Try Fresh Cranberries In Three Novel Ways

The Chef came in from market, red-cheeked from the wind and snow, with two pounds of fresh red cranberries as cold as ice.

"As soon as I get my hands warm, I'm going to stir up some cranberry chutney to pass with baked ham and lamb curry," he announced.

"Meantime, I'll stir up a real New England steamed fresh cranberry pudding for dinner," I laughed. "It's a perfect dessert for a snowy day."

All measurements are level. Fresh Cranberry Chutney: In a 5-cup saucepan, combined 1 lb. (4 cups) fresh raw cranberries, 3 c. diced, peeled raw apples, 1 c. seedless raisins, 1/2 c. coarsely-chopped crystallized ginger, 2 c. sugar, 1 c. water, 1 c. cider vinegar, 2 tsp. ground ginger, 1 tsp. powdered dry mustard, 1-1/2 tsp. round cayenne pepper and 1 tsp. salt.

Bring to boiling point, Cook over moderate heat 25 min., or until mixture thickens. Ladle into hot sterilized jars. Seal at once. Makes six 1/2-pt. jars.

Steamed Fresh Cranberry Pudding: Sift together 2 1/2 c. pre-sifted enriched flour, 2 1/4 tsp. double-acting baking powder and 1/2 tsp. salt. Set aside.

Cream 1/2 c. butter or margarine with 1/4 c. sugar, 1 tsp. grated orange rind and 1 tsp. grated lemon rind.

When smooth and fluffy, beat in 2 eggs, one at a time.

Add flour mixture alternately with 1/2 c. milk.

Put 1 1/2 c. whole cranberries through food chopper, using medium blade. Add to batter. Mix well.

Turn into well-oiled and slightly floured 2-qt. mold. Place in a kettle, with boiling water coming half-way up side of mold. Cover; steam 3 hrs., adding boiling water to kettle if necessary.

Serve hot with fresh orange hard sauce. Serves 8 to 10.

Can be reheated for second day service.

Fresh Orange Hard Sauce: Cream 1/2 c. butter or margarine until fluffy. Gradually blend in 3/4 c. sifted confectioner's sugar, 2 tsp. fresh orange juice, 1 tsp. water, 1/4 tsp. grated orange rind and 1 tsp. pure vanilla extract. Serve over hot steamed cranberry pudding. Makes 1 1/2 c.

MONDAY DINNER

Hot green bean salad, panned chopped beef patties, whipped potatoes, diced carrots cooked in milk, steamed cranberry pudding, fresh orange hard sauce, coffee, tea or milk.

Candied Cranberries: Boil together for 5 min. 2-3 c. water and 1 1/2 c. sugar. Add 1 pt. large fresh cranberries. Let stand at least 4 hrs.

Then simmer until cranberries look clear. Drain.

Turn them on a large enamel or glass baking pan dusted with granulated sugar. Dust a little more sugar over cranberries.

Dry slowly about 2 to 3 hrs. in an oven about 120 degrees F. Use in place of candied cherries.

SUGGESTION OF THE CHEF: For special flavor, cook carrots until half-done. Then add 1 drained can small onions, 1 tsp. mint flakes and salt and pepper to taste.

Finish cooking and swirl in 1 tsp. butter or margarine.

I gather that you, the worried critics, set too much store by "looks." You expect looks, in terms of calendar sex appeal, to do the lion's share of the work in winning a person's way to what he or she may want in society.

In truth, however, it isn't a child's physical looks, so much as it is the "tone" of his spirit, that spells success or failure for him, in relation to other people. And I suspect it is Polly's poor showing, in your estimation, in social situations and scholarship, as compared to other children, that gets your goat. It weighs upon you as a great disappointment—and she feels that.

As a matter of family tradition and parental pride, you'd like Polly to be an easy favorite in her age-group on the basis of looks, just as you were, "away back when." Thus you feel personally cheated, obscurely humiliated, and dissatisfied with her, because she hasn't got the same winning cards that Nature dealt you.
