The Duke of Albany.

The London Official Gazette states that His Royal Highness Prince Leopold has been created a Peer of England, with the title of Duke of Albany, and will now be entitled to take his seat in the House of Lords, with his brothers, who sit, one as Duke of Saxony, Cornwall and Rothsay, another as the Duke of Edinburgh, and the third as Duke of Connaught. In giving the title of Duke of Albany to her youngest son, the Queen has gratified a penchant which she has often, especially of late years, manifested: she is proud of the slender thread which unites her in blood to the Stuart race, and has, on occasions, said that she cared more for the Stuarts than for all the Brunswicks. The title of Duke of Albany, it will be recollected, was borne by a descendant of James 2nd, the last of the Stuart Kings, the Count of Albany, who died in London a few weeks ago, and who, although generally believed to be the legitimate heir of the last of the Stuarts, lived in retirement as a simple gentleman.

Reforms in Bulgaria.

News from Sofia represents that the agitation against the plans of Prince Alexander grows in intensity. There seems every probability that the attempt to realize his plans will be strongly opposed. Agitators are going about the country advising moderation and abstention from all but legal and constitutional means. Government officials are resigning daily. A letter to the St. Petersburg "Official Messenger" from Sofia states that the true significance of Prince Alexander's action is grossly perverted. The mass of Bulgarians are grateful to the Prince for dismissing the Ministry, against whose worse than Turkish rule the Bulgarians have frequently petitioned the Russian Council. It is asserted at Vienna that Russia is promoting the candidacy of Prince Dandakoff Korsakoff for the throne of Bulgaria in case Prince Alexander abdicates.

Pere Hyacinthe to visit America.

A Paris despatch says: "Pere Hyacinthe sails for the United States in September, having been invited by members of different churches to give a series of conferences in the larger cities of America. Madame Leyson accompanies him. In addition to Pere Hyacinthe, there are two other distinguished clergymen attached to the Gallican Church in the Rue d'Aras, one a young American priest from New Orleans, who preached equally well in French and English. This rapidly growing church has need of funds for its development and extension. It is mainly for this reason that Pere Hyacinthe is going to America."

The American, a high class journal published in New York, says the Toronto Globe seems to be edited by some one who possesses neither brains nor good-breeding, and says, "We commend to our contemporary to adopt a leaf out of Mr. Conkling's career, and failing to manage the Province of Ontario to its satisfaction, to cease publication."

Frost.—The St. John Sun says:—"Woodstock was visited by an exceedingly heavy frost on Monday night, the ground being frozen quite hard in some places. At Dubuc Junction ice made in water pails and puncheons to the thickness of ordinary window glass. It is feared that many of the fruit trees and garden plants will be ruined."

It would seem from the few facts that have leaked out respecting the results of the Dominion Census enumeration, that the showing is likely to be very much more favourable as respects population than most people expected. Even those not affiliated with the cause of the so-called exons may possibly be surprised at the increase of Canada's population during the last decade.—St. John News.

The body of Mr. Lawrence Enman, who was accidentally killed in Boston on Friday, 3rd inst., arrived in this city for interment last evening. The funeral took place from the residence of Mr. Robert Crabb to Vernon River this morning. It was attended by the Old Fellows of this city and a large concourse of citizens, who assembled to do honor to the remains of a most estimable young man. The circumstances attending Mr. Enman's death are most heart-rending. He was at work on a railway building housing rafters. The gear gave way, and he was struck by the rafter, knocked off the building and fell to the street, a distance of fifty feet. He lived an hour and a half after the accident and remained perfectly conscious until he expired. His last request was, we are informed, that his remains be forwarded to burial to his native place.
