Alfred D. Hales Proposes System

OTTAWA (Special) — A system of political internships to give young Canadians practical experience in the workings of the federal government, has been proposed by Alfred D. Hales, member of parliament for Wellington South. He believes that a system similar to that employed in the United States Congress, would not only be of benefit to the young men, but also to the members of parliament. His plan would provide a number of fellowships each year in which political science and law students and young men would spend six to nine months working with a back-bench MP of their choice. The program is intended to help young students and young men to concentrate on even one or two fields in order to become an expert in them.

Festival Designates French Canada Week

Confederation Centre's Charlottetown Summer Festival has designated the week of August 1-7, French Canada week. Festival Artistic Director Mayor Andre J. Lacombe, Jean-Paul Riopelle, Albert Pellon, Paul Emile Borduas and other representative artists from Quebec. This is the first French Canada week at the Charlottetown Festival, though paintings from Quebec have often been hung in the Art Gallery as part of other collections. French Canadian artists have also appeared on stage at the Confederation Centre Theatre from time to time and this year's Festival Company includes actor Frederic Desautels and dancer Maurice LeMay from Montreal, and Jean Caron, originally from Grand-mere, Quebec. In announcing French Canada week, Artistic Director Mayor Moore stated, "I feel it is important that in this arts complex dedicated to the memory of the founders of our country, (and because of the fact that each Canadian owns a share of it), it behoves the Festival to officially recognize the dual cultures of the Fathers of Confederation and indeed the predominant cultures of the country today." "French Canada week at the Festival is a relatively modest step in this direction this summer, and we are anticipating that future festivals will reflect the bi-cultural nature of the country to a greater extent in the content of the program we offer."

RAY TRIBUTE
 The Sunday night concert of the Atlantic Orchestra on August 7, will also pay tribute to the work of French Canadian Composer Andre Prevost by presenting the world premiere of a work specially commissioned for the occasion by the Festival entitled "Celebration", the short composition will open the evening program which will also feature works by Satie and Francois Morel. The two art exhibitions are on loan to the Festival from the Museum of Contemporary Art in Montreal and the Quebec Museum in Quebec City. The Quebec Museum exhibition includes works by Jan Mennis, Roland Pichot, Janine Gams, and others. "Meanwhile we are extremely grateful to the Minister of Cultural Affairs of the Province of Quebec for assisting us in providing the excellent displays to be on view during the week."

Photography Exhibition Set To Open
 Monday evening will mark the opening of Roloff Benny's "Pleasure of Photography" exhibition at the Confederation Centre Art Gallery as part of the Centre's Summer Festival. Dorothy Cameron will open the show at a ceremony in the evening. The almost 60 photographs in this collection capture exotic works of art from countries of the Far East and the Mediterranean. Alberta-born Benny is an international traveller who has lived in New York, London, Paris, Florence and Greece and now makes his home in Rome, and he is famed for his rapport with the past and the far-away. Kay Kritzweiser of the Globe and Mail writes of his photographs: "He strips away people from his camera's eye and brings up instead the ageless language of sun on stone and of time's erosive mark on marble faces. Benny has ranged with his camera like a Crusader. Century pilgrim intent on breaking barriers flung up by time against the past. He narrows this long look down to a detail — an arch, a crumbling slot, a fragment of stone — and makes them recreate forgotten world." Mr. Benny was born in Medicine Hat and holds degrees from Trinity College, Toronto, and from three American universities.

Publisher Must Pay Damages
 Reuters' A Munich court has ordered Rudolf Augstein, publisher of the news magazine Der Spiegel, to pay former defence minister Franz Josef Strauss 25,000 marks (\$6,685) damages for slander. In the latest stage in a year-long legal battle between the two, the court also confirmed an earlier ruling that Augstein must publicly withdraw allegations that Strauss misused his ministerial position for personal gain. Augstein alleged in 1963 that Strauss sought personal reward by recommending a private contractor to the then U.S. defence secretary, Thomas S. Gates, for a military building program in south Germany. The court, however, rejected Strauss' demand that Augstein withdraw a claim that Strauss "reeks of corruption."

Declining Birth Rate Alarms Spokesman

OTTAWA (Special) — The increasing use of birth control pills is cited here as one of the major factors in Canada's declining birth rate. The decline, which many feel is going on, has been going on since 1963. Last year the number fell to 419,000 and for the first six months of this year there is a further drop of more than seven per cent. Use of the pill is only one of the reasons but with this method of controlling births becoming increasingly popular, the consequences of the trend on Canada's economic future are being examined with concern. Dr. P. B. Rynard, the Conservative party's chief spokesman on health matters, describes the situation as "frighting." He points out that a con-

High Revenues From Satellite
 WASHINGTON (AP) — Early Bird, the switchboard satellite 22,300 miles above the Atlantic, rang up revenues totalling \$2,107,000 for telephone calls, television relays and other services in the first six months of 1966, the Communications Satellite Corp. reported today. The activities brought total Early Bird revenues, since the satellite started operating commercially June 28, 1965, to \$4,472,000, Comsat said. A spokesman said Early Bird billings to communications carriers increased to \$1,827,000 in the first half of 1966 from \$1,753,000 in 1965. Comsat's financial statement for the six months ended June 30 listed income from temporary cash investments in that period at \$4,472,000, and property additions at \$6,024,000, including \$3,039,000 in connection with construction of new earth stations at Brewster Flat, Wash., and Paumotu, Hawaii. Satellite system development costs totalled \$8,130,000, including depreciation and amortization of \$2,995,000.

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Ocean Search Continuing

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — The ocean search that began five days ago for Brig-Gen Joseph W. Stilwell and two flying companions was concentrated Thursday in a 54,470-square-mile area. Since early Sunday, when the pilot of the Honolulu-bound plane's engines had failed 525 miles southwest of San Francisco, the massive air sea search had expanded to more than 900,000 miles. The Coast Guard said there were no plans as yet for calling off the search.
