

Laborite Rebels Routed On British Military Plans

LONDON (AP)—Prime Minister Wilson routed rebels in his Labor party denouncing a British military withdrawal from Asia.

In a wide-ranging defence of his policy, Wilson pledged to work for neutralization of Southeast Asian trouble spots, including Viet Nam.

The British leader faced the first major challenge to his leadership since winning power 20 months ago. His party caucus, made up of Labor MPs, handsomely endorsed his policy of maintaining a British military presence east of Suez. The vote was 225 to 54.

A major buildup preceded the secret showdown with left, right and centre elements of the party joining in a demand for a "decisive reduction" of British defence spending east of Suez by 1969-1970, including withdrawal from Singapore, Malaysia and the Persian Gulf.

The middle-road Liberals and some opposition Conservatives also favor a phased British pull-back from Asia.

Wilson asked if a Labor government should surrender a British influence in Asia by a pull-out and devote itself to giving advice to others in the United Nations.

"It will mean this," he said, "that you will be leaving Asia to China, the United States and the Soviet Union, with a small peripheral influence exerted by Australia and New Zealand, but with Japan coming up fast on the rails."

Opening lead—queen of clubs. Cards tell a story; what you have to be able to do is read the message. Sometimes the message is not 100 per cent clear, but even so, good judgment will more often than not unscramble the text.

This hand occurred in a team match. At both tables South got to four spades, and at both tables South went down one on the same sequence of plays.

West led the queen of clubs, taken with the ace. East returned a heart, and declarer played low, losing to the king. Black came a heart which East ruffed, and East then took the

Cattle selected in July will undergo a quarantine test in France in late summer and arrive at Grosse Ile in the fall. They'll be released next spring in Canada.

The stringent procedures are necessary to prevent the possibility of the entry of a foot-and-mouth carrier into Canada.

There was a danger earlier that a winter epidemic of foot-and-mouth disease in Europe might bring an end to the fledgling import program. However, the outbreak did not spread to France and large areas continue to be free of any trace of the disease.

At home, there is no indication the government intends to impose any policy change on the handling of imported Charolais in Canada.

There have been suggestions in some quarters to restrict Charolais buyers to registered Charolais breeders.

Another view is that Canadian

buyers should not be allowed to export their newly-acquired male offspring for periods up to 10 years in order that Canada reap the benefit of the breeding stock.
