IN MEMORIAM

DR. L. S. DOYLE

—His many friends throughout the Maritime Provinces will learn with deep regret of the sudden death of L. S. Doyle, which occurred early Saturday morning, March 3rd, at his home at 99 Church Street, Moncton. Although he had been ill for the last two weeks, Mr. Doyle's condition had not been considered serious and news of his unexpected death will come as a distinct shock to his many friends.

Born in Summerside, the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Pierce Doyle, he received his early education here. He was a graduate of the University of Toronto and for several years after his graduation practised as a veterinarian in Prince Edward Island. He went to Moncton shortly after his marriage and practised there for many years as a veterinarian. About ten years ago he was appointed sanitary inspector for Moncton and the parish of Moncton, and food inspector for Westmoreland County with the Westmoreland sub-district of the Board of Health.

During his many years in Moncton, Dr. Doyle through his kindly disposition and thoughtfulness for others won a wide circle of friends and was one who was held in high regard by all who knew him.

He is survived by his wife, the former Mary Louise Murphy of Summerside, and one brother, Frank M. Doyle, Main Street, Moncton. There are also several nieces and nephews, including J. Pierce Doyle of the Bank of Commerce, Halifax, N.S., and formerly of Moncton.

Citizens of many walks of life gathered in St. Bernard's Church on Monday, March 5th, to pay a final tribute to Dr. Doyle. Requiem Mass was celebrated by Rev. J. B. Butler, pastor of the church. City and Council officials with whom he had been associated for the past ten years were among those in attendance as well as a large number of friends and relatives. Among those present from out of town were, J. Pierce Doyle, his nephew, and Charles Aucoin of Halifax, N.S.; Mrs. Fred Murphy and Mrs. J. B. Wood of Summerside.

After the service the remains were taken to Summerside where they rested at the home of his brother-in-law, J. B. Wood, from where the body was taken to St. Paul's Church for Requiem Mass on Wednesday morning at ten o'clock, celebrated by Rev. A. J. MacLeod. Present in the sanctuary also was Rt. Rev. G. J. board of managers. Transportation matters were something in which he always took a special interest, particularly ships and railroad activities. When he was travelling throughout the Maritimes he knew almost every railway official and a great many sea captains.

A Staunch Liberal Like his father before him he was a staunch Liberal in politics and he took a very active part in political matters. On numerous occasions he was asked to run in different districts in Prince County and could have had several nominations had he so desired.

He was a member of the executive of the Liberal Association and for several years president. For many years he was a close personal friend of Rt. Hon. W. L. MacKenzie King, and when Prime Minister St. Laurent was in Summerside he called on Mr. Rogers

to convey greetings from Mr. King. Mr. Rogers was also an intimate friend of the late Colonel Ralston, with whom he became acquainted when Colonel Ralston was a young man. During the days when Mr. Rogers was so actively engaged in the Newfoundland trade he became acquainted with Captain Bob Bartlett of Arctic fame, Captain Bartlett was a relative by marriage of Mr. Rogers. He also knew very well, Captain Robert Peary of North Pole fame. His close friendship with Bob Bartlett lasted right up to the time of Bartlett's death a few years ago. During the First World War Mr. Rogers had a good deal to do with metals required for ships and he became acquainted with many British naval officers, a good number of whom sought his advice frequently. He was engaged in a great deal of confidential war work, some of which was of a very strenuous nature. Some time after the end of the war his health broke down, he then represented his old firm for Prince Edward Island although he was often called to the mainland for advise on construction heating matters.

In Fox Industry During this period he also became interested in the fox industry and fur buying, which interest he continued until the outbreak of the Second World War. His interest in public affairs never ceased and he continued to take an active part in anything that pertained to the welfare of the community or province.

In 1892 he married Miss Margaret Crosbie, a sister of the late Sir John Crosbie, former Minister of Finance in the Newfoundland Government. Mrs. Rogers died in May 1949, at the age of 83 years.

Mr. Rogers was a son of the late Hon. Benjamin Rogers, a former Lieutenant Governor of Prince Edward Island, and also a former Minister of Agriculture of this Province. His mother was the former Susan Hubbard of Charlottetown.

Mr. Rogers was the third in a family of six children. The others are Mrs. G. N. Gordon of Brockton, Mass, Mrs. J. E. C. Hunter of Alberton, Mrs. C. J. Stewart of Charlottetown and Mr. R. H. Rogers of Charlottetown. Another brother, Mr. Fred L. Rogers died last year.

Mr. Rogers is the father of B. Graham Rogers, of the Department of Industry and Natural Re-

sources, Charlottetown, and of Mrs. Richard Preston (Oiga Rogers) who has been living with her father in Summerside the past few years while her husband is in South America where he is engaged under contract with a large firm building oil refineries. There are five grandchildren: Peter, Barbara, and Charles Rogers of Charlottetown and Peggy and Patrick Preston, now living in Summerside.

The funeral takes place this afternoon at 2 o'clock from the Presbyterian church, Summerside. Interment in the Dock Cemetery, Alberton. The pall bearers will be Messrs P. Foley, Dr. J. C. Simpson, Donald Baker, Donald O. Stewart, Lucas R. Allen and James Hunter.—S.
