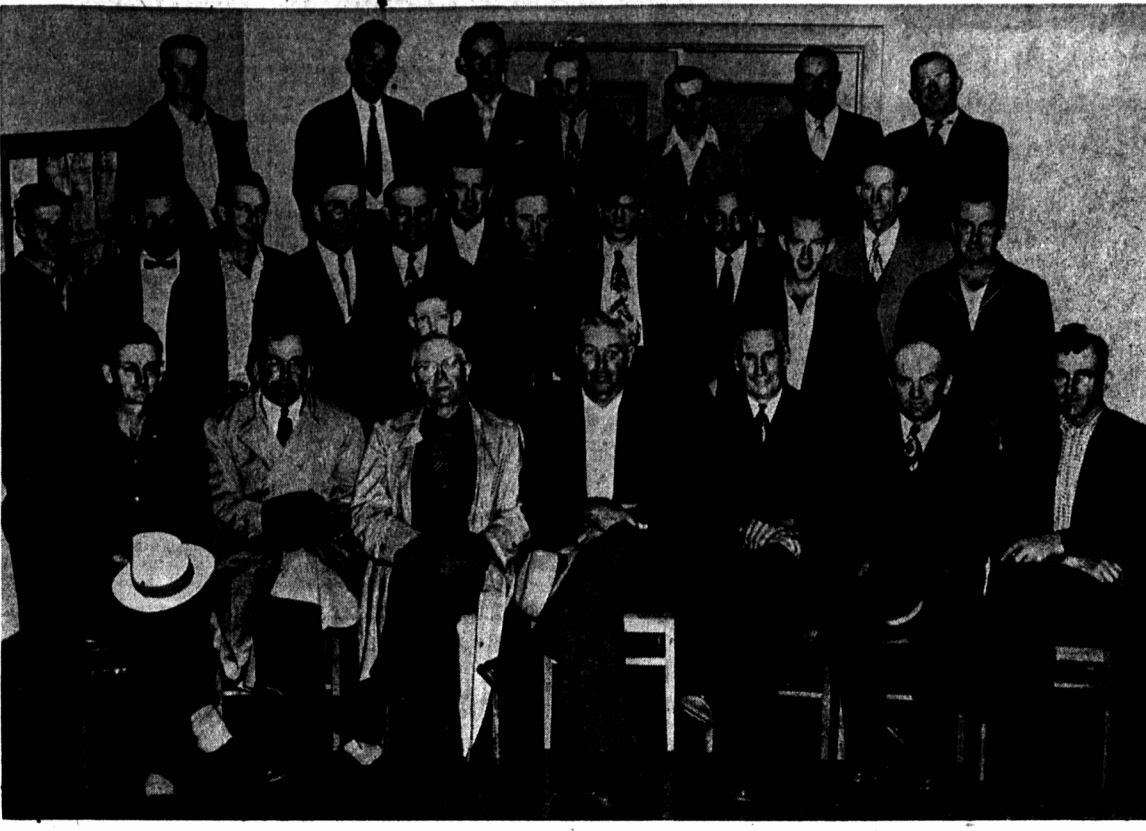

Let's Talk It Over

This is Fire Prevention Week in Summerside, and many of the measures designed to prevent fires, and proper procedures to follow during fire emergencies, will no doubt be reviewed. Fire drills in the public schools will be inspected by the local fire-marshal. There is much more to a school fire drill than marching the pupils out of the building. Their rate of marching is an important point. They must be trained not to rush from the building in a disorderly fashion, and without regard for the safety of others.

Their exit from the building must be made as rapidly as possible, consistent with the maintenance of proper order. As it is the custom to have the primary pupils on the main floors, they will naturally be the first to reach the safety of the out-of-doors, and their rate of exit will govern the rate of all other classes in the building going out the same exits. It is particularly important that these little ones be drilled to evacuate the building with as much celerity as can be combined with an orderly exit. If there is evidence of flame and smoke, nothing is more conducive to panic than to have the pupils in the rear unduly delayed by too slow an exit by those ahead of them.

Each teacher is responsible for the safety and proper conduct of her class. Formerly it was thought necessary for some designated pupil to close the windows before the class left the room. This was to prevent drafts which might fan the flames. It is now thought, however, that a careful closing of the class-room door by the last pupil to leave the room is all that is necessary to prevent cross-drafts in the building. The teacher carries her register with her, keeps her class together, and calls the roll to make sure that all are accounted for. Not many drills are necessary during the course of a school year to fix in the children's minds the essentials of an efficient evacuation from the school building in case of fire.

A \$10,000 damage suit commenced yesterday in the only case on the docket before Mr. Justice Mark R. MacGuigan.

The plaintiff is Mr. Walford MacEwen of Stanley Bridge who is represented by Mr. H. F. MacPhee, Q.C., of Charlottetown and Mr. R. S. Hinton, Q.C. of Summerside.

The defendant, Mr. Allison Profit of Freetown, is represented by Mr. Allison Gillis of Charlottetown and Mr. Donald Gillis of Saint John, N.B.

The action resulted from a collision between a car driven by Mr. Profit and one driven by Mr. MacEwen, which occurred at an intersection near New London School on July 23rd, 1953.

His suggestion was unanimously approved and will be carried out in the future. On different occasions this rule has not been adhered to strictly.

James Connell of the purchasing committee stated that the new badges had been ordered for the uniforms.

Captain Malcolm Steele, J.C. Mountain, and Glendon DesRoches were named as a committee to investigate the cost of an asbestos suit as it was pointed out that the need for this article of equipment often arises when entry into a burning building is necessary.

It was also decided to purchase four gas masks.

It was moved by Herb Schurman and seconded by Glendon DesRoches that a cheque of \$25.00 be paid over to the J. F. Arnett fund for the relief of the needy Arsenault family whose home was razed by fire on Saturday morning. —S.
