Semi-Annual Meeting Of Girl Guides Ass'n

The semi-annual meeting of the Provincial Girl Guides Association was held in St. James' Hall, Tuesday evening, with the Provincial Commissioner, Mrs. F. G. Hutchison presiding. The secretary-treasurer, Mrs. Fred Jenkins, read the minutes of the previous meeting, and Mrs. J. H. Cerry, finance chairman, gave a financial report. Particularly gratifying was the result of the annual Raisin Day this year; the proceeds exceeded all previous years' sales.

Mrs. F. G. Hutchison, Provincial Commissioner, gave a most interesting and informative report of the Dominion annual meeting which she attended last May in Winnipeg.

A special feature of the meeting was the presentation of the Award of Merit to Miss Gladys Hart, International Commissioner, who has been active in Guiding for twenty years. The presentation was made by Mrs. T. W. L. Prowse and Miss Mona Wilson, who complimented Miss Hart on her splendid Guiding record.

A comprehensive report on the year's camping was given by Miss Suzanne MacKinnon, Provincial camp adviser. Two successful camps were held this past summer with an attendance of over one hundred. The Prince County camp was held at Fernwood, while the Queen's and King's County camp was at North Rustico.

Outdoor Guiding was featured, giving many Guides an opportunity to pass proficiency badges. Miss MacKinnon exhibited a plan which had been prepared by the National Parks Branch proposing a site at Stanhope for a Girl Guide camp.

National Camp

Advance information on the National Camp to be held at Connaught Range, Ottawa, July 14-25, 1951, was given by Miss Lillian Duchemin, Public Relations Commissioner. It is expected 1,000 campers from all over the Dominion will be in attendance, and already great preparations are being made to make this the most successful camp yet held. In order to qualify to attend the National Camp a Guide must be 13 and not more than 17 before July 1st, 1952; must have had 14 days previous camping experience, and must be recommended and approved both locally and provincially.

A "Day in Camp" was most realistically demonstrated by Guides Helen Chappell, Marjorie Pickard, Ann Cerry and Jeanne Gillis, with Miss Betty King as Camp Commandant. The stage was set up in real camp style with tent, campfire, trees, etc., and the Guides actually cooked bacon and eggs over the campfire during the demonstration.

Miss Iphigene Arsenault, Division Commissioner, was the commentator and explained the various phases of Girl Guide camping. At the conclusion of the meeting refreshments were served by Mrs. Morton Dew, Mrs. Louis Sadler and Mrs. Gordon Avard.

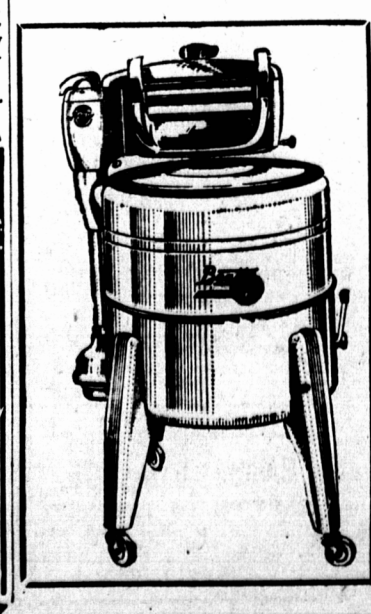
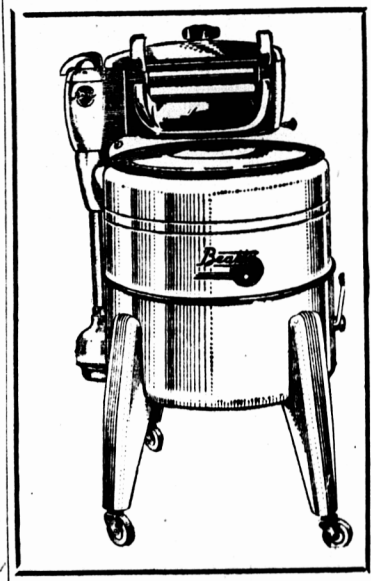
